My dear Sir

I am more than obliged
to you for having added my name
to the address of Mr Garrison
some twenty years ago when I
was a young man I spent
an afternoon with him in Mel-
marth. He was the guest of
my employer, Mr William Miss
Painter, now a missionary in Wam-
pis, and I was invited to be
of the party. Frederick Douglass
was present, and either the Mr
Murray Mason, or some other
temperance advocate. Whom
he was I remember he always
prefaced his questions with -
I wish to know for I am the
father of Temperance Societies

in Glasgow. I will never
forget his fascinating calm
self-possessed manner. He im-
pressed my youthful mind
greatly, and ever since I have
ranked him among the great
men whom I have met.

I have another reason
for being glad. Throughout the
whole course of the American War
the Herald was one of the few
papers that went heartily
in for the North: and so much
was its advocacy appreciated
that a number of Scotchmen
in New York, sent me my
valuable red-headed staff
with a suitable inscription.
Many thanks therefore for the
trouble you took in this
matter.
