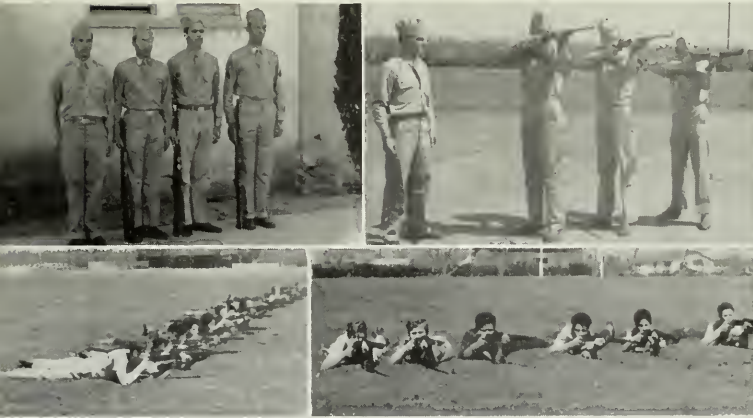


## JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

## RIFLE CLUB

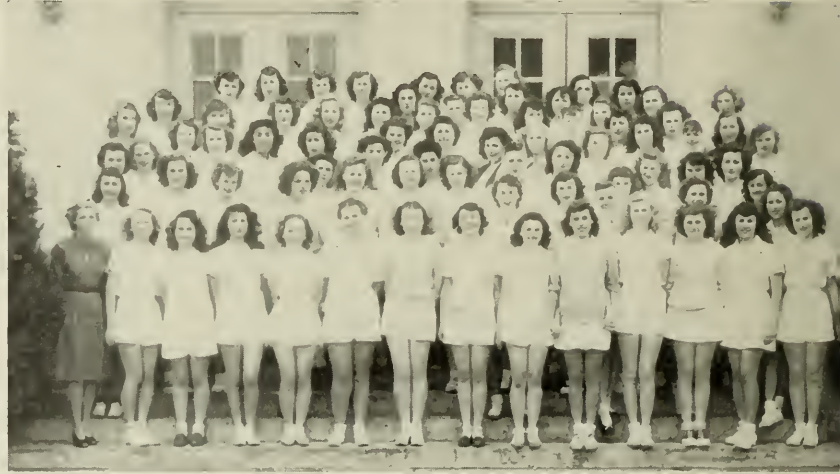

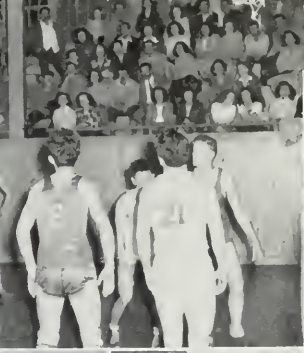
