

Philada 7 Mo. 8th. 1841

My dear Anne Warren Weston

I have with pleasure complied with thy request, and through the aid of our friend Sarah Pugh obtained the desired copy, which I herewith send. It is due C. C. Burleigh to say for him, that he did not forget to apply early on his return to the city, to Mary Grew for it, but did not succeed in procuring it; - not I believe from any unwillingness on her part, but I cannot recollect what was the cause. I hope Mary will not be mis-organised by her intimacy with those of that class with you. She is now in Boston. We regard her as one of our most valuable Antislavery labourers, & hold her in high esteem. I think she tries to look with an impartial eye on all parties. She is surrounded by very favorable influences & manifests her good sense by withholding these. Moreover she is advancing in her views of woman's appropriate sphere. The narrow confines of sectarian prejudice cannot bind such a mind as hers.

I rejoice with thee that L. M. Child is doing so much for the cause & for woman by acquitting herself so nobly in the Editorial Chair. It is one of the best things we have done, to secure her services in that line; and she ought to be well paid.

Wm. W. Furness says the Standard is becoming one of the best papers in the country.

I am sorry thy brother did not call on us last winter as it would have given us pleasure to become acquainted with another of your family; and thy letter too I regretted to lose.

We have seldom heard from thy B- & sister since they went to Hays's. Jas. Gibbons shewed us a letter from Maria rec^d lately.

We have sympathized with them in the loss of their little Gertrude.
It is time now to have the welcome news of their return with Be-
ry's health restored. Our best love awaits them. Wendell & Ann
Phillips too - how dearly I should love to greet them all in
Boston. We have had no late accounts from St. Martineau
but fear we shall hear nothing more favorable. She was
so fully imperiled with her disease being past cure when we
were there, that I hardly expected she would live as long as she has.

Boston April 15th 1836

Dear Friends We were gratified on the receipt of yours of the 11th of last month, and regret that you should for a moment have cherished the idea that an apology was necessary for addressing us. I trust our hearts will become so closely united, by our labors in our holy cause, feeling such an earnest desire to aid each other, in every possible way, that we shall forget all those little forms of etiquette, which under other circumstances we might adhere to. Our Society held its quarterly meeting on Wednesday last, when the subject of your letter was presented, a vote was taken on the propriety of sending delegates to the Am. Society 23 were in favor of such a measure 25 opposed, our meeting was unusually small, and many who were present were unwilling to express their opinion. We are ourselves auxiliary to neither Society, and have never thought of the subject that you have been discussing, we however feel much complimented that you have felt disposed to solicit our advice which we hope you will continue to do on future occasions.

We are happy to learn that you are increasing (though gradually) in numbers, and we trust in faith & zeal. Our little band continues to increase, we propose taking some active measures to increase our fund the present year, to enable us if possible to support an Agent for Suffolk & Norfolk County. I hope you have received in this you have received the publications, which you requested us to forward.

My dear friends let us have much faith in prayer and trust in the unfailing word of God "let us not be weary, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."
