## FROM SHIELD TO STORM

After threatening the Persian Gulf principality of Kuwait for overproducing oil, Iraq invaded and conquered Kuwait Aug. 2. U.S. President George Bush quickly ordered American military forces to Saudi Arabia Aug. 6-7 to deter a possible Iraqi invasion of that country.

Bush rallied an unprecedentedly broad international alliance against Iraq, including both the Soviet Union and many moderate Arab states. The United Nations Aug. 6 authorized a trade and financial embargo of Iraq. Iraqi President Saddam Hussein responded by holding Westerners hostage for four months.

As a standoff deepened, the U.S. Nov. 8 announced plans to increase the number of its armed forces stationed in Saudi Arabia and the gulf region - the bulk of the international military force - to 400,000. Finally, at the urging of the U.S., the U.N. Nov. 29 authorized the use of force against Iraq if it did not withdraw totally from Kuwait by Jan. 15, 1991.

The gulf crisis undermined an already soft U.S. economy. The crisis drove up oil prices and pushed down world stock markets. Facts on File

With the thunderous razzle-dazzle of a tomahawk missile launch, America unleashed the full fury of modern warfare on the Middle East last week (Jan. 16). The first results were spectacular and terrifying. As Baghdad's baffled defenders filled the night sky with futile pyrotechnics, the combined forces of Washington's anti-Saddam coalition steered their precision-guided munitions into the bunkers and command posts of Iraq's outgunned military establishment. It all
seemed effortless, antiseptic and surreal: casualties were very light, at least among the attackers, and high-tech gadgets in America's multibillion-dollar arsenal seemed to work with surgical lethality. Like a day at the office, one pilot said.

At home, millions of Americans tuned in to watch the high-tech sequel to The Living Room War. Washington fought euphoria, and the nation, swallowing its misgivings, rallied 'round the commander in chief. But there was foreboding, too - and intuition that this war, like Vietnam, would sooner or later go horribly wrong, or that the Scud missiles crashing down on Tel Aviv were omens of some larger Armageddon. In the chill wastes of Saudi Arabia, the troops of Desert Storm waited for the great land battle that seemed all but inevitable. Barring a miracle, they knew, the true face of war would be revealed in terror and blood. - Newsweek


## PEACE TALKS SUCCESSFUL

Celebrating the fruits of their summit diplomacy, President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev shook hands and signed a sheaf of agreements, including a conditional trade accord. During the June 1990 summit, the leaders also embraced a preliminary deal to cut long-range nuclear arms.

The centerpiece arms agreement, banning chemical arms production, was a foregone conclusion. But last-hour negotiating was necessary to settle differences on a framework for strategic arms cuts and a five-year grain deal.
The two leaders also agreed to strive for an elusive agreement on reaction of troops, tanks, and other conventional weapons in Europe.

From twin lecterns, the two presidents spoke of what they had done and what they hope to do. "I think what is happening now ... represents an event of momentous im-
portance, not only for our two countries but for the world," said Gorbachev.


## THE GERMANIES RE-UNITE

World leaders welcomed a united Germany into the international community on Oct. 3 (1990), but concerns about the balance of power tempered some European enthusiasm.
"A new era is beginning for Germany, for Europe and indeed, we hope, for the world," Secretary of State James A. Baker III declared in New York.

In a message to governments worldwide, Chancellor Helmut Kohl pledged that Germany would never again pose the territorial claims that marked Germany from its initial unification in 1871 to its defeat and division in World War II. "In the future, only peace will emanate from German soil," Kohl said.

His message came after Germany held a nightlong nationwide celebration with fireworks and music.

The nation united at the stroke of midnight when a giant German flag was raised in front of the battlescarred Reichstag building in Ber-


## COMPOSER

 PASSESLeonard Bernstein, 72, acclaimed as one of the most talented conductors and composers in American musical history; he leapt to fame in 1943 when, at age 25, he was called upon to substitute for conductor Bruno Walter in a New York Philharmonic Orchestra concert that was broadcast over radio; he quickly became musical celebrity, noted for his animated, exuberant conducting style; he served as music director of the Philharmonic, 19591969, and conducted regularly with the Israel Philharmonic and the Tanglewood Festival orchestra, among others. His compositions included Broadway musicals, symphonies, operas and operettas, and ballets, as well as a Mass written for the 1971 opening of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. He died Oct. 14 of a heart attack at his home in New York City just five days after his retirement. - Facts on File
lin. Kohl and other leaders joined in singing the national anthem.

