My Dear Debora

I thought of you a great deal after you were gone, and at nine o'clock we all concluded that "poor Debora" had got there. Tuesday the sixth. This morning Mr Bailey called and brought with him Rev Henry Collier who wanted Caroline to go and teach in a school in Philadelphia and she thinks some of it. I will say but little of it for I suppose that all the rest have mentioned it. She will not want her till spring, they think it will be a good plan for Anne to go to New Bedford you will be at New B and have Emma with ~~you~~ and I shall have to stay here and go to Mr Bailey which I shall like. I have not found your thimble yet but I have not looked for it much. I am busily employed in making needle-books for the fair. We had a new scholar come to day Miss Willis's sister she is older than she is. Caroline is going out to Roxbury to night to see Mr Bailey about the school. Mary Anne has not come back yet we are afraid she is sick though we inwardly rejoice that she is not sick here I went down to the dye house this morning to get my cloak but it was not done. I was rather disappointed. I meant to have written a very long letter but Warren has come home and I am going to take the bundle down to the mow. I want you to exonerate Knapp for he sent the bundle about a quarter of an hour after you were gone I can't help thinking what a good time you will have reading it Warren is going so with much regret I must close my letter for I had a good deal to say to you. You my give my love to any body you see Mrs Tabor if you have a chance to and take a great deal of love to yourself
