(wh. is the N.Yk. Express), & I would
suggest your being at the station half
an hour (or nearly) before that time,
in order that you may have some
choice of seats, & ample time for all
arrangements. The time will pass
fast enough, & you won't regret having
the half-hour there. You had

take no farther thought, either a,
to a carriage at Worcester, or as
to the disposition of the baggage—
[luggage] wh. you propose to leave
there; — I will attend to both.

I would be glad of just a line
from yourself, by return mail, to
say definitely if Saturday p.m. is
the time you intend still, for making
your journey to us; — also, how
far your coming that day may be
influenced by weather, if stormy.
