My Dear Mrs. Chapman,

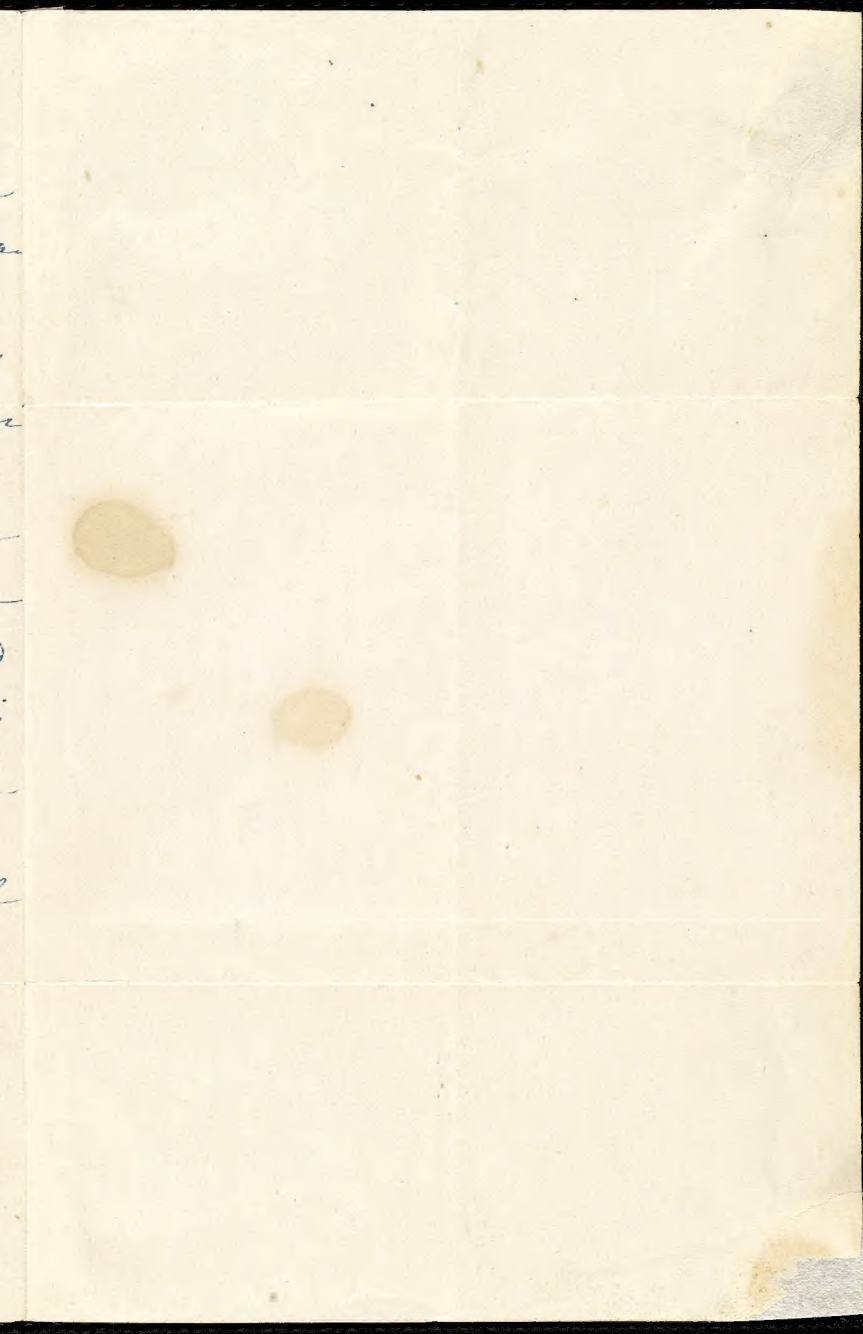
Please ac-
