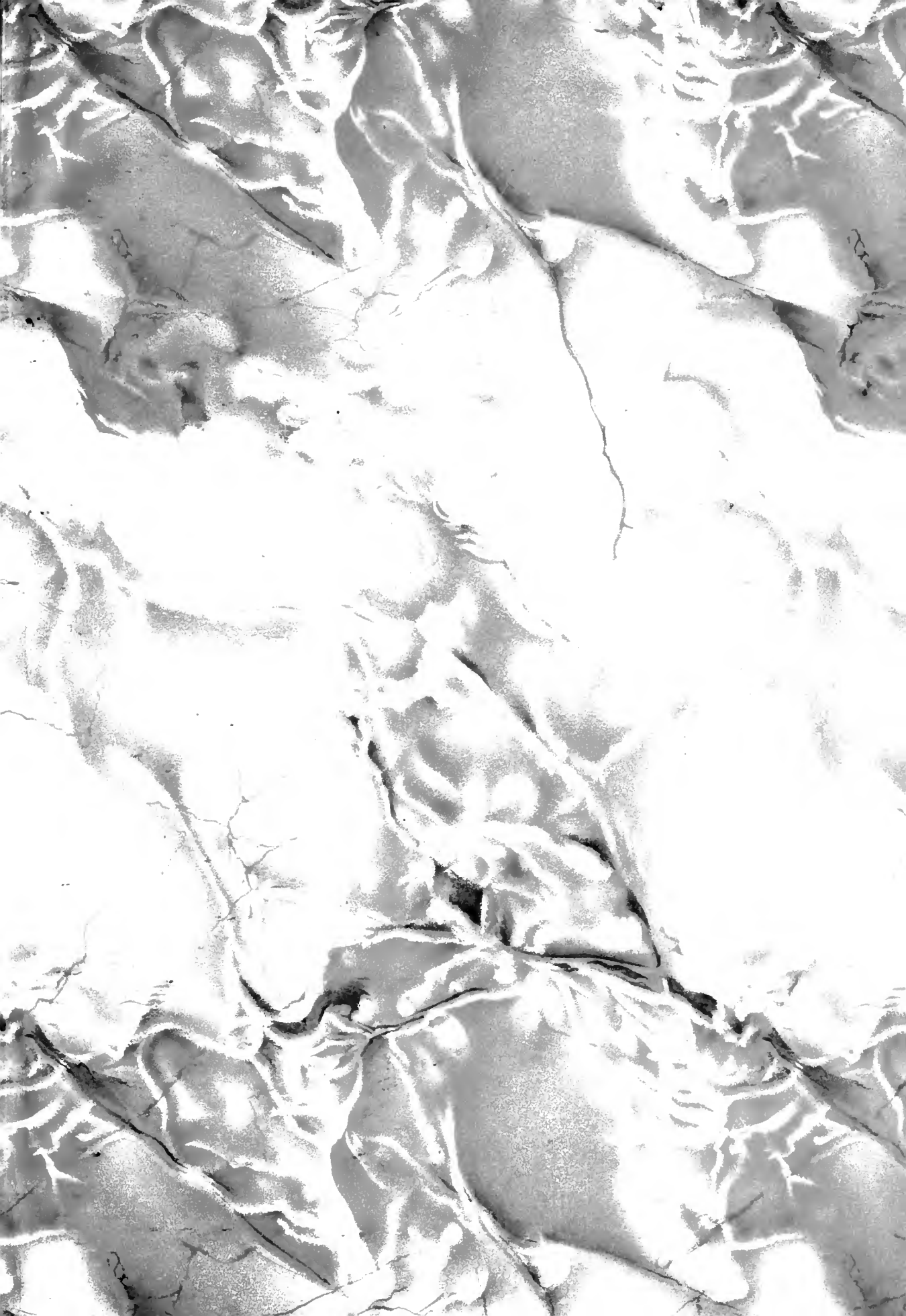


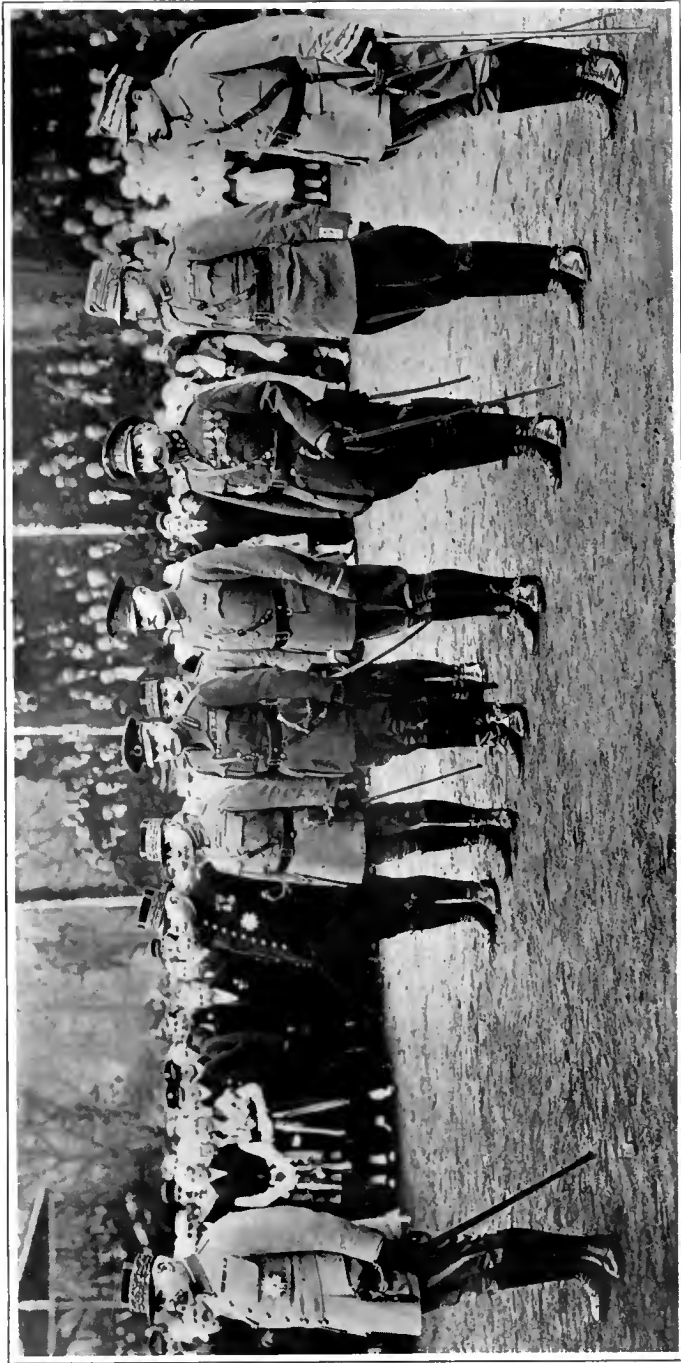

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FOREWORD

Immediately after the signing of the armistice, and the consequent orders of the War Department as to the manner and time of closing the records of the Selective Service boards throughout the country, Mr. H. E. Torrance, chairman of the Local Board for Livingston County, recognizing the advisability of preserving for local history certain parts of the records of that office, took steps toward effecting an organization for this purpose. This proved not so difficult as similar undertakings in some other counties, for the Board of Supervisors of Livingston County responded whole-heartedly to Mr. Torrance's suggestion that this body was peculiarly fitted, by virtue of its county-wide representation, organization and authority, to assume responsibility for the task of compiling data as to the participation of Livingston County in the World War, with special emphasis to be placed upon the individual service rendered by the men and women of the county who wore the uniform of the soldier, sailor, marine, or nurse.

At the meeting of the Board in February, 1919, a committee was named and empowered to proceed with the work of collecting the necessary data for the proposed record. The following men were appointed to this committee: J. C. Corbett, H. A. Miller, A. F. Bauman, D. M. Lyon, F. D. Barton, J. W. McDowell, Thos. M. Walsh. The vacancy caused by the death of Mr. McDowell in September, 1919, was filled by J. T. Cox. This committee has been at all times in closest sympathy with the project of giving to Livingston County a permanent record of her part in the war, and it was only through their unqualified support that this book was made possible. Early in the history of collecting this data, the Board sanctioned the proposal of the committee that the material secured be published in the form of a memorial book, dedicated to those who had served, and a copy given to each ex-service man or woman. To this end great care has been taken to secure all records, but for various reasons this has not been possible in all cases; in many instances this is due to the fact that men who enlisted or were inducted from this county were transients, and their home addresses were unknown; again, it has been difficult to convince some diffident persons that a record of their services is a heritage due the coming generations, just as their service was not a personal thing, but was done for humanity. It is regrettable that it is possible to give only the name of a number of these men who have served so well.

The Board of Supervisors and the editor of this volume wish to acknowledge the co-operation of the interested people of the county who have helped in the

preparation of this record by bringing before the committee the names of service men and women, and who have assisted in securing records from many of these men. They wish also to thank the War Records Section of the State Historical Society for suggestions as to collecting and organizing the material for this book; the Wynkoop Hallenbeck Crawford Co., New York City, for valuable suggestions and for the use of cuts; William J. Byrne, author of the Deck School Log, for permission to re-print from that book; the newspapers of Livingston County which have given publicity to the undertaking, and have permitted re-printing of soldiers' letters and articles of general interest; those persons who have generously loaned photographs for reproduction; the chairmen of the various war work committees who have submitted reports of the activities of their respective committees; the Local Board for Livingston County for use of certain records; the publishers for valuable suggestions, and a more than professional interest in the successful production of this record; and all other persons who have made this work possible.

A MESSAGE TO THOSE WHO MOURN

Dinsmore Ely, Chicago aviator, was killed in France in the spring of 1918. The closing paragraph of his last letter to his parents, dated Paris, April 3, 1918, expresses so well the spirit in which our brave lads fought and fell, that it seems to have a personal message in its classic simplicity for all who had to face the loss of one they held dear. The letter closed thus:

“And I want to say, in closing, if anything should happen to me, let’s have no mourning, in spirit or in dress. Like a Liberty bond, it is an investment, not a loss, when a man dies for his country. It is an honor to a family, and is that the time for weeping? I would rather leave my family rich in pleasant memories of my life than numbed in sorrow at my death.

