## Union Enters VSAC

Union University along with one other area college was accepted into the Volunteer State Athletic Conference in September, 1976. The decision in Nashville to admit Union and Freed-Hardeman to the 11 -team conference was unnanimous. This action shows the recent progress of Union University's Basketball Program and set the stage for participation in the V.S.A.C post-season tournament.
Hopes for the illusive undefeated season ended early for the Union basketball team. A tough season opening loss to David Lipscomb 82.72 braced the Bulldogs for a hard-fought season.

A home crowd helped Union bounce right back to defeat Bethel College 59-56. In that game both teams shot $50 \%$ or better. Union's rebounding strength and free throws proved the deciding factor.

One of the highlights of the basketball season took place across town at Lane College. In the opening round of the Lane College Invitational basketball tournament Union pounded nationally ranked Rust College (Mississippi) $66-56$. Union shot $49 \%$ to Rust's $32 \%$ from the field which accounted for the difference.

Lane College also posted a first round victory in that tournament over Freed-Hardeman College. Union fell to the host team $72-68$ to take second place in the tournament final.
The Bulldogs returned home with outstanding back-to-back victories over Southwestern and Freed-Hardeman Colleges. Union outscored visiting Southwestern 82-75, as Richard Rice turned in an outstanding game. He had an amazing 26 rebounds and 23 points to pace the Bulldogs to victory. Two nights later Keith Reynolds led the charge with 10 rebounds and 24 points. Union edged past Freed-Hardeman 82-78. Reynolds and Rice, who added 18 points and 14 rebounds, fouled out of the game.
Southeast Missouri State stopped the Bulldog winning streak at Cape Girardeau, Missouri, 83-72. Union won the second half of that contest, but could not make up an 11 -point half-time deficit.
The Bulldogs got off to a slow start in January with two losses: one against Delta State, 68-61 in Cleveland, Mississippi, and the other against CBC in the first game of the Dixie Tournament at Southwestern in Memphis.

The Bulldogs made a strong comeback though in a consolation game against Millsaps College, 96.88.

The Bulldogs then returned home to meet David Lipscomb College, a tough team that had beaten the Bulldogs in a game earlier in the season. The Bulldogs downed them, 77.75.

Two nights later Union fell to U.T. Martin $73-59$ in another homecourt skirmish. Greg Schroeder hit for 24 points in this losing effort.

Christian Brothers College squeezed past the Bulldogs 66-64 in Memphis. Keith Reynolds paced Union's team with 19 points in that contest.

Rust College put the Bulldogs down again 77-54 at the Union fieldhouse. Then the Bulldogs got their act together with a homecourt victory over Belmont College, 89-75. Keith Reynolds had 29 points and Winston Jarrett and Greg Schroeder each added 18 to the cause.

Union's next game with Freed-Hardeman was canceled due to inclement weather conditions.

In a return to action Union continued its winning ways by crushing Southwestern in Memphis, 113-89. Keith Reynolds and Don Crain combined for 49 points, 27 and 22 respectively, and the team as a whole hit 63 percent from the field.
. The Bulldogs ended January with a victory over 8th ranked Lane College, 95-77. Keith Reynolds scored 23 points and Greg Schroeder hit for 21.

The Bulldogs then traveled to Martin only to get beaten 59-57. Union was down by 9 at the half and played a great second half only to lose by 2.

The Bulidogs came back to capture a victory against Lee College in the only outing between the two teams. Richard Rice, a newcomer to the Union squad and Don Crain led the team in scoring with 20 and 18 points respectively.

It was on to Holly Springs, Miss. where Union again felt the crushing blows of Rust College in a 15 -point loss with a score of $51-66$.

Victory bound for Nashville, the Bulldogs trounced Belmont $79-69$ with senior Keith Reynolds leadıng the scorıng effort with 25 points, while Greg Schroeder added 22.

An exciting but disappointing Homecoming game saw Union and CBC deadlocked at $82-82$ at the end of regulation time, sending the game into overtime. Keith Reynolds scored 23 points which tied Jeff Richey's Union career scorıng mark of 1,793 points, with Greg Schroeder grabbing 28 points to reach the top score of the game. In overtime play Union fell behind the Bucs, and the contest ended in a score of Union 92 and Belmont 98.

Unshaken and ready for action the Union Bulldogs traveled to McKenzie, and whipped Bethel College in an upset 74-69. Senior Keith Reynolds wound up with 20 points which put him over the top, and he now leads the All-Time Scoring Record at Union with points totaling 1,813 points.

After 23 games and only Lane College left on the regular season schedule, Union had posted 12 wins against 11 loses. This insured the Bulldogs of at least a 500 regular season average for the first time in five years.
There were a number of surprises this year with upset victories over two Top Ten division III NCAA teams. Richard Rice, a freshman, averaged over 9 rebounds a game. Keith Reynolds broke the school scoring record and has an opportunity to score over 500 points. This year he has led his team in scoring with a 17.7 point average per game. He also was second in rebounding with 7.6 an outing.

Winston Jarrett led the team with 127 assists, 5.5 per game. Greg Shroeder added inside strength and outside shooting for 7.2 rebounds and 16.6 points per contest. Winston Jarrett, Keith Reynolds, and Greg Schroeder, the team's three seniors, have provided excellent leadership tor the Bulldogs.

In recent weeks Union's Basketball squad improved dramatically. In fact, each team in the western division of the V.S.A.C. has developed to the point that the final winner could be any one of them.
The post season tournament for the Western Division title will be played at the home courts of the first four finishers.
Since, this is Union's first year in the Conference, and there was no way to schedule enough league games, the Bulldogs have been seeded in seventh place. Without this handicap, Union would have placed third and won a homecourt matchup in at least the first game of the tourney.

Replacing three outstanding seniors from a strong group of returning lettermen will place Coach Jim Swope in an unenviable position. Next year's team will feature four seniors, three juniors, and four sophomores from this Bulldog unit. With another banner recruiting year like the last, our men should forge quickly to the top of the V.S.A.C. and again earn the title, "Union University, the home of good basketball.'
