

Boston Feb 27. 1839.

Wednesday morning.

Dear Aunt Mary,

Yesterday I chanced to meet Susan Infos who offered to solve letters. I en brise the chance to send some letters of Deborah's that are here; the one addressed to me was here on Sat. but it was accid entally in our hurry omitted. Saturday was such a running fight there that I could not write as much as I wished. I went to the Free Churk Sunday morning and heard - Torrey! He pro vided a most impudent person. I dined at Channing, M. Wendell & Henry received as im posent press-letter from N. Y. signed by L. Tappan, Garrison, Lewis & Cornish. It was an attempt to defend themselves about the money etc. Mary Chapman & I went to Mr Times in the after noon. Edmund & Emily took tea here & we had much interesting conversation. Edmund has written a letter, begging for money for the N. R. Society. It is a beau tiful letter, as I think you will say when you see it. I think very highly of Edmund as a good man. Monday we had letters from Deborah by Mr Taber. A letter came for Caroline making her some prop osition about going to N. Bedford; so though the rain was pouring and the mud knee deep, I started in the mornly for Roxbury. The whole matter had been made by F. so inde bida

that Caroline could give no definite answer. She merely wrote for the requisite information. In the evening Henry & Maria called at Dr. Tollen's to see him well caged as he has taken Colver's place at the Board. As Charlie had a party Mrs Tollen invited her husband to come & dine with us yesterday which he did previous to a Board meeting. In the forenoon of yesterday I went to Miss Wootton's & had my nose & ear tried on & then to the office. In the afternoon I called at Hannett's & agreed to go there & stay some night this week. Poor Ned with I learn is quite ill, that is confined to his room & has to have every day. This Mrs. C. told her sister, but she had never seen him. I am very much troubled for him & wish I could do any thing for him, but I don't see how I can.

An exposé was read by Garrison yesterday, which was unanimously accepted, move by Phelps. It will appear in the next Liberator. By the way, I fear Phelps' doom is sealed. He has gone to Mary Parker's to board. I hardly think he will marry Mary, but he may elope. The Gazzards & Johnsons have become pretty well aware of Mary's infidelity. I shall come to Weymouth next Monday. I long to be there now, but Maria is trying to get up a meeting of the Boston Female on Saturday next, & wishes me to stay for that. Tell me that I shall bring Henry when I come & let my bird better return the first chance. Last Sunday night little Henry ~~ate~~ an apple which almost brought on a relapse in his

stop with. He nearly went into fits & for a while the
house was like Bedlam. Henry ran in for Dr Hale
who pronounced what ailed him the moment he
saw him. The Dr ran home & returned with wine
of opium & in 10 minutes he was relieved. He has
had one or two such burns before, but we did not
know what it was. Both Dr Hale & Dr Farnsworth
told Maria he ought to go up to the country at
once; so if he does not come to Weymouth he will
have to go some where else. Tell all this to Ma.
Maria received \$10, the other night from S. Peugh
of Philadelphia for the N. R. Society. I have not
seen Warren since Saturday. I perfectly long to
get out to Weymouth. I have been gone about 3
months. Write every chance three or four times before
I come out. Love to all your folks & ours.
