The object of this note, is to call the attention of the Ladies  
of Boston to the District of Columbia, the Seat of Government  
of the United States, and other Whom Congress is empowered,  
by the Constitution to exercise exclusive legislation in all  
cases whatsoever. By an act of the First Congress, the  
right of petition for the redress of grievances, was granted  
to all the citizens of 1830, the District of Columbia  
contains 6,050 Slaves, some of these are doubtless, treat-  
ed with as much kindness as is consistent with the degrading  
of their rights. But every Slave of both sexes is liable  
at any moment, to be bought, sold, and imprisoned in rows,  
flogs, and sent to the plantations of the far South, where the  
average length of life is but years. Regular and extensive  
Slave-dealers licensed by the Government, carry on a Slave-  
Trade as terrible as was ever perpetrated on earth.  
The sad facts which transpire in the slave dungeons, have been  
often and are admitted. They cannot be dispensed. Un-  
less we do by we can for the extinction of Slavery in this  
District; unless we feel fortified by our conscience and phi-  
lanthropy, unless we feel that we are partakers in the  
crime. A petition, all soon be published you. I have already  
in your own names no less than for the sake of  
yourself, your country, and the Slave, not to refuse your  
signature.
