

Leicester, June 6. 1850.

Dear Miss Weston,

The enclosed is such a good letter that, not feeling at liberty to publish it (even without the writer's name), I send it to you, with full leave to show it to whom you please.

You must understand that it is forwarded to me by Mr. Estlin, and is a copy (made by his daughter) of a letter he rec<sup>d</sup>. from Mrs. Mafie "wife of Dr. Mafie of London". She is "very orthodox", and has heretofore kept company, I understand, with the Sturges, Scobles, & other "Broad Street" gentry. Mr. Estlin thinks her one of the right sort, apparently.

Nothing was done about transporting the boxes to Worcester. Was anything to be done? I heard nothing. I brought the keys with me hither. I shall be in Boston again the last of June - perhaps before - and will then see to their <sup>being</sup> forwarded to Worcester, if desired. - or Mr. Wallcut will now. { the Box for Portland was made secure, & sent to 4 High St.
