My dear Sir

Since I wrote you a few lines from
Irkly in May last, I have been somewhat
busy with sightseeing & a little Antislavery
work. I spent ten days in our great Metropolis
during the World's Fair in May & much
delighted I was with it; I only wish I could
have met you there, & some of your fellow
workers in the A. S. cause; my visit there
prevented me meeting & being introduced
to one of your friends, a member I see
of the Mass. A. S. Society & one of its council,
Mr Charles Hovey, who was on a visit for
a few days to this County on business,
& I had been promised an introduction to
him; I should much have enjoyed seeing
him & hearing all about your movements in
Boston &c &c. I now write these few lines

lines, only a few minutes to scan the Steamers
to apprise you of having sent to Crosby &
Nichols, the Publishers in Boston, by this
Post, three copies of a Resolutions passed
at a Meeting of our Congregation last Sunday
at New York you will find inserted in the

spoken of by our excellent Minister Mr
Wickham; then appears just now a good
deal of excitement on this topic in this
country amongst the religious Wals; would
it were as in your Land of Liberty. Our
congregation also has sent an excellent
letter to Dr Dewey on this subject, particularly
calling to his mind his once on spoken views
on Slavery, & an invitation to him fifteen
years since to accept our Pulpit, &
our deep regret at his present position
& his late most melancholy removal.

I have sent copies of the Inquirer this week
to Drs Dewey, Furness, & Dr Gillman of
Charleston & Mr Gray of ^{the} A S Standard New
York; if you have some other friends to
send one to, whom it will benefit to see, I
send you a second copy. Mr Estlin I presume
keeps you fully alive on all matters of
this kind passing in the country. Believe me

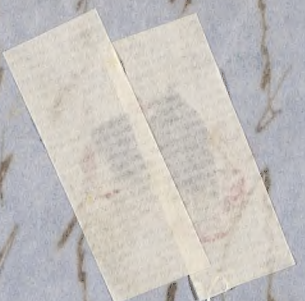
