

Weymouth, Aug 22. 1848.

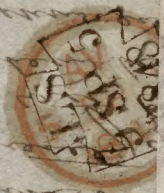
Dear Maria,

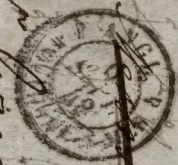