AARVIG, TRUMAN, Pontiac, Illinois. Born November 5, 1890, near Pontiac, Illinois. Student at University of Illinois. Enlisted June 23, 1913, Pontiac, Illinois, Co. F, 3 Inf., I. N. G. Mobilized for Mexican Border Service, June 19, 1916, with rank of corporal. Promoted to Sgt. Stationed at Camp Wilson, San Antonio, Texas. Mustered from federal service at Ft. Sheridan, February 21, 1917. Mobilized at Pontiac, Illinois, July 25, 1917, for World War Service. To Camp Logan, Houston, Texas, September 13, 1917. Organization designation changed to Co. F, 129 Inf. Rank, Sup. Sgt. Commissioned 2d Lt., December 18, 1917. Transferred to Co. C, 129 Inf., December 18, 1917. Sailed from Hoboken, New Jersey, May 10, 1918, on U. S. S. Covington. Landed at Brest, France, May 24, 1918. Transferred to 1st Bn. Hdqrs., 129 Inf., August 12, 1918. Promoted to 1st Lt., August 12, 1918, serving as Intelligence and Scout Officer. Engagements: Meuse-Argonne Offensive, September 26-October 11, 1918; Dannevoux, Gercourt, September 26-October 9, 1918; Bois de Chaume, Bois de Plat Chene, October 10-11, 1918, with XVII French Corps on East Bank of Meuse River; Somme-Amiens Sector with Australian Corps, July 26-August 6, 1918; Albert Sector with 18 Div., B. E. F., August 11-20, 1918; Verdun Sector, Hill 304, September 7-26, 1918. On October 11, 1918, Lt. Aarvig was killed in action by H. E. shell near Consenvoye, a shell striking the headquarters dugout. Lt. Aarvig had been ordered to return to the States to instruct other officers, but made the request that he might remain in France, and his death followed almost immediately after the cancellation of this order. Lieutenant Aarvig's body was returned home, and buried at Pontiac, Illinois, September 11, 1921, with full military honors.

Lieutenant Colonel Truman Williams Carrithers, a son of Judge C. F. H. Carrithers and Lou Brydia Carrithers, was born at Saunemin, Illinois, on July 28, 1882. The family moved to Fairbury, Illinois, the following year. He was a graduate of the Fairbury High School, class of 1898, before reaching the age of sixteen years. He entered West Point in June, 1899, the youngest member of his class; graduated in June, 1903, and received his commission as second lieutenant seven weeks before he attained the age of twenty-one. He was assigned to the 20th Infantry, which was then stationed at Fort Sheridan, and took part in the manœuvres at West Point, Kentucky, with his regiment in the fall of 1903. In December of that year the 20th Infantry was ordered to the Philippines and took station in Manila. After a year in Manila and six months at the new post of Fort William McKinley, he was ordered to Southern Mindanao with his regiment in July, 1905, serving at Cotobato, Reigne Regente, and the lonely outpost of Fort Pikit. He was made Battalion Quartermaster before returning to the States with his regiment in the spring of 1906. The regiment had just reached its home station, Monterey, California, when the great earthquake and fire occurred at San Francisco. He took a wagon train loaded with supplies overland to San Francisco and immediately upon arrival he entered with indefatigable energy upon the task of relief, working constantly for eighty hours without sleep. After seventy-five days of arduous duty the regiment returned to Monterey, where he was assistant to the Quartermaster until the regiment was again ordered to the Philippines. Three months after his arrival there he was promoted to the grade of first lieutenant and ordered to join the 29th Infantry, his battalion being stationed at Fort Niagara, New York. After one year of service there he was sent to Evansville, Indiana, as recruiting officer of that district. He served in that capacity for two years, and while the district was far from the most populous, he placed it fourth in rank in the United States in the number of accepted candidates. In March, 1913, he was ordered to join the 22d Infantry, then on duty at Texas City. A year later he was sent to Fort Sam Houston and was Post Adjutant there for a year and a half. In September, 1915, he rejoined his regiment at Douglas, Arizona, and was ordered a month later to the 29th Infantry at Panama. In 1916 he was promoted to the grade of captain and joined the newly organized 33d Infantry at Gatun, where he was later appointed Post Adjutant. He was promoted to major in that regiment in 1917, and was for a short time its commanding officer. In the spring of 1918 he was selected by a board of general officers for duty on the general staff and ordered to Washington, D. C. He was assigned to duty with the legislative branch of the general staff at the Army War College and while serving there was promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel.

It was the keenest disappointment of his life that he could not be assigned to overseas duty and take part in the active fighting of the world war. Some

had to remain to carry on the work at home and those to whom fell that unfortunate lot worked with infinite zeal and energy; and so he served, early and late, until stricken by the terrible epidemic of influenza that swept the country. He was taken ill October 1, removed to Walter Reed Hospital on the 6th and died there October 17. The funeral took place October 19, 1918. A squadron of dismounted cavalry from Fort Myer, led by its band, escorted the cortege. The pallbearers were six members of the West Point class to which the deceased belonged. A large detail of officers from the War College Section of the General Staff represented the War Department. Thus the remains of the youngest member of his class—B. J., as he was popularly known at the Academy—were taken to their resting place in a beautiful spot in the National cemetery at Arlington.

The body of Lee W. Umphenour, who was killed in action, found its last resting place in the Gooding cemetery Sunday afternoon. Military ceremonies befitting his death were carried out by Perry Byam Post of the American Legion, assisted by other local patriotic bodies.

The remains of the hero lay in a flower strewn casket on the stage at the Schubert theater. John Ayres, representing the army, stood guard at the head of the body, and Ed Bryan, representing the navy, stood guard at the foot throughout the ceremonies. The following obituary was read:

“Lee William Umphenour was born February 24, 1896, at Pontiac, Illinois, and was living at Gooding at the time he left for Camp Lewis, Washington, April 30, 1918.

“After training in Camp Lewis for about two months, Lee left with the 91st Division for Camp Merritt. He was in the 361 Inf., Co. D. They left July 5, landing in Scotland, July 20, 1918, and reached Le Havre July 23. They went into the first line trenches September 26, 1918, in the Meuse-Argonne. Lee was killed by a high explosive shell on the first day of November.

“When our company in the 166 D. B. was split up the boys were sent into different camps. Lee was one of the eleven of us who went into Co. D, 361 Inf.

“In France we received some six weeks more training and while there Lee was made a runner and promoted to private first-class. September 3 we started for the front, making most of the distance by forced marches, carrying full pack. As we neared the front we marched by night and hid in the ruins of some village by night.

“We were in reserve on the St. Mihiel Sector, but were not needed. We went from there to the Meuse-Argonne Sector and were off at the beginning of the last great drive on September 26. We were in action there 17 days, going in with twenty-five runners and Lee was one of the five runners to return.

“The 91st was then sent to Belgium and on October 30 we were ordered to take the town of Audenarde, which the Germans had held for four years. When within a few kilometers of the town we were held up by the heavy shell fire the Germans were using to cover their retreat. On November 1, Co. D. was ordered to dig in, in a low meadow land, and it was while digging in that place that a piece of high explosive shell struck Lee Umphenour and killed him. Death was instantaneous, and there was no suffering.”

After music and a funeral sermon the procession formed for the march to the cemetery. The body was drawn by six horses, mounted military fashion, and was placed in a plot reserved for world war veterans.

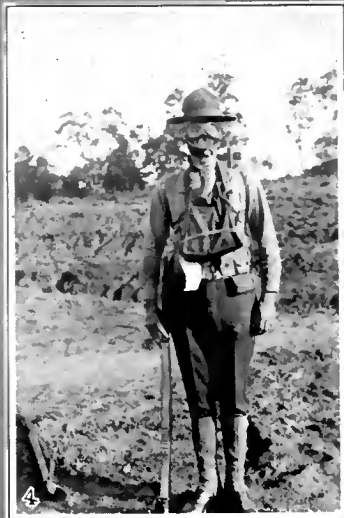
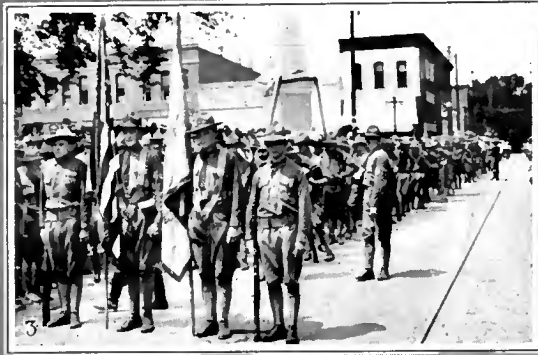

