My dear Sir

My brother John is visiting  
the United States & Canada  
shortly, intending to leave by  
one of the Steamers early in next  
month, & of course is anxious  
to see a little of American society  
& their institutions, & hear  
something pro & con about their  
"peculiar" one. I thought you  
might perhaps have no objection  
to give him a few lines of  
introduction to some of your  
leading antislavery friends in  
Boston or New York, so that  
he may hear from the quarters  
some account of the movement,  
& see what is doing in this great  
national struggle. I should have  
given him a few lines myself

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of Garrison, but saw so little  
of G, when here, that I scarcely  
felt sufficiently intimate, &  
my knowledge of Mr May Jr,  
has been so slight, (only a single  
letter between us), that I thought  
you might know him much  
better, or some other active friend  
in the cause. I hope you will  
not think me very intrusive  
or troublesome, but I was anxious

for my brother to see some-  
thing of the movement, in which  
some of us here, now feel deeply  
interested. our friend Miss  
Carpenter has given my brother  
an introduction to the Rev.  
H. Waterston. I intend to give  
John a few lines to Douglass.  
Should you have a letter or two  
to send to N York or Boston  
my brother will be, I am sure most

happy to convey it across the  
water, if this is considered fair  
Some liberal Post Office managers  
He visits New York first, & may  
perhaps stay there some time, unless  
the heat drives him away, & he will  
then visit Boston & Canada etc.  
I begin to be afraid this may not  
find you at home, remembering  
the Association & nothing this  
week, I wish I could have been  
there this year, but have other  
duties at home, we have our  
Sunday School gathering  
today, & I hope to visit & speak  
in the Autumn at the Opening  
of the new Chapel there. When  
can you pay us a visit in the  
North, & see our beautiful building  
& hear our excellent Minister! we  
had a most splendid eloquent discourse  
from Mr. West night, our Law

sure you would have been  
delighted with - but you not  
make an excursion to see the  
beauties of York & the  
North of England this summer  
with Miss Satter, we shall be  
very glad to see you in either  
Aldem Square, or your Terrace  
friends, will also be glad to see  
you; Mrs Josiah Buckton is  
not a few minutes walk from  
our house, she has been quite  
an acquisition to our family  
circle, so busy & amiable  
they are taking tea with us to  
night, prior to her sister  
leaving Leeds tomorrow for  
Stardaff - But I must stop this  
very unexpectedly lengthy note, &  
with kind regards to Miss Satter  
which my wife unites, believe
