Dear Sir,

The members of the Providence Anti Slavery Society, feeling duly impressed of the importance of disseminating correct views among their fellow citizens of the sentiments entertained by them, are desirous of making a great effort at their Annual Meeting to dispel the prejudice against this righteous cause, which they believe exists to as great an extent in this city as in any other in New England.

In pursuance thereof the undersigned were appointed a Committee by the above mentioned Society to make such arrangements as they should deem proper for the suitable celebration of their first Annual Meeting. They therefore earnestly solicit your attendance at that time (which is on Friday the 8th of November next) for the purpose of introducing such resolution or resolutions as you may wish to support in addressing the Meeting. The Committee regret that the limited means of their Society will not warrant them in offering you an equivalent for your time & the expense they may occasion you, but they trust that you will be rewarded by Him who careth for us all.