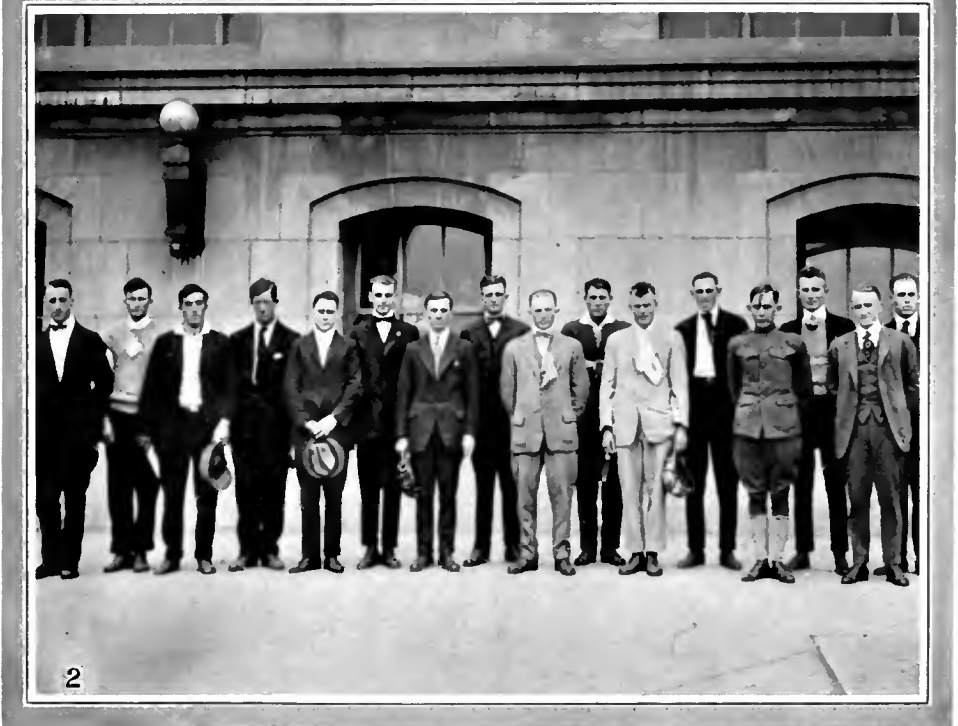

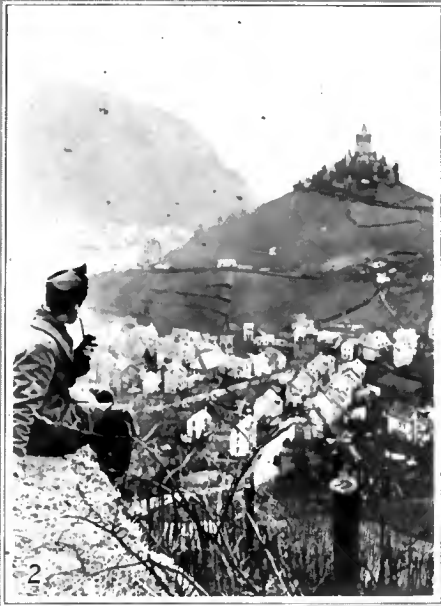
Subject: Conduct of men on the 314th Field Signal Battalion.

1. During the recent Meuse-Argonne Offensive in which this division was engaged, the telephone lines on the Division axis of liaison were laid under the direction of 1st Lt. N. B. Forrest, 314th Field Signal Battalion, whose conduct I have reported on most favorably in another communication. In addition to that, however, I wish to call your favorable attention to the telephone detachment which was a part of the Advance Message Center under my direction, and the detachment under Lt. Forrest who laid the wire and maintained the line. All were members of the 314th Field Signal Battalion:

4. From Remonville through to Laneuville the work done came under my personal observation, and the Advance Message Center detail I saw throughout the operation. The conduct of all was worthy of high praise. The lines were carried forward under heavy shell fire, breaks were repaired day and night promptly and cheerfully in spite of casualties.

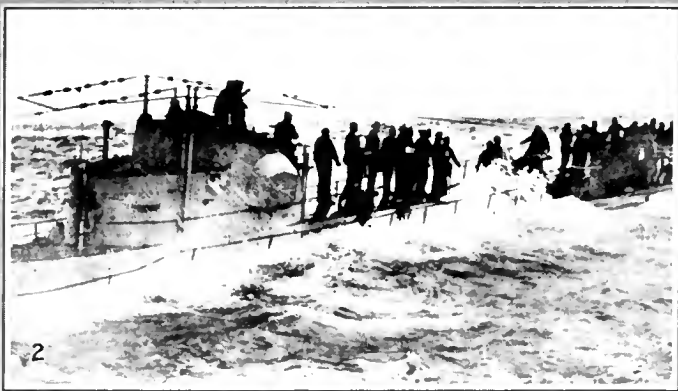

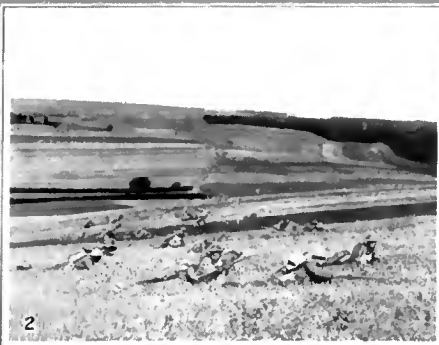

RESOLUTION OF WAR PASSED BY CONGRESS

Washington, D. C., April 5, 1917. The war resolution as passed was as follows:

“Whereas the Imperial German government has committed repeated acts of war against the government and people of the United States; therefore be it

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives in Congress assembled, that the state of war between the United States and the Imperial German government, which has been thrust upon the United States is hereby formally declared and the president be, and is hereby authorized and directed to employ the entire naval and military forces of the United States and the resources of the government to carry on war against the Imperial German government; and to bring the conflict to a successful termination, all the resources of the country are hereby pledged by the Congress of the United States.”

THE PRESIDENT'S PROCLAMATION OF WAR

The President's proclamation in brief follows:

“I, Woodrow Wilson, do hereby proclaim that a state of war exists between the United States and the Imperial German government, and I specifically direct that all civil and military officials exercise vigilance and zeal in the discharge of their duties incident to such a state of war, and I earnestly appeal to all American citizens that they in loyal devotion to their country uphold the laws of the land and give undivided loyalty and will support to measures adopted by the constitutional authorities for the successful promulgation of the war.

“All alien enemies are enjoined to preserve the nation's peace and refrain from crime against the United States. They must comply strictly with the regulations which are from time to time promulgated by the president, not commit actual hostility by giving information, aid or comfort to our enemies. As long as they act in accordance with law they shall be undisturbed and allowed to continue in the peaceful pursuit of their lives and occupations. All citizens of the United States are enjoined to treat them with all friendliness as may be compatible with loyalty and allegiance to the United States.”

War was declared at 1:13 p. m., Friday, April 6, 1917, when the President's signature was affixed to the proclamation of war.

GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION

To the Women of Illinois. The week beginning November 5, 1917, has been set aside for the registration of the women of Illinois. I urge all women to go to the place designated in their communities and to register their names. This applies as well to those who have the time and are willing to help directly in the work which the war has brought. There are some who will be able and willing to take the places of the men who have been called to the colors. There

are others who will help in the work of caring for the families of those who have gone to the front. There are still others who will be glad, through the Red Cross and other like organizations, to help minister to the comforts and welfare of our soldiers in the field. There are a thousand activities for which women are peculiarly fitted and which will help greatly to maintain our morale in the field, and what is equally important, to maintain our morale at home. The registration cards which will be provided at the place of registration will enable each woman easily and surely to indicate where her chief usefulness to her country will be in this crisis.

A general registration of our women will bring cheer to our soldiers in the field, strength to our government, and will give notice to the world that the spiritual resources of Illinois are mobilized in the prosecution of this most righteous war.

The first lap of the long journey which the several military units who have been mobilized here for the past two months expect to make to the battle front in Europe was begun at 1:25 o'clock this afternoon.

A special train over the Wabash consisting of two freight cars, a baggage car equipped with stoves, etc., as a cook car, and five chair cars and a sleeper carried 241 men away from Pontiac amidst the playing of martial music, the cheers and tears of thousands who gathered at the station to bid them farewell.

The soldiers were escorted from their mobilization camp at Chautauqua Park by members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and Spanish-American War Veterans, through the business section of the city to the station in the following order: Third Illinois Infantry Band, Grand Army of the Republic, Spanish-American War Veterans, Headquarters Company, Color Guard, Colors, Company F Third Illinois Infantry, Pontiac Military Band.

At the station the members were given a short time to make their farewells with their relatives and loved ones and the long journey to Camp Logan, Houston, Texas, was taken up.

129th INFANTRY IN CAMP LOGAN

Camp Logan, Houston, Texas.

So much has occurred to alter the placid lives of the rookies during the past week that I am at a loss to detail the events that have been of interest, but which, on the other hand, may seem very commonplace to you. Paul Sparks of Company F was over at our quarters last night and said he had written more or less about the trip, so I will be rather brief. It was a rare trip, but most of our boys enjoyed it. No one slept much the first two nights. Mert Baughman thoughtfully attended to that. With his feeble voice roaring above the babble of other sound, including the noise of the train, he easily outdistanced the chaos of a boiler factory going overtime. The second night he closed the upper berths with the men sleeping in them, but happily on the third night he lost his voice and with it some of his surplus energy and we actually enjoyed a little quiet.

The camp is fine. It covers miles of pine timber land, a large part of which was cleared prior to our arrival by Company C of Ottawa. Every company is still working on camp construction. We cut down trees and grubbed stumps in our company street and the immediate surrounding territory. The place still somewhat lacks the finishing touches. It is an enormous affair and with the roads winding and twisting through the trees one may easily become lost, even during the day time.

Have been down to Houston several times and am agreeably surprised to see how courteous and hospitable the citizens invariably are to the soldiers. Strangers in automobiles will often pick up boys walking to town. They are civilly inquisitive and interrogate us in detail concerning camp and camp life. The one drawback is the dust. It is a foot deep in the camp roads and is as difficult to travel through as mud. It is everywhere; in the bedding, in our clothes, in our food. No one seems to mind it a great deal. It would avail us nothing if we did. The Y. M. C. A., or one of them, rather, as there are five of them in camp, is only a couple of blocks south of us. It is crowded day and night with soldiers looking for instruction and entertainment.

I have been detailed to division headquarters. Am in the office of Major Chipperfield, judge advocate in the statistical bureau which is compiling a list of every man and officer in camp to go with descriptive information concerning them. A sort of ready reference for the division to be used in checking casualty

lists, should we be called to France. I am still with the Machine Gun Company, however, and probably will be as there are not sufficient sleeping and mess accommodations at division headquarters.

Berdie Cullen and Dick Reed are corresponding for some paper, I think, as they write from thirty to forty pages every night. We are all anxious to hear from Pontiac and the fellows are clamoring for replies to their letters. We miss our friends from home. Write lots and often.

Yesterday bedsacks and hay were issued to the regiment and the boys went to work filling sacks in anticipation of the cold weather.

By the time this reaches the paper "Mike," our mascot, will be in his home town again. An order came out that all company mascots should be shipped away or else be disposed of in some other way. We are all sorry to lose our pet. He knew a man from Co. F just as soon as he saw him or heard his voice; also he never left the company street unless the company went.

