Very Dear Friend

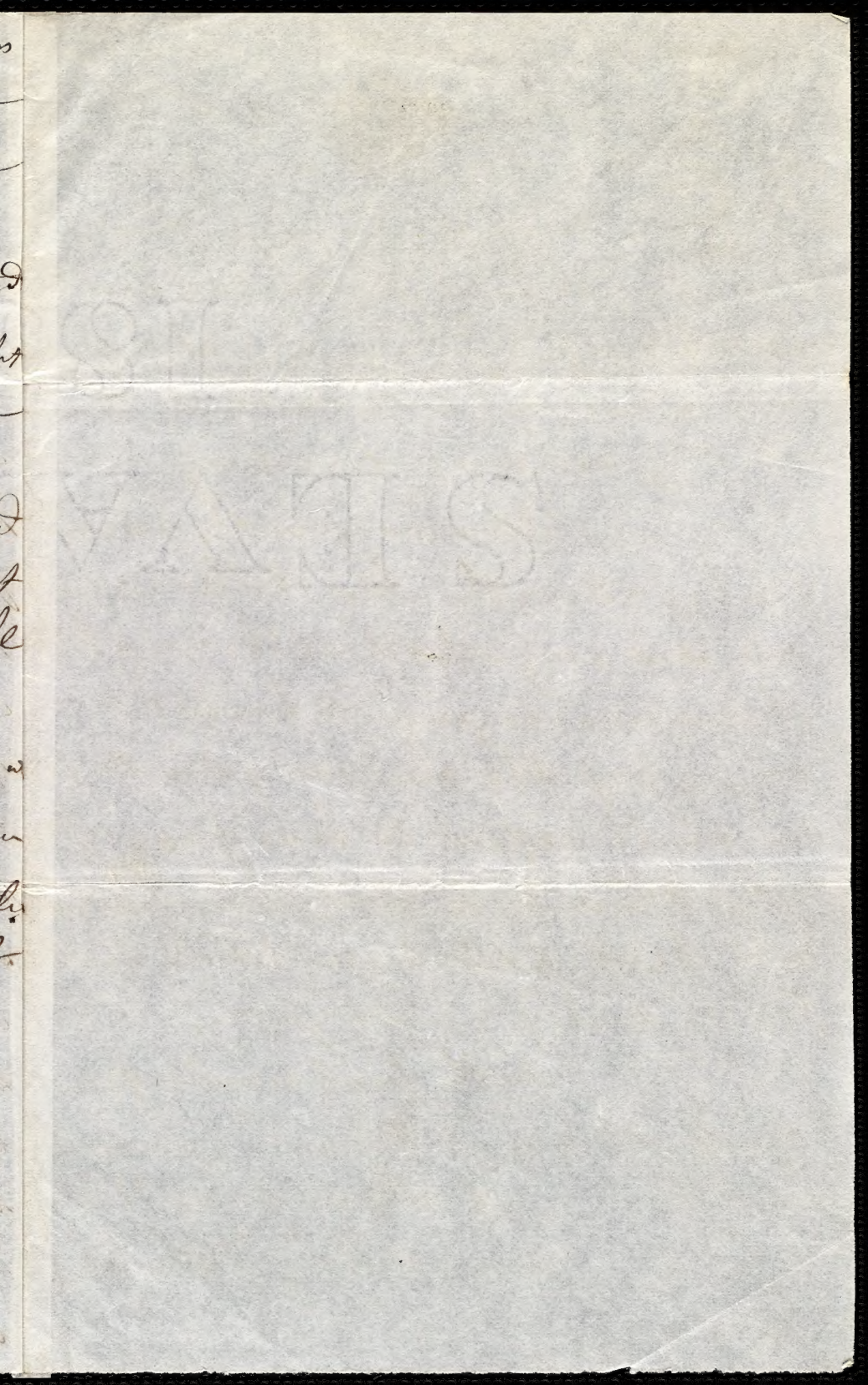
I write to say that we

struggle may well long for the day of
deliverance, for whilst none of us trust
shall become "weary in well doing," still
we have a right to long for the day when
the enslaved shall be free, in the signs
of the times there is certainly much to
encourage abolitionists to press on towards

their mark, would that all slaveholders
would follow the example of Mr. Auld,
still whether they do or not it shall
be done for them ere long, in these
days as in those of old, the true hearted
reformers are few in number their fight
is a hard one but with truth on their
side they are sure of victory.

We were greatly pleased
& delighted with Mrs. Follen's visit
she was very short with us, still
it was encouraging to hear her
accounts of the success of the Bazaar
we shall expect to hear from you
