1864

Dear Mr. Wallcuth

I drop you a line to report progress. Mr. Johnson & I had a pleasant ride as far as Barre, in this State, by rail, arriving abt 4. in the afternoon. We then had a rough journey, up hills, through a rain-storm, with the temperature ^{very low,} 10 miles, to the house of Mr. Johnson's brother, where we found warmth, hospitality and pleasant society. This morning a ground was covered with snow, wh^{ch} disappeared by noon. The weather, however, remains cold. My engagements are the following.

Sunday. A discourse in the Congregational Church, in this place, in the afternoon, and a lecture to the people at large in the evening

Monday Evening, A Lecture in the Town Hall of St. Johnsbury. The people there have sent me a copy of the placard they have issued

Wednesday Evening a Lecture in Randolph.

Thursday Evening a Lecture in the State

House, to which I am invited by a joint
Vote of the two Houses.

Friday - Montpelier to Boston.

I regret that I did not come into this
region a few weeks earlier, when I should
have seen it to more advantage.

I hope you have written to Mr. Rufus
Draper, respecting a meeting at Milford,
on Saturday Evening, & a visit to
Stoughton on Sunday.

My regards to all at home. Any
letters for me might be sent to Geo.
Thompson, of Lyndon, P. O. Montpelier, Vt.
I will inquire for them when I arrive.
