

Phil 30 month 24<sup>th</sup> 1840

Respected Friend having an opportunity of  
sending a few lines by our friend Isaac  
Winstow, I embrace it. I am about closing  
my business in this city to remove to  
the country to live. and amongst the unsorted  
business I find those banners I sent you some  
time since. I have this week the greater part  
of this winter and being reduced in my  
circumstances by losses and one being over-  
taxed with extraordinary labour I am obliged  
to get all my money in and having put  
those banners at what they cost for making  
and that being cash out of pocket I should  
like very much to have it closed. I should think  
there could be no difficulty in parting with  
them, if the old Society should take them  
at 5 dollars they could turn them to an advantage  
and I think that should be about ten dollars  
less than I paid for them. I believe she has the bill  
and can tell. She must excuse the manner I  
write to her about this matter I do it because  
I feel a freedom to do so on account of my  
being so allied to good monks. if amongst  
you the banners can be purchased you can  
redact the 5 dollars for two numbers of  
the Liberator and send me an order on the  
office here and I can get the money. if nothing  
can be done you can send them back  
and oblige your friend and well wisher
