

Charlestown, Aug. 2. 1845.

My dear Debora,

I must write you a few hasty lines, to tell you how delighted I was to get your letter, on Monday evening, and how happy we shall all be to see you again. I thank you a thousand times for your letter - it was very interesting - the account of the party, pic-nic & every thing else - Now it will only be a week, before we see you, but I can hardly wait until then. Hale will be very happy, I know, to send Maggie over with you, since she brought you safely, the last time - Can't you stay all night, when you come? I hope Caroline will come too. Remember we shall be very glad always to see any of your family - Lessy, of course, included with the rest - yesterday was your glorious first of August, and I suppose you were enjoying it at Fall River, and you will tell me all about it, when you come - Hannah was accused, the other day, of being a thorough going abolitionist, and if she is, I am, for she is not a bit more strong in the cause, than I, and neither of us can boast of works -

Before I forget it, I will tell you what this, & this, & this, & this, &c was - I did not say it in presence of Mr Greene, but after he

left. What occasioned the remark was Mr Beane's saying, "if you had only been more frank & open in the first place, Miss good, I think it would have saved all this trouble." I had a very pleasant letter from Sue Rodman on Tuesday or Wednesday - She said she thought Mr B. would stay at least one term more - Well I hope they will be happier wherever they may be, than they have been in New Bedford - Sometimes, but say it not in Gath, I think I should have preferred staying and taking my chance of being any body or nobody, to leaving, if I could have foreseen the results - If I had only been more sauy, in the first place, perhaps, it would have saved the trouble - but I will leave all the ifs, and only add how much I rejoice in the hope of seeing you - Love to the Emersons and all other kind friends - Your conversation upon "sick" must have been highly entertaining - Oh it does, in spite of myself, make me sad to think of the course of events with the Beanes for the last year - However wrong they have been, they have suffered too much - Caroline will be particularly pleased with this strain, & I have

no more time for it or any other strain, but
must run to Boston with my letters. I have
just written to Louisa, & have asked her to visit
me in her vacation, but I fear she will
not come - With much love to Caroline
