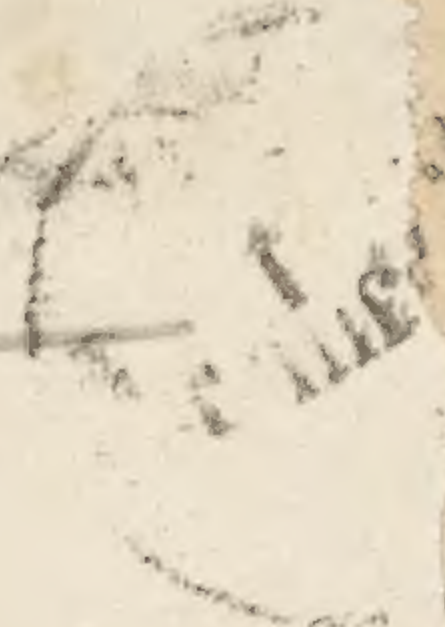


Has W.P. replied?

Dear Mr. May,

I thank you for your letter just received. If I had time, there is much that I would like to say on the great subject that fills us with anxiety at this hour — I mean, of course, the strange lurch of N. P. into the Fremont movement — but I am under the necessity of going to Philadelphia to-morrow, and have to get out copy

to last our printers till after
the 4th of July. I send you,
however, a copy of my letter
to Phillips, of which, I am
sorry to say, he has taken no
notice up to this time. He may
do so hereafter, but I fear he
will not. How he can recon-
cile it to his conscience to open
a quarrel against a life-long friend
and admirer on such grounds,
and then neglect to respond to
such a letter as mine, I am
unable to comprehend. Please
return the copy, when you are
done with it, as it is all I have.

W. P. has a letter in this
week's Independent, to which
Tilton has made a crushing
reply. I think you will get
a copy of the paper at the same
time that you receive this