## S \& L BAILOUT COST RISES

Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady May 23 told Congress that the bailout of insolvent savings and loan associations could cost as much as $\$ 300$ billion over 10 years. Estimates of the cost of the bailout continued to rise as the real-estate sector declined. Fraud was seen as a factor in many of the failures.

Fallout from the scandal involved
five U.S. senators associated with S \& L owner Charles Keating, and President Bush's son, Neil Bush, in separate investigations.

Commercial banks also began to feel a pinch. Federal regulators Dec. 11-17 said the federal fund insuring bank deposits would need a major cash infusion to ensure "stability." - Facts on File


## HOMELESS NUMBER GROWS

A legion of clipboard-toting counters sought out shelters, subways and steam grates on March (1990) in the broadest attempt ever to find out the extent of homelessness since it became a national disgrace in the 1980s.

Some homeless didn't mind the government intrusion. "It shows that they're starting to recognize us as humans and not the scum of the earth," said one young man on the streets.

Another homeless man said, "What are they going to use the
numbers for anyway? To tell us there ain't no homeless problem? I'm a living example that there is a problem. We need jobs, not surveys."

The U.S. Census Bureau is spending $\$ 2.7$ million to tally homeless Americans, but critics fear an undercount will allow the government to justify cuts in services.

The homeless - now estimated to number 250,000 to 3 million were asked their name, age, sex, race and marital status.


## WHITE DIES

Ryan
White, 18, a hemophiliac Indiana teenager who became a national
symbol of the difficulties faced by children with the fatal disease AIDS when he was banned from classes in Kokomo, Ind. in 1984 and shunned by his classmates after doctors discovered that he had contracted AIDS from a blood transfusion; he sued the school system and was remitted but his family later moved to Cicero, Ind. where he found greater acceptance - He died April 8 His funeral on April 11th in Indianapolis was attended by more than 1,500 people including First Lady Barbara Bush and singers Michael Jackson and Elton John. - Facts on File


## SOUTER SWORN IN

An unknown Federal Appeals Court judge, David Souter, 51, became the quiet center of a storm when President Bush named him to the Supreme Court. Legislators and lobbyists vied to solve the mystery of a man who didn't cut a swath even in his hometown of Weare, N.H.

The Harvard philosophy major proved to like books, hiking, cottage cheese - and not foretelling his stand on constitutional issues. He also likes his new chambers. - Life

## FORBES PASSES

Malcolm Forbes, 70, chairman of Forbes, Inc. and publisher of Forbes business
 magazine, which was founded by his father in 1917; he was a flamboyant millionaire who was known for his love of yachting, motorcycling, and hot-air ballooning; his fortune was estimated at $\$ 400$ million to $\$ 1$ billion - Died February 24th - heart attack at home in Far Hills, N.J. - Facts on File


## EARTH DAY CELEBRATED

On April 22, an estimated 200 million people all over the planet celebrated the 20th anniversary of Earth Day as activists pleaded for the rise of a new "conservation generation" to care for the fragile environment.
In Washington, Earth Day founder Gaylord Nelson urged more than 100,000 people massed at the foot of the Capitol to work to motivate politicians and corporate leaders to environmental action.
"I don't want to come back here 20 years from now and have to tell your sons and daughters that you didn't do your duty," said Nelson, 74, who originated Earth Day when he was a Senator from Wisconsin. "We've got to raise a conservation generation."

