Amasa Paine and E. Henry some time ago. I think
that Rhode island people are good folks though they
may not be the most perspicacious in the world any-
more than your humble servant. Only I am natu-
rally so magnanimous you could think how jealous
I would be of the doings of the Scotch anti Slavery
people. with their boxes big enough to hold a
cattle of slaves. You can't think what great things
we fancy we should do if we were rich