Tomorrow being Saturday we stand our weekly inspection. It will be rather hard on this company on account of their recent inoculation, but business is business in the army so it is up to us. We are down here for the betterment of our country and ourselves, and the sooner the boys learn "to stand the gaff" the sooner they will make men of themselves.

COMPANY F NEWS

Camp Logan, Texas, Sept. 30, 1917.

Sunday morning finds all in good health. Quite a number of the boys have gone down town to attend church, which shows up pretty well for the boys in khaki. In fact, about half of the congregations in the Houston churches are made up of men in uniform.

Last Monday afternoon the boys of Company F who represent Dwight were favored with a visit from Col. Frank L. Smith, of that city, who was here on business. Saturday evening Colonel Smith was host to the Dwight boys at dinner on the roof garden of the Rice hotel, the largest and best hostelry in Houston. Twelve of the boys attended, the colonel bringing the number to thirteen. But thirteen is an unlucky number, so Ernest Hoobler and Richard Lord were included in the party. The boys also took in Jesse Willard and Buffalo Bill's circus which was in town. The Dwight boys certainly appreciate the kindness and the interest taken in them by their fellow townsman.

Paul Sparks has lately been promoted to the rank of sergeant and has been detailed to the military police. Donald Holloway, Johnnie Kiauski and Arthur Hansen have also been detailed to that organization. They come over every once in a while and visit when they are off duty.

Oct. 8.—Yesterday we had a surprise visit from Sgt. Tom Cavanaugh, who is serving with the 19th U. S. Regulars at San Antonio. He was in Galveston restoring some prisoners to duty and got a forty-eight hour pass in order to run up to Houston to meet the Pontiac boys. He is looking fine and by the way he talks I guess he likes his job.

Oct. 19.—The boys of the Thirty-third Division have up to date bought \$338,000 of Liberty bonds.

Leon Shugart is acting color sergeant in the absence of Color Sergeant Haney who was called home on account of the shooting of his father. The boys were all sorry to hear of this affair and are always asking for news as to the condition of Mr. Haney.

Oct. 17.—Private Charles Cullom, formerly of the Fifth regiment, who was transferred to the 108th Ammunition Train, has since been transferred to Co. F of the 129th Infantry. Some of the boys of Pontiac who were members of Company F during 1908 and 1909 might remember him, he having served under Captain Ward Wise.

Rodney Henderson just dropped around with his guitar, and while he was sitting here tinkling the strings Dad Watson happened along and took a turn at the box. This is the first intimation we have had that there was any music in Dad.

Recent promotions in the company are as follows: Corporal Gordon Bentley to sergeant and First Class Private Daly Osborne to corporal.

This morning was spent in trench digging. Private Lloyd Ives was left to watch the gun stacks. He sure got sore because they wouldn't let him dig.

Each company in the regiment has its fire department. Sergeant Hart is the chief of Co. F. The first and second squads are the fire companies.

HUGE REVIEW OF TROOPS AT HOUSTON

129 Inf. Hdqrs. Band, Camp Logan, Houston, Texas.

It is now 6:30 and I have time to write a few lines before we play for the concert at 7:15. We play concerts three nights a week.

I suppose you have read or heard about the big parade we gave on Illinois Day in Houston, the day Governor Lowden was here. There were twenty thousand troops in line and fourteen bands. The parade was nearly ten miles long and took nearly four hours to pass the reviewing stand. It was the biggest parade ever held in the South since the Civil War, the Houston papers say. We left camp here about eight o'clock in the morning and marched to the city, around the main part of the business section and back again, getting here at 1:30. We had about three chances to rest, about ten or fifteen minutes each time, and the rest of the time we were marching. Believe me, the whole bunch was just about all in. I don't believe I could have marched another mile.

Part of our regiment is out on the rifle range; they have been there since Monday.

129th INFANTRY IN FRANCE

(By Lawrence DeBoer)

Somewhere in France, May 28, 1918.

We are again in camp and have things pretty well straightened around. At present we are living in pup tents out in a field, sleeping on the ground, or in other words, getting close to nature.

I get to see the rest of the Cornell boys as they are in camp right next to us; all of them are well. This is surely a pretty place but everything is old. I have not seen a wooden house since I got here, but of course we have not been over much of the country as yet. I have not seen a field that had more than ten acres in it, and the farmers still cut their hay with the scythe and do their hauling with two wheeled wagons and horses hitched tandem style. The women do their washing down by the brook, using stones for wash boards. Most of the people I have seen so far still wear wooden shoes. I am writing under difficulties, using the bottom of my mess kit and a pile of blankets for a writing table.

One thing we miss over here is the newspapers. We do not get the news as often as we did in the states, although we get the European edition of the New York Herald, but there is not much news in it.

We haven't received mail from home for some time, in fact since we left Texas, but suppose there is some awaiting us somewhere.

We are at present in one of the richest farming districts in France. Along the little stream where we are stationed we can see the peasant women washing their clothes with the aid of two stones in the clear water. We are visiting places of historic interest about here, including Caesar's castle built in 1200.

The roads about here have high earthen embankments on either side. They

were built this way in order to move troops in the olden days. Napoleon had a few good battles around here.

We had a ball game this afternoon and our 129th Infantry kept up their good reputation by winning 11 to 7. They say the Fritz air men can spot American camps by seeing the men play baseball.

Everything is quite expensive here but we fare mighty well. Uncle Sam takes care of his soldiers, so do not worry about us. We are all well and satisfied.

Somewhere in France, June 29, 1918.

I went to a show tonight down in the village. The actors were British soldiers and the theatre is nothing more than a big hole in the ground with a stage at one end and seats built out of sand bags up the sloping sides. It was quite interesting and the Tommies seem to have lots of fun even if they are mixed up in a pretty good sized war.

We were on the ocean Decoration Day and you can bet I'll always remember it for our gunners had a lively time with some of the Kaiser's subs. We have every reason to believe that he has a few less sub-marines than he used to have.

July 3, 1918.

Yesterday was quite a day for us as our company was guard of honor for General Pershing. After his car had passed where we were drawn up in company formation to present arms to him, the car stopped and he got out and came back and inspected us very closely. He paid us a very high compliment, telling our division commander that we were a fine looking body of men. We felt very proud of it and I know we will look back with pride in after years to this day and feel good that we were in the bunch. July 2 seems to be a date on which something of importance always happens. Two years ago yesterday I left Springfield for the border, one year ago yesterday I was called out for riot duty in East St. Louis, and yesterday was inspected by the highest officer in the army. I wonder what will happen on that date next year.

Our blue envelope came today. It was late this time so I have not sent any letters for over a week. This letter is not censored in the company but goes to the base where it may or may not be censored. We are on our honor to write nothing but personal and family matters. In this envelope we can send as many letters as we want to.

PONTIAC MOURNS FIRST WAR HERO

Pontiac citizens mourned today over the loss of their first soldier boy—Sgt. Gordon Bentley.

Late Monday evening Mr. and Mrs. Bert Bentley, parents of the deceased, received a telegram from Washington, D. C., stating that the Government regretted to inform them that their son, Sgt. Gordon Bentley, had died in a

United States Hospital in France on July 1, of scarlet fever complicated with diphtheria and pyemia.

The news was quickly communicated and the entire city sympathized with Mr. and Mrs. Bentley in the death of the first young man from this city who gave his services and his life to his government in winning the war.

GORDON BENTLEY MEMORIAL SERVICE

On Sunday Pontiac honored her first soldier to die in France.

The Sunday morning service at the first Methodist Episcopal church was given over to a memorial in honor of the late Gordon Bentley, who died in a hospital in France on July 1. The church had been appropriately decorated with the national colors; flags, cut flowers, potted plants and many beautiful pieces covering the altar. Very fitting among the latter was a panel piece in the form of a service flag containing a gold star. The seats in the center body of the church were reserved for the immediate family, other relatives and the ladies of the Pontiac chapter of the Red Cross. Rev. M. L. O'Harra preached the memorial sermon.

LIEUTENANT PORTER GIVES VIVID BATTLE PICTURE

. Somewhere in France, July 20, 1918.

Great news has been coming in from all along the line. We either hold him or push him back, so things look strong in our favor. I think Germany has begun to realize her time is short. She is making a desperate struggle to break through our lines which is costing her thousands and thousands of men. Of course we have lost many men in the stunt but nothing compared to her.

I was back of the lines on detail last night and heard an American girl sing. She was fine and the boys would have enjoyed it even more if we had only been able to see her.

Some heavy cannonading is going on. It shakes the windows of this place pretty heavily, but a runner came back just a little while ago and they were "Right O." I will join them again tonight.

I have just finished reading a letter from a lieutenant that was in our last stunt and was wounded. He is coming along O. K. He got it in both arms but never stopped and when we reached our objectives he came over to me to see if he was in correct place. I was glad to see that he came through that much of the battle and started to grab his hand when I noticed he was wounded in both arms. We were still under fire so didn't stop to talk long but I asked what was the matter. He said, "Oh, I guess they plugged me a couple." He was smoking a cigarette. Old smokers smoke as much as possible. They claim it stimulates their nerves.

When we got into the Germans with our bayonets they didn't have a chance. They can't handle them as our boys can and they don't like hand to hand fighting. You know that is when the American gets his blood up. My orderly is a chief fireman in a station in Chicago and is very good with a bayonet. I told him before we started, "Now boy, wherever I go, you go; you do the bayonet work and I'll do the shooting." All through the battle he stayed right beside me and he sure has the nerve. He did not seem to fear anything. I told him they would never get to him if I could help it so we went along fine.

I can't tell you anything that might give our location away, you know, but I may tell you more when we get back. It's a shame to see young fellows get killed but after you get into the fight your one thought is to get the boche. I guess one of my sergeants who was wounded will go back to America if he pulls through. He got it pretty bad, poor chap. He got eight shrapnel wounds in the back from shells bursting back of him and some say a bullet through the stomach.

