my health & our Boston weather
I am unable to get out as I could
wish. I am anxious the matter
should be arranged in some
shape. ~~It has already~~ I am
now boarding at 5. Hayward
Place. Will it not answer every
purpose for you to see the other
members of the committee, ~~to consult~~
~~with them~~ get their opinion of what
ought to be done in this case, & get

authority from them to arrange
the matter with me, & then you
just drop in at 5 Hayward Pl,
on your way home, today or
to morrow? ~~Was it all all the~~
~~same~~

Should you do this, I will
just say, for you & the Committee's
consideration, (1) that I consider the
\$75 as due me ~~in~~ in equity
& (2) that with it, in consequence of
^{extra} expenses growing out of the sickness
of my wife, I am now ~~just~~ as much
in debt as when I entered on my
agency ~~under~~ ^{under} the Board. So that
with the \$75 & my salary both I
have only been able to meet my
current expenses. I can show you
