The persecution that you have suffered since your return to America has increased our affection for you. To impeach your motives - to use the most insulting and abusive language respecting you - and to constantly pervert your intentions - was not sufficient for the enemies of freedom; - but an ignorant and infuriated mob must be rallied to commence their unhallowed attacks! But their efforts are vain. Our cause is the cause of God, and it must prevail.

It affords us great pleasure to inform you of the following resolution which, on motion of one of the members of the Garrison Society, at a recent meeting, was unanimously adopted:
