

Boston, Sept. 9. 1857.

Dear Mr. Estlin,

Yrs. of Aug. 15. was sent to me at Nantucket, where we were holding a series of Anti-Slavery meetings. I have but just returned, and hurry to send forward the accompanying letter. I had determined upon it, before your suggestions, but this is the first moment I have been able to do it, the Editors of the Register kept my reply about 6^{or 7} weeks - then I had to get it inserted in Liberator; & it was published after I had set forth on the

town, whence I am just
returned. — I bear my
communication, as appearing
in Liberator, will be too long
for the Inquirer; and I have
no time to suggest what
parts had best be extracted.

I send the accompanying
letter to you, that you may
know first what I have asked,
& on what ground. Please
tear & forward it, when read.

I have not time for another
word, but hope to write soon.
