the death of our dear & favour-
ate Aunt Sewellyn. The Family
are plunged in the profound-
est grief. My Mother, now
that the greatest tie to England
is broken; is very wishful
to return to us. They may
probably return in Decr.
and perhaps not till Spring.
We are very anxious for their
safe return, we miss them very
much, Along for their presence
& Council.

seems tied again to "old
England, where is warmly
welcomed & warmly abused.

faction of seeing your labours
brought to a happy end.
