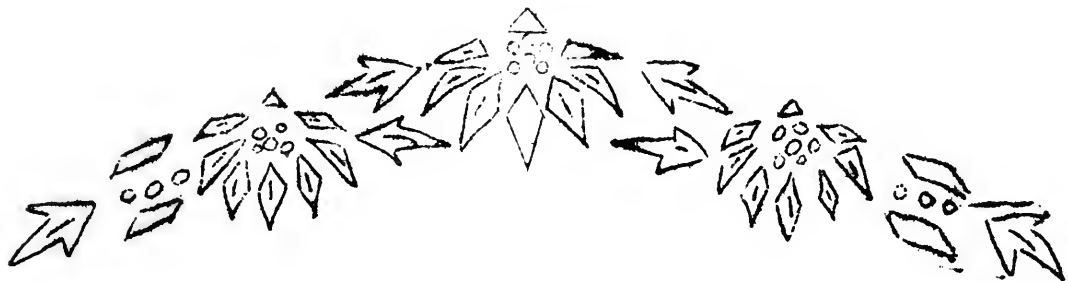

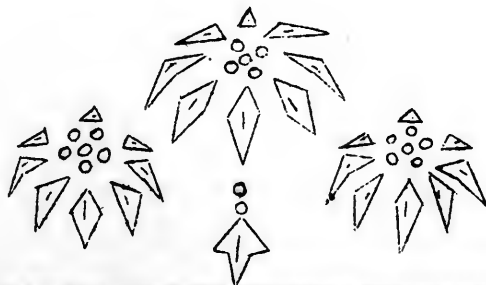

THE HISTORY OF THE
REPUBLIC OF THE UNITED STATES

The history of the Republic of the United States is a story of growth and expansion. From the first European settlements on the Atlantic coast to the westward migration across the continent, the United States has grown from a small collection of colonies to a vast, diverse nation.
