## Ceramics, Jewelry Classes Add To Art Department

New additions to the Arts and Crafts Department came in the form of two new courses, entitled ceramics and jewelry with Mr. John Meyers teaching the two new courses.

Ceramic students experiment with clay and glaze, involving both wheel and hand building techniques of pinch and coil.

The jewelry courses specialized in use of materials, tools, and techniques in the field of contempory metal arts. Students enrolled in jewelry endulged in such projects as copper rings and one and two piece pendants.

Varsity Baseball saw eight of her returning lettermen who last year had averaged .300 but this year few batted near that.

One of the outstanding players was Ray Sanchez who tied the league record in pitching with a $5-2$ record for the season.

Said Coach Glenn, "We had a good defense, and the pitching was good. We left many runners on the bases and if we could have had the hits, we could have done as well or better than last year.

The Varsity squad ended the sea-

For the first time since 1939 Liberty was declared outright champion baseball team of the league. Liberty had the highest batting average and had won the most games of any other team or in the history of Liberty.

At the Annual Baseball Banquet Most Valuable, Pete Barrera, and Most Outstanding Defense and Captain, Frank Rosas were announced.

Liberty had four on the EBAL selections. Jack Upton was the first Lion ever to win the batting championship with a 452 average. Merle Knight tied the League record with four triples, two in one game. Pete Barrera was in pitching with a 5-0 record and Frank Rosas, most outstanding defense player.
The Lions ended the season with a 10-2 league record.
