your return on Monday, so as to be in season for the  
Meeting of the Ex Committee in the afternoon; & I hope

ed a letter from Actor - your Convention could not be ad-  
mitted there. I wrote immediately to Bro Scott, & strange  
to tell I have received no answer as yet although I  
desired him to write as soon as he could possibly ascertain  
about a place. I think of nothing else to mention save  
that you would study economy to write on the outside of  
your letters what number of pieces they contain. I had to

94 I write to say that I have been in somewhat of a quandary since you left. You gave me so much material that I hardly knew what to use. I had some idea of leaving out Mr. Mann's address, as I do not like so many long articles in one paper, but finally concluded to put it in. Your letter from Springfield reached me this forenoon, but too late for your article on political action, as I had previously taken one from the Emancipator, the one which I supposed you wished me to publish. The notice on political action I put in. Mr Haskell rather objected to the use of his name - wanted I should put your name to the notice, but finally consented. I have reserved you 30 "letters" (papers) containing Phillips's letter, & have forwarded your paper to Calhoun as requested. [But now comes the tug of war. The Committee voted to transfer the paper to the Emancipator, & notice was given out for the paper to that effect & put in type. Bro Ela & myself thought it was better that you should be here to give the reasons for the transfer, & although Bro Brackett was rather stiff about it, yet on Ela's agreeing to deduct \$10, & my agreeing to give in \$5 of my Salary, he concluded with Bro Barnes to let us have one more
