## All-Stars Win First Annual Tin Cup Bowl




The highlight of the year came as Upsilon became the first Greek organization on campus to begin construction of new lodge facilities with completion due in spring of 1978.



The Baptist Student Union is a vital and active part of Union. It provides students with fellowship and Christian growth.








The Union University tennis team was in a rebuilding year. Several new faces competed this year. They were Ronnie Morgan, Terry White, and Chuck Summers.



The Bulldogs won the first game over Mississippi Industrial 83-70, which set up a championship match with arch rival Lambuth College. The game was no contest, however, as the Bulldogs claimed first place with an 85-67 blowout over the Eagles. Don Crain and Richard Rice were named to the All-Tournament Team.

The Bulldog streak was halted at four when they dropped two on the road, losing to Lee 84-80, and dropping to Central Wesleyan of South Carolina, 83-75. They made up for it at home by upsetting UT-Martin 95-86 in a hard-fought battle.

The Bulldogs were again plagued by a loss on the road as they were romped by Freed-Hardeman, 82-68. Union finally grabbed a road win during the Christmas break by edging Southwestern at Memphis, 93-91.

After the Christmas break, the Union Bulldogs travelled to Southwestern at Memphis where they competed in the Dixie Tournament. They made it easily past Millsaps 98-57 and then clinched first place by ousting Greenville, Illinois 94-75. Ed Smith and Ronnie Lofton were selected to the All-Tournament team and Kenny Lloyd was chosen as the Tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Union was then host to LeMoyne-Owen and upset them 94-89. Then the Buccaneers of CBC came to town and were defeated 65-62.

Union picked up two more wins over Trevecca 86-68 and Belmont 84-65 setting the stage for arch rival Lambuth. The visiting Eagles came prepared for a good fight, but left defeated as Union won the contest 73-69.

Then disaster struck as the Bulldogs dropped two close ones to Freed-Hardeman 69-66 and Bethel College 67-62.

Three more were dropped to UT Martin, 79-82; David Lipscomb, 73-79; and Bethel in overtime, 64-68.

The Bulldogs got back on the winning streak, beating Southwestern 73-67. They then travelled to Belmont and pulled out a 67-62 win. Falling off the track once again, they were defeated by CBC 65-77 and Lambuth 85-108.

After an adjustment in the starting lineup, the Bulldogs beat LeMoyne-Owen for the first time ever on the road 88-85. Homecoming brought a victory over David Lipscomb 87-71, and the Bulldogs closed out the regular season beating Trevecca 116-96.

The Bulldogs gained their way to the VSAC tournaments, having their best season in ten years. In the first game, Union downed Lambuth 86-77. They next met first place Bethel and upset them 48-47. Their final match was against LeMoyne-Owen, but the Bulldogs dropped it 76-83. This left Union with an impressive second place in the Western VSAC division.

Opening their season on the road, the Lady Bulldogs

71 by a strong Bulldog offense.

The Ladys then hit the road for a three game trip. At the first stop they defeated Maryville 96-57. Their first loss of the season was handed to them by Middle Tennessee State, 80-69. Two nights later they downed Austin Peay 82-54 to boast a 7-1 record at the Christmas break.

Back from the break, the Lady Bulldogs sought revenge as they hosted Middle Tennessee, but the Blue Raiders again proved to be competetive and downed the Lady's 92-84. Union was quick to recover, however, as they next defeated Southern Illinois 79-64 to give Coach Birmingham win number 100 as head of the Lady Bulldogs.

Union picked up an easy win, 88-52, over the University of New Orleans which set the stage for the most exciting game of the season against Lambuth College. In a game which saw the lead seesaw back and forth between the two teams, Sandra Lewis hit a five-foot jump-shot with five seconds left to give the Lady Bulldogs a 91-90 win.

Union then traveled to the University of Alabama/Huntsville where they picked up a second half 82-61 win. The team closed out January by playing Belmont College, beating the Rebelettes 75-63.






### **Trustees**

To have complete wisdom revealed to us would seem to be the ultimate achievement, but then would not man's eternal quest be over and the thrill of the search be diminished?








