We were all there in chapel; some of us were studying; some were catnapping; and the rest were just barely, if at all, paying attention to the chapel speaker. But this time we had a reason for our apathy; rumors had begun to drift down our perpetually correct grapevine that, once again, the committee designated to select our new president had bogged down. We were all concerned to say the least; the choice of a president, we felt, had a great deal to do with the value of our diplomas and a few of us had even hinged our decisions on whether to return or transfer on the outcome of the committee's sessions.

We all sat erect when Dean Wright walked through those doors at the back of chapel though. Some of us thought that we had been caught dozing; but most of us sat up out of respect-deliberate or unconscious-for the man we had the most faith in; we knew we could depend on our Dean to lead us.
