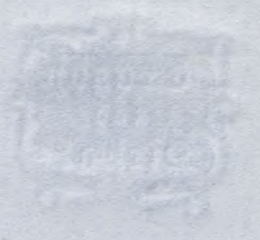
In case your personal attendance should be impracticable, a letter from you, to be read at the meeting, would serve the cause, and excite general interest.
