

Whitby 12 October 1833

My dear Sir

As usual I have resorted to the sea side for
a few days after forwarding our annual contribu-
tion from Leeds to the Bazaar. I have deferred
writing you with particular views of the Box until
I should have had time to see whether for the
Box is addressed as usual to you sent by our
friends Messrs. Spring & Co of Liverpool by one of their
vessels. I have not heard whether it has been
sent or the contrary. The bills of lading will be
forwarded by the vessel as usual. I have seen the
list in their note & am glad that they will only charge actual
expenses in Liverpool as that I hope you will be
satisfied with. I am a little opposed to this occasion for perhaps
the words of the note mentioning in my note to the ship
what the contents of the Box were for & that for as
with a cause of supply charitable work that would
charge as low as possible. The Box is a considerable
larger than the year then each of my friends understand
I might consider the receipt & I hope may prove all the
more acceptable for information of the contents and that
as near as necessary for your guidance. The list of names
