Philad<sup>a</sup> 14th mo 27. 1867

My dear & respected friend  
W<sup>m</sup> Lloyd Garrison

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I have just received thy favor of Jany 15<sup>th</sup> which I find unacknowledged. It remains worthy of my endorsement & I sometimes feel like arrogating to my finite wisdom the little word we see alike -

Learning of thy contemplated journey I thought thee might be willing to carry with thee, so far as may may open, our deep convictions of pure peace principles.

Society organizations are of little moment & yet may aid, while I do not feel like asking thee to proclaim for any particular "Universal Peace Society", will offer to give thee any documents that may in thy judgment seem useful. I will mail sample copies of a few at hand if thee requires more let me know, though I suppose thee needs nothing of this sort. To be sure we want a representation abroad. We would like some hold or some reliable correspondence with the principal foreign countries. But I feel that thee knows just what I for one feel & want. I as an earnest convinced & humble worker for the truth, the welfare of the great human family & the establishment of something better than we have at present, as I live, as I feel I am impressed, I must do something, even if but little, while the hood of life is given me by a loving Father. This spirit of

my little life induces me to open the matter for thee  
to act upon just so far as time & opportunity may unite with  
thy always sincere & peaceful heart.

I have recently been presented with the Address of  
the Women of Exeter Eng 1780 names to the Women  
of Philad some years ago & also the original Exposition  
of Sentiment on Slave, to which I notice thy well known  
signature. I expect to take them to our New York  
Meeting Augt chprox. How we would value thy presence.

These are days of work. A few evenings since we  
had a large meeting on the Indian subject. Last evening  
the colored people celebrated their admission into the  
Cars! They generally keep up their celebrations to  
a late hour but last night surpassed their record.  
From 7 in the evening till 3 this morning - They  
had my poor self to make a few remarks & kept me  
waiting till 11, when I did little more than present  
them with one of the old boards - "Colored people admitted  
in ~~these~~ car" Much I held against the American flag  
& asked them - "How does that look?" Their excitement  
was beyond control - But I left before the feast - a little  
after 11. Then they went on a body & serenaded Mr.  
Jorney then returned to the Hall. had a concert & then  
danced! It sometimes seems strange how even backward  
people are brought forward by the force of events - Still I do  
feel so much for the cause, that I suppose we must  
sacrifice self - My wife is not right well - For I most her  
throat has troubled her. Our Sister Lydia in Boston has  
just shed additional sunshine into our love circle - with  
her little daughter. My love to thy family and many blessings  
on thee & good wishes for a safe journey throughout - thy fr. & afft love
