A.S. Socy, as it would of course attract those who would otherwise expend their money at our tables. You will much oblige us by an early reply to this, that we may arrange our tables accordingly.

An apology is perhaps due to you for our apparent neglect of your letter. Since her Mother's death, Sarah Pugh has been sad and so much cast down that she has been unable to give her accustomed attention to the business of the fair. She wrote to me <sup>of it</sup> last week from New York whither she had gone to take her passage ~~to~~ in the Steamship Franklin for Havre - she ~~is~~ to join her brother & sister and pass the winter with them in Rome.
