There is a receipt now for the collection of whatever is due to cancel the remaining debts of the Herald; and whatever part of the above may be justly due should, very acceptable at this time. I know not whether the paper was sent to your address and taken by some friend or whether there was some mistake about the matter. So I leave the whole with you; and should any point be correct you can remit what you deem justly due by mail.