## EARTHQUAKE SCARE SHAKES US UP

If nothing else, Iben Browning knows how to get your attention. Browning is a climatologist and $\$ 2,500$-a-day business consultant who has Midwesterners shaking in their boots because of his rather far-fetched projection that there are " $50-50$ " odds of a major Missouri earthquake next week (Dec. 3 or 4). But then, he
has also said that tidal forces and volcanic eruptions have caused such events as the American Revolution and the fall of communism. "They think communism failed," Browning told the Chicago Tribune. "No, the weather failed." (By the way, the earthquake never happened.) - Newsweek


## FLOODS RIP THROUGH THE SOUTH

The Southern U.S. spent much of the Spring wringing itself out after weeks of flooding turned entire towns into stumps, and the toll of shattered lives was tremendous.

While parts of the Mid-West dealt with heavy rainfall and
floods, those states suffering the most damage were Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

In Texas alone, agricultural damage was estimated at $\$ 700$ million and at least $\$ 60$ million to residences.

## REDS SWEEP WORLD SERIES

The Cincinnati Reds, given no chance to beat the Oakland Athletics, needed only four quick games to win the World Series in one of the biggest upsets in baseball history.
The Reds completed their improbable sweep on October 20 (1990) in spite of losing two star players, Eric Davis and Billy Hatcher, to injuries. Cincinnati relied on Jose Rijo and rallied for two runs in the eighth inning to win 2-1, and that was it.

The Athletics' third straight trip to the World Series ended with yet another disappointment. In 1988, they lost to Los Angeles, last year's championship overshadowed by an earthquake and this season, the Reds.

## GIANTS TOWER OVER BILLS

Most Super Bowls are decided by four touchdowns. This one was decided by four feet, the difference between victory and defeat Sunday night (Jan. 27) in Super BowI XXV.
That was how far wide right Buffalo's Scott Norwood missed a field goal with four seconds left, leaving the New York Giants clinging to a 20-19 victory over the Buffalo Bills in the closest game in Super Bowl history.
This was the way Super Bowls should end, one last play, both teams holding their breaths, winner take everything - The Jackson Sun.


WEST GERMANY WINS WORLD CUP
German fans chanted and sang and screamed their pleasure on July 8 (1990) when West Germany dethroned Argentina and won the World Cup.
"Deutschland ist Weltmeister (German is world champion)," was the prevalent scream as a match that had grown ugly with fouls in the second half finally ended.
The Argentines took the loss as well as could be expected, shaking hands with many German youths at the stadium.
Many Germans headed into central Rome to celebrate the victory that came after the frustration of losses in the previous two World Cup finals, to Italy in 1982 and Argentina in 1986.


## RYAN CONTINUES STELLAR CAREER

Relying on his $95-\mathrm{mph}$ fastball, Texas Ranger Nolan Ryan, the oldest player in the major leagues, pitched a record sixth no-hitter in June. A month later the 43 -year-old superman became the 20th pitcher to win 300 games. - Life


## ROSE RELEASED

Pete Rose went to work as a gym teacher's assistant in five inner-city elementary schools as he began to perform 1000 hours of community service to complete his sentence for federal tax offenses.
Rose, 49, is living for the next three months at Talbert house, a halfway house. He went there after this release from a federal prison camp in Manor, III. where he served five months.
Because of Rose's "permanently ineligible" status, the BBWAA voted to keep him out of the Hall of Fame.

Until Rose is reinstated, if ever, his total of 4,256 hits will be in the same baseball limbo as Shoeless Joe Jackson's .356 career batting average, third highest in history. The records are in the books, but the men who made them cannot be in the Hall of Fame because of their lifetime bans. - The Sporting News


## STIENBRENNER RESIGNS

New York Yankee principle owner George Steinbrenner August 20 resigned as team's general partner. Steinbrenner had agreed to relinquish management control over the club as a penalty for his association with gambler Howard Spira. On August 23 Steinbrenner along with the U.S. Olympic Committee announced that he would become inactive as a USOC vice president. The committee said controversy over Steinbrenner's baseball problems had distracted the committee and that Steinbrenners role with the USOC would be evaluated as "the situation unfolds". - Facts on File

In only his 12 th season, Wayne Gretzky became the first player to net 2,000 goals and assists. At this pace he will more than double Gordie Howe's old record of 1,850 , scored over 26 seasons. - Life

## MPAA ANNOUNCES NC-17 RATING

Jack Valenti, the president of the Motion Picture Association of America, announced September 26 that the MPAA would eliminate its X-rating for films and replace it with a rating called NC-17, meaning that no children under age 17 would be admitted.

