My dear Sir,

Allow me to congratulate you on  
your safe arrival in the Old Country, and to  
express a hope that your sojourn here may  
in every way be pleasant and profitable to  
you. The great festival of our religious  
Anniversaries have been held, as you will  
perceive, by the enclosed paper, so that you  
need not hurry from Scotland. The sittings  
of the Anti-Slavery Convention will commence on  
Tuesday the 13<sup>th</sup> June - the Anniversary Meeting of  
the British and Foreign Anti-Slavery Society will  
be held on the 21<sup>st</sup> of the same month, and  
will be followed by the Meeting of the Peace  
Conventions. Had you been here a fortnight  
sooner you would have been in time for
