
GRADUATION 1973

Graduation, 1973, featured a "first" as Dr. W. Fred Kendall, former executive secretary-treasurer, Tennessee Baptist Convention, was presented Union's first Distinguished Award.

The 148th commencement activities this year featured a student art show, numerous awards, the traditional senior dinner, a special reception, baccalaureate and graduation ceremonies for 175 students plus 35 who graduated in August.

Miss Sheri Lynn Pickett, during the Awards Day, received top honors in English, Freneh and Secondary Education and was also named the winner of the Zeta Tau Alpha award. During the graduation ceremonies, she was named the winner of the Highest Academic Achievement Award, graduating summa cum laude with a 3.972 average out of a possible 4 points.

Wiss Martha Wofford was recognized by the Class of 1962 as the senior who had the highest average of all those attending Union for four years.

Dr. Chester Swor, noted author and evangelist, was the featured speaker. He exhorted the students and large crowd of friends and parents to take the adversities of life and make them count for Christ by preparing for their inevitability.





A music education major, Kathy is twenty-one years old.






SNEA








The Tau's won first place in the All-Sing for the first time since 1968.



The club challenges students to high achievement in their fields and attempts to promote campus-wide interest in history.


In January, 1974, the club sponsored a history trip by chartered bus which visited some of the historical Civil War sites between Tennessee and Pennsylvania.



Coach Marvin McBroom made his last season at Union a winning one. His Bulldog's posted a 21-9 won-lost record which included a trip to the N.A.I.A. Tournament Preliminaries. His career record while at Union was a fine 48-17. Coach McBroom moved on to the University of Texas at Arlington where he is the head baseball coach. He takes with him many fine memories and thrilling victories, memoirs of his days at Union. Coach McBroom stressed defense and hustle; his presence will still be prevalent on Union teams for years to come.



This year's baseball team, a surprise to many, again upheld the winning tradition of Union. Compiling an over-all mark of 21-9, they advanced all the way to the N.A.I.A. tournament finals before finally being climinated. Included in the victories were upset wins over Pan American University, David Lipscomb, and Austin Peay State University. The team was characterized by excellent senior leadership, hustle, and determination. Many individual records were also broken or tied. Among these were-Gary Blaylock set the new season and career home-run record, and Steve Valadez matched the season record for the most wins in a season. This kind of individual effort helped make the Bulldogs an able opponent even for tough majorcollege foes.

Then came winter and conditioning in the gym, after which the Bulldogs were in top shape when spring finally arrived. The season started in March with five straight victories. The last of the regular season, mostly played against major-eollege teams, saw the Unionites win five while losing only three to bring the regular season record to 19-7. Included in these last contests was a thrilling 1-0 victory over small college power David Lipscomb in Nashville. Seasons end and the Bulldogs receive a bid to the N.A.I.A. Tournament in Nashville. There the Bulldogs advanced to the final day only to be eliminated to end the season,

Mike Verdi — Mike played the shortstop position for last year's team. He also hatted from the lead-off to give the Bulldogs a consistent high-average hitter.



Despite having a losing record for the trip, the Bulldogs gained much needed experience against tough competition.










Union Bulldogs Fashion Winning Season

1973-74 Basketball Review

This year's version of the Union University Basketball team again represented the school in fine fashion. While obviously lacking in size and experience, they made up for these deficiencies with hustle and team-play. When the middle of the season rolled around, the Bulldog Five had molded into a solid team with promise.

The highlight of the season was, and always is, Homecoming. This season saw the Bulldogs gain an impressive victory over Christian Brothers College, before an enthusiastic home crowd.

Following Homecoming, the Bulldogs continued their winning streak with a strong win over Delta State. This home victory was unusual due to the fact that a failure to properly record the numbers of his players by the Delta State coach led to nine technical fouls and a 5-0 Bulldog lead before the game even started. The season was unusual by more than just game errors. A black-out in the middle of a game and a score-keeper that failed to blow the final horn on time kept the action hot and heavy.

This season the Bulldogs were again led by Coach Jim Simmons. Coach Simmons, in his fourth year as the head of the Union roundballers, gave the Union supporters many thrilling moments. Even in the heat of the battle, Coach Simmons maintains an example of the discipline his teams are noted for.

Many teams make their reputations by playing weaker college division teams. Such is not the case with the Bulldogs. The Union schedule includes N.C.A.A. ranked Austin Peay State University, and N.A.I.A. powerhouses Southeastern Louisiana, Southern University, and Kentucky Wesleyan. Despite the fact that all of these games ended in defeat for the Bulldogs, they gave national exposure to the school and much-needed experience to the team.

The amazing fact of this year's team is that only three seniors will be lost due to graduation. With a starting five that included two juniors and a freshman, and a bench of two juniors and two freshmen, the Union baskethall program shows even more promise for the future.

All in all, the season would have to be termed as a success. Despite a losing record, the Union five represented the school well. The team never quit, even in games when the score was hopelessly against them. Every team that this year's "dogs" played knew they had been in a tough scrap for a victory.

Next season brings forth new challenges and a test of the experience that was gained through this year's season. Judging from past seasons, there is little reason to doubt that the Bulldogs will rise to the occasion.





The intramural sports program is an important aspect of student life at Union. This year under the leadership of Coaches Blackstock, Davis, and Birmingham the program flourished. Any student taking twelve or more hours is eligible, and participation was excellent. The leisure provided students by this program is second only to the enjoyment and friendly competition gained from the various activities.

Certificates are given to the winners of the individual and dual sports as well as to members of the winning teams. A trophy is also awarded to the top men's and women's athlete each year. The organization with the greatest number of points gained from participation and victories each year is awarded the President's Cup. This is the highest award given in the intramural program.

There is a wide range of events in the intramural program to serve the interest of almost any student. Among the men's events are flag football, volleyball, soccer, basketball, tennis, 1-on-1 basketball. In the end, however, the awards are not the important part of the intramural program. The true worth lies in the enjoyment and companionship gained through the events as each student is in some way enriched. There is little doubt that the henefits are well worth the time spent.






Academics







Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps has a new home-Union University. Begun in the spring of 1973, the instruction was offered to Union freshman and sophomore students under the auspices of a cooperative cross-enrollment program with the University of Tennessee-

The basic course, open to all freshmen and sophomores, is an elective offering with instruction in various aspects of Military Science.

The advanced course is open to selected juniors and seniors. Each of these students receives a monthly subsistence allowance of \$100. Successful completion of the program allows a Union student to receive a commission as an Army Second Lieutenant and to serve in either an active or reserve status.