The move came at a time when

the x-rating was under fire from many film makers who charged that it stigmatized films as pornographic.

Unlike the old $X$, the new NC-17 rating would be trademarked by the MPAA meaning only the MPAA could use it. The lack of trademark for the x-rating had led to its use as
a promotional gimmick by makers of pornographic films even though they had not submitted their movies to the MPAA for review. As a result the X-rating had come to be associated with pornographic films, leading many movie theaters to refuse to show films with X-rating. Facts on File

## PUPPETEER JIM HENSON DIES

Jim Henson, puppeteer who created the popular Muppet characters including Kermit the Frog, Miss Piggy and Big Bird. The Muppets became universally known when they became the mainstays of the children's program "Sesame Street" which debuted on public television in 1969. In 1976 Henson created "The Muppet Show" which
was reported to have attracted more viewers than any other program in television history; Henson's feature films included three muppet movies, as well as The Dark Crystal (1982), Labyrinth (1986), and the current Teenage Muntant Ninja Turtles. Henson died May 16th of streptococcalpneumonia in New York City. - Facts on File

## MEN'S BASKETBALL

The Bulldogs started this season with a fresh outlook on their competition. Gone were some of the star players from the dominating teams: Joe Behling, Darren Henrie, Phillip Hutcheson. The Dogs knew that they had a chance to compete, and compete they did. With returning talents such as Marshall Brown, Tony Gillespie, and Paul Barrow; the Bulldogs looked to improve their conference record and shoot for the championship. To strengthen this bid even more, Coach Rick McCormick brought in three key transfers and three solid freshmen who could add depth to the roster and bring about an unstoppable team.

The Bulldogs began the season by winning the Union-Cumberland Classic led by transfer Greg Turner from Univ. of Mississippi and Marshall Brown who both showed strong success in scoring and rebounding. They then went on into intense conference play with a short tournament in the Bahamas over the Christmas holidays. There they won two of their three games against teams from Illinois, Indiana, and Georgia.

Conference play was tough once again this year even though some of the big
names were gone. Others just stepped up and took their place. Union compiled a conference record of $8-8$ with a myriad of close wins and losses. The ultimate win was an overtime victory over the NAIA's \#1 ranked team David Lipscomb on the Bulldog's home floor. This victory helped bring them back into contention for the conference crown. They finished fourth in the conference and had to face Lipscomb once again in tournament play, but this time on the match was on their home court. The Bulldogs played a tough game but were outmuscled by five points to end their season with a 17-15 record.

This season also saw many school records fall. Marshall Brown, who had had a stellar career at Union, finished the season as the all-time leading scorer at Union with 2204 lifetime points with the Bulldogs. In addition to this, he broke career records for most free throws made with 497 and for most field goals with 845. Paul Barrow also set a new record for best career 3 -point percentage with . 452 .

## WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

The Lady Bulldogs are a force to be reckoned with in the TCAC any year, and this year was no exception. After finishing last season with a $23-6$ record and eventually losing to David Lipscomb in the District 24 Tournament, the Lady Dogs were looking to drop the tournament jinx and make it to the elusive NAIA national tournament that is held in Jackson. With the leadership of seniors Kim Welch and Kim Roberts and junior Ressia Jackson, the Lady Dogs looked to use their previous experience to go as far as they could.

They started this goal off right by winning their first nine games which included the Union-Cumberland Classic, a game against 1990 NAIA tournament finalist Ar-kansas-Monticello, and two games versus Univ. of Tenn.-Martin. All in all, Union finished their year with a 26-4 overall record and a 14-2 record in the TCAC. It really was an excellent season, but they fell a little short of the goal in the end.
In addition to this great season, one of the individuals of the team established a couple of school records. Kim Welch set three 3-point records. She had the most 3 -point baskets in a game ( 9 vs . Williams Baptist AR), in a season (86), and in a career (172). Her nine 3-pointers against Williams Baptist helped the team set a record of 13 for a game.
