speech at Faneuil Hall.

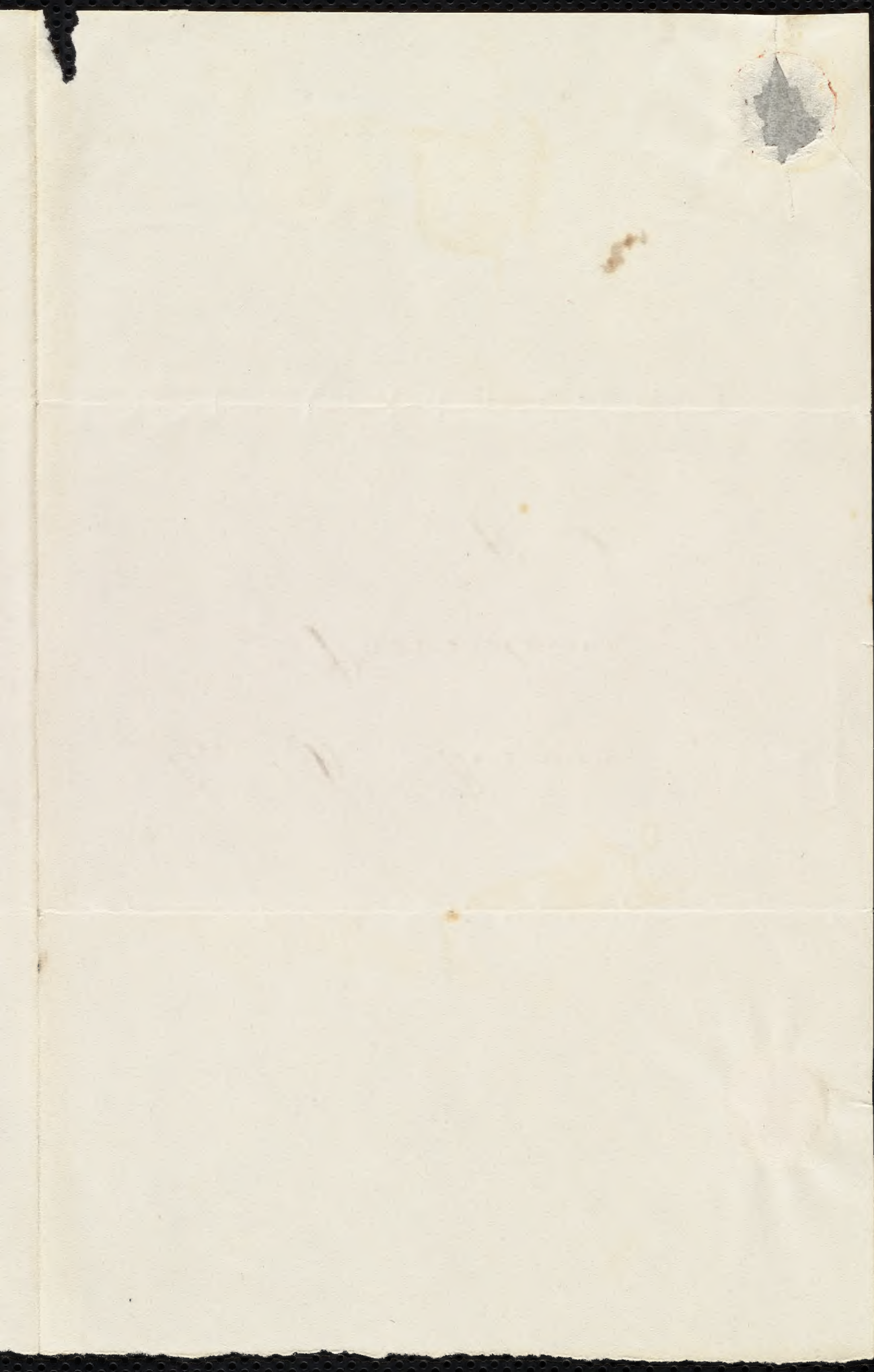
I am heartily glad to learn
