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My Dear Brother.

Your favor of 5th did not reach me until yesterday. All who feel interested as I do in the anti-slavery cause are apt to think there is need of special effort in their immediate vicinity. I am not able to say however that you are more needed in Connecticut than you are in N. Hampshire. I can only say that the people in this state are lamentably cold & inactive in view of our oppressed & downtrodden countrymen. — There is one reason why I am willing you should defer your visit awhile. The ministers & many of the people who have been brought to see that the Colonization Society will not do are still hoping to find out some other way than the straight plain way of right. Of course the proposed Convention, to be held on tomorrow, is looked upon with expectation. It will be well therefore to wait until the laboring mountain has brought forth, so that the attention of the people may not be diverted from the truths we urge upon them, by the anticipation of something to come better than the truth.
