29 I do not know whether Wendell Phillips's speech is in type for the Annual A. S. Report. But I hope it is, that he has had done that no injustice is done to Mr. Mann, by misquoting his remark when interrupted in Congress. Mr. Mann did not ask not to be interrupted, strictly speaking, for he permitted Mr. Lathrop to state his point. He only asked ~~not~~ not to be interrupted farther. If Mr. P. would introduce this word farther, he wd. be strictly accurate, & avoid all difficulty. I have reason to know that Mr. Mann feels that injustice has been done him - & on a hard reading of the passage can not be surprised.