Hope you are all well and happy and hope the war ends soon. Don't worry about me. With love to all,

PONTIAC'S YOUNGEST FIGHTING CAPTAIN IN FIERCE STRUGGLE AT THE MEUSE

"Our battalion was the first to enter Consenvoy," writes Pontiac's youngest fighting captain, Charles M. Porter, of the 131st Infantry. Under the laconic statement of the true fighting man hides the story of the fierce onrush of our troops across the Meuse River the last of October. The letter follows:

"Just received your letter of October 30. To hear from you takes me back to old times when I was in Co. F, 129th. I still say it was some company. Although I hated to leave the 129th at the time, I would not take anything for my past experiences, as our 131st has been in about five times as many scraps as the 129th. I don't know why they were not put in more.

"I am coming up to see you when we get home and will tell you about the action we have participated in the last months—don't suppose we did anything any other Americans would not have done, but I will say that we have been in some pretty hot places. The lowest my company was ever down was after one particularly hot scrap with the Boche when we had but seven men left in my company.

"Just after we took the fourth hill east of the Meuse I was gassed. Have recovered from the effects as well as can be expected, all but my throat and lungs and they are not in very good shape yet.

“As to your old pistol you gave me—I can say that it did its duty, but when I was gassed I lost it, the holster, field glasses, and all the remainder of my equipment. Will try to replace it with a German pistol as a souvenir of our brushes with the Boche.

“Have been in command of the battalion of late, as the major was away. I am not senior captain by a long ways, but it did not make me mad when they put me in command. I had a battalion in the stunt east of the Meuse, and our battalion is very proud of the fact that it was the first to enter Con-senvoy. We expect General Pershing here tomorrow; he is certainly some general, and his army—from brigadier general to buck private—worships the ground he walks on. He is a white man, that’s all.”

GAIL BRANNON WRITES OF AIR BATTLE

Somewhere in France, August 12, 1918.

Don asked me to get him a tin helmet from one of the Germans. I had several, but cannot send them home as they will not allow it any more. Am going to get a German watch and ring.

One German came into the hospital wounded, recently. He was a chap only eighteen years old and six feet tall. He would not believe there were so many Americans over here and that the U-boats were a failure. He said that ten thousand Germans were as good as two million Americans. I guess they will change their minds before long. We have his planes outnumbered nearly ten to one now and the American planes have not started to come over yet. He does his bombing at night while our planes do it in the daytime.

They brought a German plane down near us the other night. They turned about fifteen searchlights on him and kept him in the circle. Our planes came up and signalled for the lights to be taken away and they peppered him with tracer bullets. His petrol tank exploded and his plane caught fire and zigzagged down to the ground. When the plane hit the ground all of his bombs went off and his rockets and flares went up, lighting up the whole world, seemingly. We saw him bring down four of our observation balloons one day. He came over in a captured allied plane and fired at the four balloons, one right after another. They all burned up and the observers came down in parachutes. They got that plane, though, with an air-craft gun. Also, our planes went over and got eight of his balloons, as that is the way they are working it now.

I guess that we will be home by this time next year all right. General Pershing says that it is either Hell, Heaven, or Hoboken.

EAGER TO FINISH THE JOB PROPERLY

In the Mud, Sept. 11, 1918.

I was ordered before Colonel Naylor a short time ago for examination for promotion but as yet have heard nothing from it. Porter is a captain now and Aarvig a first lieutenant.

We are now in the reserve line and have been so far along the entire front. We have held several important front line sectors. I would like to tell you just where we are at the present time, but of course can not, for military reasons, but can tell you this—we are now situated on one of the most famous battlefields of history, although at present this is a very quiet sector.

I think I will always remember last season's chautauqua and Sergeant Guy Empey's talk. Everything he told us was perfectly true only he did not make it strong enough. Sherman also knew what he was talking about, but even with all the hardships and mud I don't believe there is an American soldier in France who wants to come home until the job is finished, and there is only one way to finish it and that is by the unconditional surrender of the German forces. The boys over here are hoping and praying that the people at home will stand behind us this fall at the election and not elect some rotten politicians who will listen to the German peace talk. Peace by understanding is German victory, and nothing else. Many have given their lives already from our old outfit and many more will do the same before we are finished, but those of us who are left are just as determined to go on to victory as we were at the start.

German brutality and German militarism must go and will go as sure as the sun shines if the army is supported by the fall elections at home. But the people must watch out; Germany is cunning and crafty and if the people at home do not keep a sharp watch-out the Huns will fool them and civilians will be the cause of the needless sacrifice of the American soldier lives already lost. We will fight and you at home must back us and if for any cause whatsoever you don't, God help you, but we shall be ashamed of our country. As things stand now we are the proudest soldiers in Europe, and we have the faith to believe that the people at home will do nothing to cause us to hang our heads at any future time. You don't realize it until you get here that to be an American soldier from the U. S. A. is to be a king among men. No man wants to be with his family more than I do, but if I had the last year and a half to do over I could do nothing better than to follow the course I have.

RED CROSS RECEIVES GLOWING TRIBUTE

September 11, 1918.

We are still in the front lines although this is the third front we have been on over here. It is the most famous battle ground in the history of European wars, so perhaps you can figure out just where we are. I am twenty-five feet under ground writing this: am sitting at the foot of the stair leading to our dugout.

Had the luck to spend the day in Paris a couple of weeks ago, and believe me, "gay Parce" is some place. The people are so full of faith and are even gay despite raids, big Berthas, etc.

Would like to say a few words about the Red Cross. The Red Cross is doing a wonderful work for the boys over here; they are doing even more, I think, than you Red Cross workers at home realize. I don't know what we would do without them. Of course, we in or near the front lines do not have the pleasure of being near the Red Cross huts or stations, but there is a constant demand for sweaters, helmets, socks, etc., which are always immediately furnished to us by the Red Cross station nearest to us, and I personally have had the good luck to visit a couple of their stations and it almost seemed like home to see a real American girl—and it makes one forget for a time that home is over three thousand miles away. In the Red Cross huts the soldier, no matter how grimed he may be with the everlasting French mud, is always sure of a cordial welcome. It is the hand of friendship and charity extended to the soldier, not the hand of commerce. Hot chocolate, sandwiches, cigarettes, tobacco, magazines and a place to rest for a while is extended to us and not even a good word is asked in repayment. Nothing can be too highly said of the Red Cross, and when we return to the states—victoriously, of course—and the little Red Cross money box makes its appearance, any soldier pocket containing bob, franc, or two bit piece will discharge said currency into aforesaid box, which will be the best place in the world for it.

All the diggers from the old home town are very much alive and happy and we are all looking for a speedy end to this show, so tell the folks at home to carry on.

PONTIAC SOLDIERS ON FAMOUS BATTLE FRONTS

Am writing this letter in my dugout which is shell-proof. It is made of elephant iron and sandbags and tombstones taken from a graveyard near by. We have been over many famous battle grounds around Albert with the English. We were brigaded with the Australians around Corbie and Villers-Bretonneux, and have been in the line in front of Amiens for some time. We also have been in Verdun and on the famous Hill 304, which is next to the famous Dead Man's Hill that has changed hands so many times during the earlier years of the war, and where thousands and thousands of soldiers have laid down their lives for the cause they thought just. The French say that at least one hundred and fifty thousand Germans have died on this hill.

All of the boys from home were in the best of health when I saw them a few days ago. The old company has not had much bad luck and the boys will have some interesting tales to tell when they get back to God's country. At present they are in the front line trenches and we all agree that the front line is the safest place to be, except when a big push is on.

Just at present we are brigaded with the French, and you would not know that they have been fighting for four years if you did not see the towns that have been levelled flat by the German shell fire. The French people are held

high in the esteem of whomever comes in contact with them. All the men are in uniform and the women and children and old men are doing the work for the country while the men are at the front, and nowhere do you hear a word of complaint about this war. Their spirit is similar to that of the Australians who say that "this is the only war we have, so let's make it a good one." The Australians pulled a good one when we first came over. They asked us if we knew the difference between a Yank and a digger, and of course we said no. They said the only difference was that when a Yank came into a town he acted as if he owned it; when a digger came into a town he acted as if he didn't give a damn who owned it, but if any damage was done the French very soon let them know who really did own it.

The Huns are whipped and they know it. They are paying the price now for their four years of savagery.

CO. F SUSTAINS CASUALTIES IN GERMAN BARRAGE

September 28, 1918.

I do not want either of you to think for one minute that I am not coming back, for I am. There are not enough Germans here to keep me in France or any other foreign country. I am still with Captain Witt. I have had very few experiences in France. I have been in one barrage and it lasted about forty-five minutes, and it was the longest and most dreaded forty-five minutes I have spent in my life. When it started I thought all of the cannon in Germany had begun to shoot, and dirt and shrapnel began to fly. Something that I hope I will never have to go through again. All the men in the trenches thought that Jerry was coming in a push, but it was only a daylight raid and I did not get to see very much. They captured two Americans and one Australian; about two hundred Germans were killed and 35 or 40 allied soldiers. During that bombardment Sergeant King, Raymond Hagerman and Walter Clemons were killed and about fifteen other members of Co. F were wounded. Charles Hanson was the only man who got sent to England.

I drove a truck yesterday and hauled some hay for some horses in an artillery regiment. The supply company is located on the top of a high hill. The road was muddy and slippery and had large ditches on every side. I started up this hill without any chains on the wheels. I got about one-third of the way up and could not go any farther so had to be pulled the rest of the way. The worst part of it was coming down. I had my foot brake on, and the emergency brake, and I kept on going down hill. Well, as luck would have it, I came out all right, but believe me, I sure was scared and am not very crazy about going through it again. Am in the best of health, get awful meals, and getting fat.

129th TROOPS IN VERDUN FIGHTING

Under date of October 7, Sergeant Vern Laver wrote to his mother describing recent activities along the Verdun sector where the Headquarters Company of the 129th Infantry was stationed:

"Now that the division has been taken from the reserve list and placed in the front lines the Signal Corps has been especially active keeping lines of communication open. They call us the eyes and ears of the army and hold the lines of communication open despite the vicious shelling of the Huns which has been very hard. Have seen lots of our boys hit and gassed, but my luck held as I managed to come out altogether.

"We are now in rest billets back of the lines and when I think of the time spent in the front I think we are entitled to the rest."

COMPANY F MEMBER DEAD

Doy Skinner of Cullom, a member of Co. F, 129 Inf., was killed in action in France about October 20.

