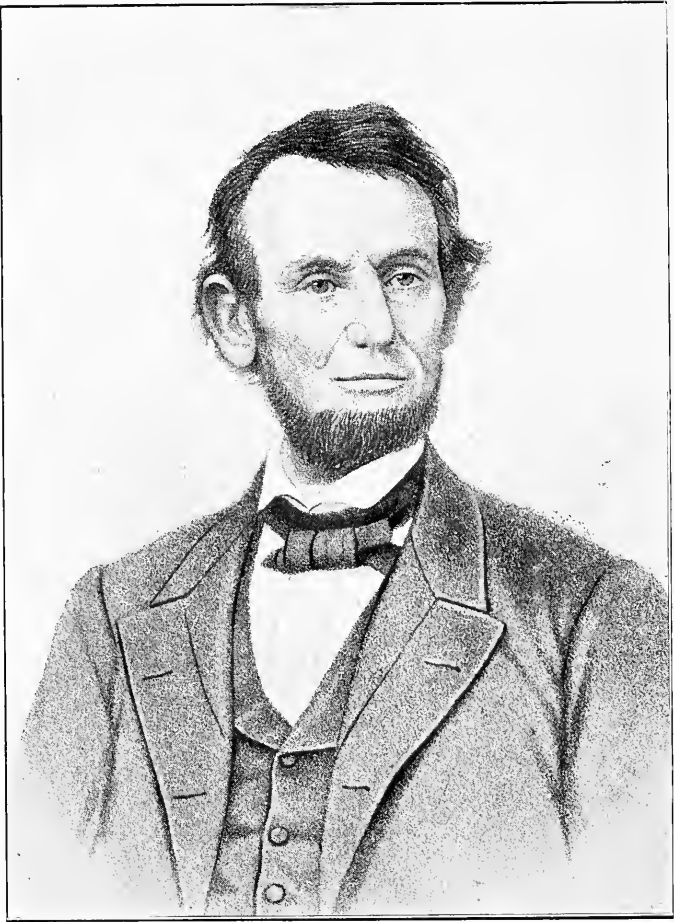

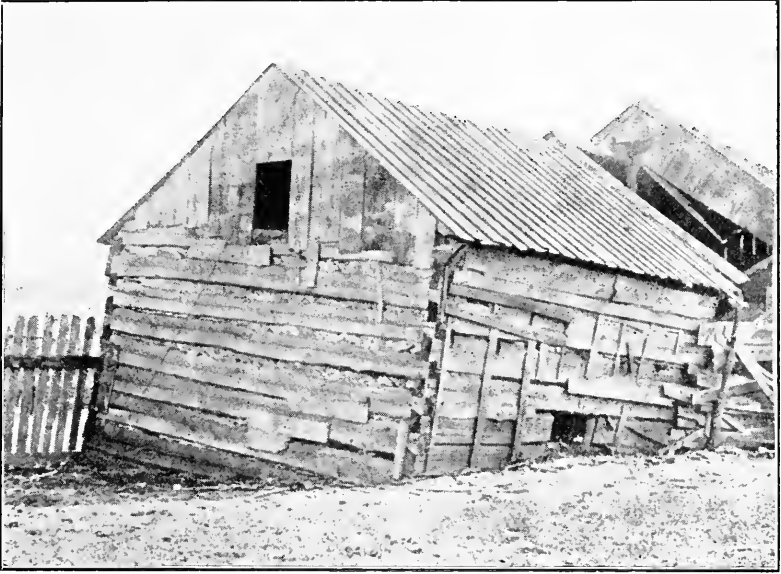

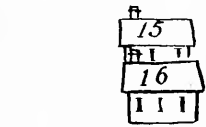

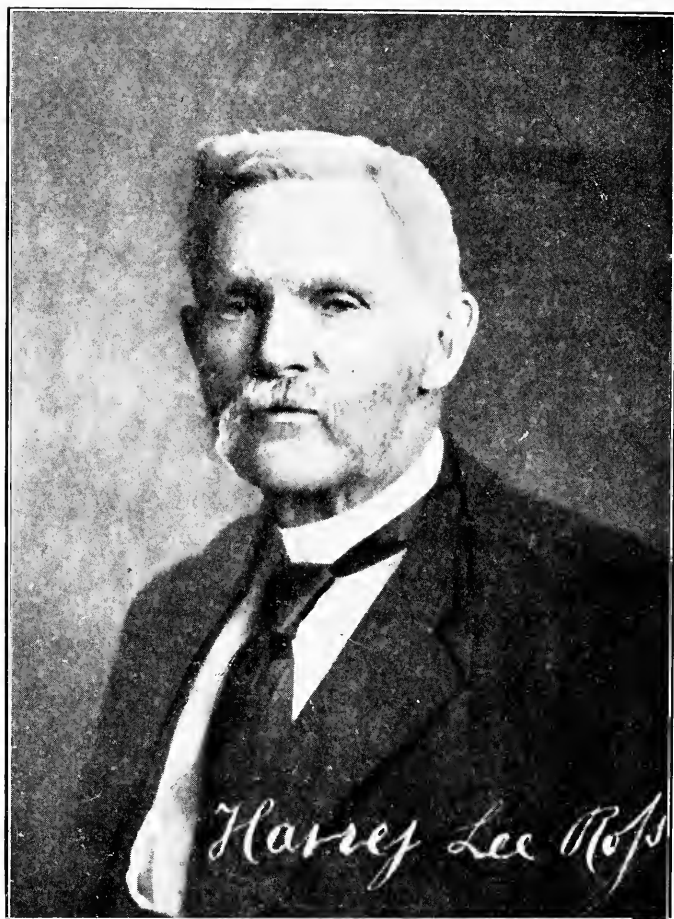


BRANCH RUNNING EAST
