

























A new experience for the band was the November 7 trip to Stanford University for Stanford Band Day for pre-game ceremonies.





International Christmas is annually sponsored by members of the AFS Club organization, only one of their various activities.




Supervising the basketball team was Miss Barbara Tescher. For this

































For the first time the Wrestling team had their own separate banquet. Captain George Zamora and Most Valuable Roy Rios were elected by the team.


This year a new coach was added to the Wrestling Staff. Coach Robert Gonzalez took charge of the Junior Varsity squad.







Another clinic was attended at the end of the 1969-70 school year. Held in San Jose the one day clinic introduced the girls to rally squad.



son with a 6-6 league record and a 9-10 non league record.


For the first time since 1939 Liberty was declared outright champion baseball team of the league. Liberty had the highest batting average and had won the most games of any other team or in the history of Liberty.