The information came to Cullom in a letter written by Merville Skinner, a cousin of the deceased, who is also a member of the 129th and who saw his cousin fall from a machine gun bullet. Merville assisted in carrying the wounded soldier to a first aid station, but when an officer reached him, he was dead. The remains were buried on the battle-field near where he fell, fifteen kilometers from Verdun.

CORPORAL WHITEHURST DIES OF WOUNDS

Sadness overshadowed the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Whitehurst last evening when they received an official announcement from the War Department at Washington bearing the sad news of the death of their son, Corporal Bert Whitehurst, of Co. I, 102 Inf. Corporal Whitehurst paid the supreme sacrifice one day after the armistice was signed between the warring nations, having succumbed from wounds received in action while fighting for his country.

LIEUTENANT AARVIG KILLED BY SHELL

(Pontiac Daily Leader, October 30, 1918)

The great war in Europe was brought closer home to Pontiac citizens today when word was received of the death, in the field, of Lieutenant Truman Aarvig, son of Rasmus Aarvig, who resides on his farm west of this city.

Word of his death was received in a private letter written by Lieutenant Colonel Diller S. Myers to his wife in this city. The letter was dated October 13 and it is presumed from the wording that Lieutenant Aarvig's death occurred on the 12th.

The letter stated that Lieutenant Aarvig was in battalion headquarters, when a heavy calibre German shell struck the headquarters and exploded, killing Lieutenant Aarvig instantly.

Lieutenant Aarvig was first sergeant of Company F when it left this city a year ago and by close application had so conducted his military duties as to advance to the rank of lieutenant. Lieutenant Colonel Myers speaks in very complimentary terms of the military conduct of the lieutenant, stating that he was one of the best officers under his direct supervision. He stated that the lieutenant had often taken part in patrol engagements, had risked his life dozens of times in the performance of his duties and had come off unhurt and the fact that he was in battalion headquarters attending to minor duties made his death more sad.

Lieutenant Aarvig was the oldest son of Rasmus Aarvig and had spent all of his life, previous to entering the military service of his government, in this city and vicinity. He was an extremely bright young man and had made many friends. He leaves by his death his father and two sisters residing on their farm west of this city, and a brother, Bernard, who is also in the military service of his country, somewhere in France. His brother Harold passed away in Chicago early this month.

(Pontiac Leader, November 21)

Writing of the experiences and exploits of the American expeditionary forces in France, Junius B. Wood of the Chicago Daily News, under date of November 18, has the following to say concerning the death of Lieut. Truman Aarvig of Pontiac:

“Capt. Cassius C. Paust, of DeKalb, Ill., experienced one of those miraculous escapes from death which come to few persons. He was in a dugout at the headquarters of one of the battalions of the 129th Infantry near Consenvoye, in October, when a shell hit the dugout directly and killed or wounded all of the officers and men in it except Captain Paust, who did not receive a scratch. He and Lieut. Truman Aarvig of Pontiac, Ill., were bending over a table at the time, studying a map. Lieut. Aarvig was killed instantly. He was a University of Illinois boy who had been ordered to return to the United States to train officers. He asked to remain in France, preferring to fight here with a machine gun company.”

PRIVATE ROBERT WOODS KILLED IN ACTION

(Pontiac Daily Leader, Oct. 31, 1918)

Word of the death of Robert Woods, Company C, 129th Infantry, of wounds, somewhere in France, was officially received by his mother in this city this afternoon.

His mother, Mrs. Robert Woods, Sr., received the following telegram from Washington:

“Deeply regret to inform you that it is officially reported that Private Robert Woods, infantry, died October 3, from wounds received in action.—Harris, Acting Adjutant.”

ON WHIZBANG HILL

(Pontiac Leader, Nov. 5, 1918)

With the American Army at the Front, Nov. 2.

For two weeks the 129th Infantry of the 33d Division which is composed of Illinois national guard troops, lay in little “fox holes” dug on the top of a hill outside the apex of Dannevoux, a little village on the west side of the Meuse northwest of Verdun. The river bent around the hill on three sides and the German trench mortars on the opposite bank were able to enfilade every spot. The men cheerfully christened the perilous position “Whizbang Hill.” Finally the order was given to cross the river, drive out the enemy and capture the position called “Cemetery Ridge.” This, the men say, was easy compared to the steady day and night pounding with shrapnel and drenching with gas during the weeks they held the hill. The regiment had been continuously on duty at the front for forty-two days, which is almost a record.

Other units of the 33d Division took positions along the river on the night the regiment made the attack. It was raining steadily, it was inky dark and the enemy was shelling furiously. It seemed to the men as if they were marching into the mouth of an open furnace. They were strung along in platoons in single file to prevent a single exploding shell from causing a considerable number of casualties. One platoon, however, was just passing a crossroads in a village when a shell exploded, hurling men in all directions and from all sides in the darkness came cries of the wounded.

Casualty Camp, Nevers, France, November 22, 1918.

My dear Mother: I will try to write you a few lines to let you know that I am well and feeling fine. I arrived here from Base Hospital No. 1 at Vichy about a week ago and thought I would get back with my company, but I am in doubt now whether I will get back. The papers said that casual men and men that were in the hospitals were going to be sent home from where they are now stationed, and the commanding officers were receiving orders not to send any more to their companies. I sure would like to go home with my company, but if I get home sooner this way I am not going to kick, as the sooner the better. I am pretty well fed up on this old war. I just heard that Charlie Porter, our old top sergeant who is captain in the 131st regiment, was gassed, and that Lieutenant Herrold was wounded. Sergeant Bradshaw was killed, as was also Skinner of Cullom, and there were several others of the company from Chicago who were killed.

I have seen nearly all of France and also the largest towns—Paris, Brest—where we landed, Amiens, Abbeyville, Vichy, Nevers, Chermount, St. Aignan,

Toul, Beauvaine, and Verdun. I have been all over the battlefield of the Somme near Abbeyville, also over Hill 304 and Dead Man's Hill. The Americans took Hill 304 in thirty minutes, and General Foch told Pershing it would take six months and fourteen divisions to take it, but it didn't.

Our division took part in the fighting around Villers-Brettoneux, Albert, the fourth of last July, and captured 1000 prisoners. We took part in the taking of Belleau Wood, Cantigny, and the Battle of Verdun, and Argonne Woods, besides we were in the line in Alsace-Lorraine.

I left the company just after we got through Argonne Woods and the Meuse River was about one mile in front of us. We belonged to the First Army Corps during the Argonne fight, and they won a citation allowing them to wear a red shoulder cord, but no one wears them. They won't even wear the corporal and sergeant and service and wound stripes. I am entitled to wear a service stripe and a wound stripe, also pins of the different battles, but I never wear them.

Well, Mother, I will close for this time with love to all. Don't write until I write and tell you my address. Maybe I will stay long enough to get some mail before long.

GRAPHIC DESCRIPTION OF HUN'S TRENCHES

Just now we are having some particularly bad weather as the rainy season has set in, the sun is A. W. O. L. most of the time and it rains all of the time, but that does not bother us much, for we have plenty of good warm clothing and all the eats and smoking we want. In fact, we are enjoying life, for everything is coming our way. Of course Fritz occasionally gets our location and sends over some of the big shells, but we know that for every one he sends over our artillery sends about ten back.

In the course of my wandering about the war zone I have been in some of the Fritzies' big dugouts. Some of these dugouts are from fifty to seventy feet under the ground and are large enough to hold an entire battalion. Some of the dugouts remind one of a coal mine, with different passage ways leading to a main chamber. Very often these dugouts are furnished with loot taken from French chateaus, all kinds of beautiful rugs, chairs, tables and beds. I guess when Fritz fixed them up so comfortably he thought he would stay in them for two more winters, but the Yankee doughboys have spoiled his winter home.

At present we are located quite a distance back of the lines for a few days' rest, but presently we will be on the move again. Moving troops in France is a very disagreeable job, owing to the heavy traffic. Sometimes the roads are blocked for miles. The military police are the traffic cops, and they surely have their hands full. The M. P.'s are the law over here.

SERGT. BRADSHAW KILLED IN ACTION

(Pontiac Leader, Nov. 26, 1918)

Another one of the gallant fighters of Company F, 129th infantry, has paid the supreme sacrifice upon the battlefields of France. Mr. and Mrs. John Bradshaw of 740 West Howard street, were officially notified this afternoon by the war department at Washington of the death of their son, Sergeant John Roger Bradshaw as being killed in action on October 17. Sgt. Bradshaw enlisted with Company F in July, 1916. He went to Camp Logan, Houston, Texas, where he received his preliminary training and was promoted to the rank of top sergeant of the company. He left Camp Logan with the Prairie division and sailed with that unit from the point of embarkation to France, where he has been in constant service until he was killed. He had put in three years' service with Company F prior to his re-enlistment at the outbreak of the war.

PONTIAC SOLDIER DIED GLORIOUSLY

Mr. and Mrs. John Bradshaw have received the following letter from Major General George Bell, Jr., commanding the 33d division.

My dear Mr. Bradshaw:

It was with the deepest regret that I learned of the death of your son, Sergeant John F. Bradshaw, Co. F, 129th Infantry, at Consenvoye-sur-Meuse, France, on October 18th, 1918. He was in charge of an advance trench, at the time of his death. As morning broke he lay down for a moment's rest. The shelling was heavy and continuous at the time, and one was a direct hit on the place occupied by your son. He died without awakening.

He died as he had lived—gallant, zealous in the performance of duty, faithful always. I, like the officers and men of his regiment, mourn his death, and we extend to you our profoundest sympathy in the great loss that you have sustained.

We trust that you will derive consolation from the fact that he died gloriously, fighting for the highest of ideals and for his country's cause. His life has not been given in vain and the supreme sacrifice which he so splendidly made will always be an inspiration to others.

SERGEANT HART DIES OF WOUNDS

(Pontiac Daily Leader, November 23, 1918)

Another member of Company F has given his life for his country.

An official notice was received in this city late Friday evening from the war department at Washington stating that Ernest Hart, of Company F, 129th

infantry, has died from wounds, his death having occurred in a hospital in France on November 6.

