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Boston, Aug. 19, 1857.

My dear Fanny:

Since I wrote to you last evening, I have continued quite unwell, and now feel very feeble and feverish, though I am slightly better of my complaint.

Your mother and I have just returned from the Worcester depot, where we expected to meet Franky, on his return from Capdale, but we were disappointed. He will probably come in the course of to-morrow.

Uncle Henry Anthony and aunt Charlotte have been making us a visit to-day, together with Henry's brother John and his wife, from Cincinnati. They returned to P. in the afternoon train.

Should I be well enough, I shall endeavor to take the first train for Newburyport, on Friday morning - 7.30 - and shall hope to see <sup>you</sup> a little after 9 o'clock.

Aunt had quite an ill turn to-day, after dinner, bleeding very freely at the nose. She looks wretchedly, and yet Dr. Geist encourages <sup>her</sup> to believe that she will recover. I see no change, except for the worse, since he came the first time.
