accuracy and fullness of  
their historic details and  
statistics, and though they  
do not yet indicate that  
he is fully up to the appre-  
hension of all the heights  
and depths of the Christian

principles involved in our  
Anti-Slavery Enterprise I  
can assure you ~~he is~~ is rapidly  
on the way to it. — Many  
a time, of late as I speak  
with him on the patient,  
long suffering, self denying  
labors of yourself, and  
Phillips and others for the  
past thirty years or more  
in the advocacy of those  
and their real issues  
principles have I seen the  
sympathizing tears filling up  
his old eyes! He is  
manifestly progressing  
as you will see by the few-  
erous concessions he makes  
in the enclosed article to the  
principles and claims of abo-  
litionism. — I submit the

whole article to your judgment; and doubt not he will be gratified in seeing a portion of it in print through the "Liberator." —