The deceased was born in this city April 17, 1896, being a son of Mr. and Mrs. James Hart and had spent all of his life here until he went abroad. He enlisted in Company F of the Third Illinois infantry when he was sixteen years of age and had been in military service for six years. When his company was called to the Mexican border he went with it and accredited himself by his military department. He remained with Company F on its return home, and when it left for Camp Logan he held the rank of sergeant. At Camp Logan he, with the other members of the company, were inducted into the federal service and the old Third regiment became the 129th infantry. While at Camp Logan he won for himself the mark of an expert marksman and sharpshooter and a model soldier, and when his regiment went to France he was still holding the rank of sergeant.

THRILLS OF MOUNTAINEERING

(Pontiac Daily Leader, December 23, 1918)

Machine Gun Co., 129th Inf.

Today is the fifth day of our leave and we are certainly having some time. Yesterday a bunch of us fellows and a "Y" man went to the top of a mountain. We took a train to a little village at the foot of the mountain and there we hired bicycles. There is a winding road leading 'round and 'round the mountain which was so steep that we had to push our bicycles nearly all the way up. It surely was hard going and I thought some hard things about that "Y" fellow's idea of entertainment, but when we reached the top of the mountain we all agreed that the wonderful vista before our eyes was well worth the long hard climb.

On top of this mountain is perched a little house where an old Scotch lady and her daughter live, and we dined with them. I haven't had such a meal since we came to France and, although I can't begin to tell you what we had to eat, I will say this much, we certainly enjoyed the wonderful "spread." The old lady speaks English with a pronounced Scottish accent, but her daughter does not speak a word of English. The old lady has lived on the mountain for thirty years and has not been down for eight years, (she evidently knows what a hike it is coming up). She told us that before the war rich American tourists used to come up to see the scenery and to buy heather and seones. You see that the soldiers see for nothing now the things people paid lots of money to see before the war.

I am sending pictures of the mountain, but they don't begin to show the beauty of the place. The house is old and quaint and weatherbeaten, from the porch one can see the blue waters of the lake way down below with the rays of the sun reflected on the water. The top of the mountain seems to be surrounded by fleecy white clouds. Looking across the lake one could see the mountains on

the other side, we are close to the border of Italy, Switzerland and France. Through field glasses one can see Mount Blanc, fifty miles away.

In the hall of this home was the visitors' book where tourists inscribed their names before the war, and soldier visitors from all over the world in the last four years. Before we got out our bicycles the "Y" man told us to be very careful going down or someone might get hurt. Well, we started. I shall never forget that trip if I live to be a million. I won't tell you that I have never been afraid since coming to France, because I have been when the big push was on, but never was I so scared as when I was coming down that mountain. The road was narrow and very poor—on one side a yawning chasm leading to the lake thousands of feet below—on the other hand the steep walls of the mountain. When we started I hopped on my wheel and right off the reel I shot off like a race horse down the track, a curve loomed ahead, and when I tried to use the brake, I found it was useless. I felt my hair slowly raising as I began thinking about going over the bank and I remembered all the things I had done in my past life, all this while I was approaching the curve at a mile a minute, the fellows behind me were going equally as fast, and I could see the fellows in front slackening up in order to make the turn safely, and then, I happened to think of putting my foot under the fork and on the tire, it acting as a brake and I make the turn shaking like a leaf. Some of the other fellows had bad brakes and everyone fell off at least once. I would as soon go out in no man's land at night with a lantern as come down that mountain with a flat tire. Taking it all together it was some trip and one that I will never forget.

VIVID STORY OF THE 129th AT END OF WAR

(Pontiac Daily Leader, January 6, 1919)

A vivid description of how the war ended for the 129th regiment of which Company F, of this city, is a part, is given in a letter written by Arthur E. Lord, major of the medical corps of the 129th, which was published in the Kendall County News, of Plano, Ill.

Although not written by a Pontiac resident, the letter will prove very interesting to relatives and friends of Company F lads, especially since Major Lord has many friends here.

Here it is:

"Would you like to hear how the war ceased for us and peace came? I will give you the story in our little sector.

"We marched towards the front for two days (Nov. 9th and 10th). The weather was uncomfortable, always wet, foggy and chill. The men were ordered to leave their overcoats and carry only one blanket, as we were to attack as soon as we got in position. You can imagine they were cold in the damp woods up in the hills. It was hard marching, too, for the roads were very muddy and

slippery, and often hastily repaired where shells had struck or bridges been blown out.

“The afternoon of the 10th we marched ten miles and when the short afternoon light had faded we halted on the crest of the last row of hills, from whose eastward flanks one looked down on a great plain leading into German territory. In the half moonlight it was a desolate spot. What had been a carefully preserved government forest prior to the war was now only a waste of shattered tree trunks and shell holes filled with water. Abandoned trenches and mile upon mile of twisted barb wire ran everywhere, with here and there the black entrance of an old dug-out or concrete “pill-box” for machine guns. In the valleys among the hills the white stone ruins of little villages gleamed ghostly in the white fog. Every now and then a German shell whirred over and broke with a crash in the distance.

“About 9 o’clock the regiment divided and started to descend into the plain in different places, to relieve our ‘sister regiment,’ the 130th, which had been holding the line. It was hard marching. The mud was shoe top deep in places and one would stumble into a shell hole and get beautifully soaked. At one place in the descent an immense ‘mine’ had been exploded, and we had to go single file at one side to pass its yawning crater. Meanwhile shells were falling as if no thought of an armistice had ever entered the boche mind.

“It was not until 3 a. m. we reached the ruined village where regimental headquarters were to be. The 3d battalion went a mile ahead and spread out to make contact with the first battalion on the right and second battalion on our left. Altogether the regiment took over a front of about four and one-half miles.

“We found a place for an aid-station, built a little fire in the fire-place and waited for dawn and the ‘zero hour,’ when our men and men from miles north and south of us of other regiments were to attack.

“This was the morning of November 11. Can you imagine the thoughts of our men as they huddled in trench and shell hole waiting, waiting! They had marched 18 to 20 miles through the mud, carrying packs, guns, ammunition, grenades, etc.—no light load. They were in a strange country, with Prussian machine guns and artillery in the thick fog just ahead. That these Prussians could and would fight, there was no doubt; a long line of men from the 130th lying on stretchers along the road as we came into town, waiting ambulances, proved that. They knew that peace might come in a few hours, but meanwhile they must go over and engage in deadly contact with the enemy. To be so near safety and yet so far, must have been maddening.

“It was still dark and foggy at 5 o’clock when we attacked. To those of us at the aid station it seemed as if the Germans were up early and waiting, for their artillery redoubled its fire and their machine guns began a tremendous rattle. (Afterwards they told us they knew all our plans in advance, that we were to relieve the 130th and make an attack.)

“Our men advanced slowly but steadily, widely spread out because of the wide front and our depleted numbers. A few became lost in the fog and were captured (later that day they were mostly turned loose and told to go back to our lines.) Here and there some portion of the line would have to stop to rout out a machine gun ‘nest’ or shoot a ‘sniper’ out of a tree, or fall flat until German artillery slackened. The Germans had a system of signaling to their guns in the rear with Klaxon horns. However, the fog helped us on the whole and our men kept on.

“About 8 o’clock my orderly returned from regimental headquarters where he had gone with a message, and said our colonel had just gotten word by telephone the armistice had been signed by Germany and hostilities were to cease at once! You can imagine our joy. There was with me at the aid station Chaplain Clinch, Lt. Karr (our dentist) and the French interpreter. Chaplain Clinch and I have been together for over two years in Texas, in 1916, and with the 129th since it was called out. We are about the only officers left of the original lot—in fact I can’t think of another officer of the old ‘Third Illinois’ who was with it in 1917 (July) and Nov. 11, 1918, at the finish. The chaplain and I have been in some tight places together and you can imagine we fell to congratulating each other. Lt. Karr, too, although he is a dentist and could have remained in the rear, has never missed a day when the regiment was at the front. He, too, shared our joy. As for our French interpreter, he has been in the war ever since 1914, a private in the infantry until six months ago, several times wounded. His feelings at the good news can well be imagined.

“It was not so easy to get word to the front to ‘cease firing,’ but about 9:30 we noticed the machine guns and rifles had ceased their steady patter. Afterwards, we learned the German buglers blew ‘recall’ about the same time ours did.

“Then to our surprise, ‘Fritz’ opened with seemingly all his artillery. Shells fairly rained into the town we were in—every 3 to 5 seconds. A piece of shrapnel came through the window of the aid post, just missing a hospital corps man who was bending over a wounded soldier on a stretcher. Some were gas shells, and soon we all began to sneeze, so it was necessary to put on our masks. (The Germans claimed afterwards the artillery men heard the bugles and thought it a signal for more fire. I think they were trying to use up their ammunition).

“However, about 11 o’clock, their fire suddenly stopped entirely. None of our guns had been firing since 9:30 and for the first time in months and years absolute quiet and peace reigned along the battle front. How strange it seemed—and how good! We wanted to cheer, sing, shout, anything to express our feelings. How we wished the band might have been there to play ‘Illinois.’ but of course they were far in the rear. One bright private asked us if we had noticed that ‘the war ended on the eleventh day of the eleventh month at the eleventh hour—three elevens, which together made our division number—thirty-third.’

"I walked about two miles north to see how our second battalion had fared. How fine it seemed to walk through the battle scarred fields with never a worry as to German shelling. I got pretty well in front of our lines and stumbled on the unburied body of an American soldier who must have fallen when we wrested this territory from the Huns in September. I found his name and regiment from his dairy, (he was from Connecticut), and reported it to our divisional officer who has burials to look after. Further down the road I met four boys carrying the silent form of one of their comrades on a stretcher. He had been killed just a minute or two before the bugles blew 'cease firing.' I can't help feeling his death and one other man was a useless sacrifice. Perhaps it was necessary, but it seemed very sad.

"At our second battalion everyone was equally happy. Capt. Blodgett, who was with me in 1916, was helping at our aid post. He has been with a machine gun battalion but volunteered the day before to come up and help us out.

"Among the happiest men I saw was a tall Prussian who had wandered in. He was not a prisoner, just came over to be sociable, as did several others. He wanted to shake hands with everyone, and said: 'Now we Germans are free!' Earlier in the day the Germans had captured one of our wounded. Their doctor dressed him, then they carried him back to our lines. One of our Rockford boys was captured in the fog. The Germans took him back, fed him and turned him loose.

"At this aid station I saw a slightly wounded man, whose pocket 'Testament' undoubtedly saved his life, stopped a machine gun bullet, which would have struck his heart. I had heard of such cases, but had never before witnessed one.

"The last shell in this town struck not twenty feet from the aid station. It made a tremendous hole, and scattered the bones of four French soldiers buried there in 1914. The Germans had erected a little monument with the inscription (in German) 'Here rest four French soldiers who died for their country.'"

SERGEANT CULLOM DEAD IN FRANCE

(Pontiac Daily Leader, January 10, 1919)

One week ago Mrs. Ford B. Johnson received a letter from her brother Sergeant Charles H. Cullom of Company G, 108th Ammunition Train with the A. E. F. in France. The letter stated that he was in fine health and spirits and was attached to the Thirty-third division, then on its march toward Germany; that he had recently experienced many hardships in the hard fighting his regiment had been engaged in during the big drive and also that he had been cited for bravery. He closed his letter by stating that he would tell her all about it when he arrived back home. But the lips that were to tell the tale of battles fought and won, and of many experiences in France are now forever sealed, for they have lisped the answer to the call of angel hosts and the soul

that made noble, he who now lies cold in death in a United States military cemetery somewhere in France, has gone to bask in the eternal sunshine in the realm that lies out beyond the shadows. The sad news of his death was received by Mrs. Johnson late yesterday afternoon from her sister, Mrs. Marcy, of Peoria, who stated that death was due to pneumonia.

Charles H. Cullom was born in Pontiac 28 years ago, being the eldest son of Jesse and Ella Cullom. He attended the public schools here and learned the trade of upholsterer in the factory of the Ott Lounge Company. When this company quit business Charles left Pontiac to work at his trade in Minneapolis. At the age of 18 he became a member of Company F, Third Illinois National Guard, and when he left here was mess sergeant for the company. When war broke out with Germany he was engaged in business in the state of Oklahoma. Disposing of his business at once he came to Pontiac, received a transfer from the captain of Company F, to a company in Pekin, Ill., of the Fifth regiment where he had several young friends, and departed with this company for Houston, Texas, where he received his training, and in the spring of 1918 sailed for France with the Thirty-third division. Enlisting as a private, he was soon promoted to corporal and later to sergeant in an ammunition train. He took part in all the battles in France in which the Thirty-third division was engaged and came through without injury. After the armistice was signed he went with this division to Germany and was on his way there when last heard from.

LAST OF PRAIRIE DIVISION'S SWEEP TOLD BY CLINNIN

Exploits of the Prairie Division in the last days of the fighting are detailed in a letter received by an Illinois representative from Col. John V. Clinnin of the One Hundred and Thirtieth Infantry. Col. Clinnin's letter follows:

Bettendorf, Luxemburg, December 25, 1918.

The Prairie division went into action Sept. 26, attacking along the Meuse from Le Mort Homme and Hill 304. We carried everything before us and captured all the ground north of Forges creek, between Bethencourt and the west bank of the river, and as far north as Brioules. Then we dug in and waited for our left divisions to catch up.

On Oct. 7 we crossed to the east bank, attacking and capturing Brabant, Consenvoye and Bois de Consevoye. Your friend, Col. Abel Davis and the old Second Illinois led this attack.

On the 10th the 129th infantry and my regiment, the 130th, 'leaped frog' over the 132nd and 131st infantry, taking Bois du Chaume and Bois de Platte Chaine. We held this line until October 21, when we were relieved by the French colonials.

From this point we marched forty-three kilometers to the St. Mihiel salient at Stremy, Les Eparye, relieved the 79th division, and proceeded to attack the Hun in this new sector on Nov. 8. I took Chateau de Aulnois, and on the 10th

captured Marechville, taking seven officers, 123 prisoners, and destroying a battalion of German infantry.

On the morning of Nov. 11 we attacked again, taking Riaville and St. Hilaire, and were forging ahead when the order to cease firing reached us.

Since the close of the war we have been engaged in ridding ourselves of cooties, etc., and on Dec. 7 were ordered to join the army of occupation in Germany, marching from Troyon via St. Maurice, Woel, Marsia, Tour, Conflans, Norroy, Mercy au Bac, Villerupt, Luxemburg, Wasserbillig, Oberbillig, Germany, and then back to this point on the Luxemburg border.

If our shoes hold out we will come home via Berlin, Petrograd, Alaska, etc. Our task as fighting men is about over. We have a few little matters to adjust as peacemakers, and then we will be home to don 'cits,' take up our place in the ranks of industry within the state of Illinois, and aid good government in the affairs of the state.

ILLINOIS MEN HAVE REAL CHRISTMAS FEAST

HEADQUARTERS COMPANY OF 129th INFANTRY ENJOY WONDERFUL YULETIDE SPREAD IN LUXEMBURG

After weeks of tramping, up hill and down hill, across valley and stream, the boys of Headquarters Company, 129th Infantry, of the Prairie Division, arrived in what seemed to be a definite location about the middle of December. They were billeted comfortably in the beautiful city of Ettelbruck, in the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, and after looking after their billets they began to give the menu for their Christmas feast a good deal of thought. There were several days in which to act and secure results, and Captain Burton, commanding the company heard the questionings regarding the Christmas "feed" and gave the subject due thought.

Upon taking inventory of the company council book, Captain Burton found that some two thousand francs had been carried through France, and not anticipating any use for said francs for a Christmas dinner in 1919, he decided that the Christmas at hand was the all important one, and decided to use the francs to secure a corking good feed. Accordingly, the captain proceeded to make an early purchase of two Luxemburg fattened pigs, several chickens, as well as six kegs of Diekirch's best. These provisions were turned over to Mess Sergeant Lindley with instructions to make the "men holler quit."

To step back a little, the Headquarters company has the good fortune to be billeted in the spacious grounds of an insane asylum. The entire first floor of the main building was filled with long tables, sufficient to seat the entire personnel of the company, 346 enlisted men and officers. These tables were covered with honest-to-goodness snow white table cloths and enough real china to do away with all tin mess kits for the one day. The only things the dough-boys were required to bring were knife, fork, spoon and a hearty appetite. Most of them were equipped.

Sergeant Clyde Ousley and Private Leo Tondreau, the committee on decorations, secured pine trees, and used huge branches to make a greenwood bower of the "banquet hall." The room with its well laden tables, was a sight never to be forgotten, and when the company filed in to the tables, led by its officers, and the entire regimental staff, with the band blaring away in its best fashion the dear old "Illinois"—well, hearts were full and some eyes were wet.

The committee had a menu printed with the roster of the company and these were placed at each plate to serve as a souvenir of their first Christmas dinner in Luxemburg. The Y. M. C. A. representative had a package of Camel cigarettes and two bars of sweet chocolate at each plate as a Christmas gift from the "Y." The boys then proceeded to do full justice to the following menu: Roast pork with apple sauce, roast chicken with brown gravy, mashed potatoes, tomatoes, lettuce salad, coffee, ice cream, Christmas cake, cigars, chocolate, apples and Luxemburg liquors.

The band played furiously during the entire repast, and altogether it was the most wonderful feast enjoyed since entering the service, although the boys said, with all due respect to Luxemburg, they hoped this would be their last Christmas in Luxemburg or anywhere else but in the U. S.

At the close of dinner Company Clerk Eugene Ferron arose and said: "The commanding officer of the 129th infantry, officers of our company, and fellow soldiers: Christmas, 1918, will be long remembered by me because of the special detail I have been called upon to perform. I wish to take this opportunity of extending to the commanding officer of the 129th infantry the appreciation of the men of Headquarters Company for his kind wishes extended to them. And to you, Captain Burton, I tender the sincere thanks and appreciation of the men of your command. Soon we will be back to our homes, and each will have a story to tell of what he did, but there is one thing, Captain, you will not tell, for being a brave soldier and a gallant officer, you will not tell of the respect and honor that the men of your command held for you. When you tell your story to that little boy of yours who is waiting, Captain, we want you to tell him all and in order that you will do so, I have the honor today to make you the custodian of this—for him—which will express the sincere regard and respect which is yours from the men of your organization."

And the little box which was handed to Captain Burton for young Mr. Burton contained a gold watch and chain, a souvenir of Luxemburg.

Comagnac, interpreter.

129th INFANTRY WITH THE ARMY OF OCCUPATION

Stegen, Luxemburg, January 9, 1919.

We are just getting located in our new billets. Yesterday we packed up and hiked six kilometers to Stegen, our present location. Doe and I are billeted with a private family—our bed is a billowy one, feather beds above and below us. There is only one thing wrong with it, these beds are only about five feet long and the natives insist upon equipping them with a pillow about two feet high—they must sit up in bed, and that is why the beds are so short.

Our captain, Daddy Carr, has not been returned to the company from the hospital as yet, much to our sorrow, as we have a Captain Kennedy for our skipper, and he doesn't seem to know that the war is over, to judge by the way he has been drilling us lately.

This is a beautiful country and has all sorts of hills in varying degrees of height. Funny thing, too, for this time of year, the grass is as green as in the spring and it has not been cold. These Luxemburgites have sure been lucky, too, in not being in the war. Seems queer to see young men around in civilian clothes. There were no young men in civilian clothes in France. The people show every evidence of prosperity, I might almost say wealth—they dress well, in woolens and satins—and this despite the heavy war tax they are obliged to pay. The family with whom we are staying have to give the Luxemburg government ten litres of milk each day besides the money tax.

Nearly all the old men are back with the company. I guess Dick Reed is on his way to the states. He and I were together when we were gassed on Whizbang Hill. He got a bad burn on his knee, besides inhaling the gas. During the night of the twelve hour gas attack a gas shell dropped into a little hole where one of my men was lying, splashing the liquid mustard all over him. It was while Reed and I were pulling him out of the hole, I think, that Dick put his knee in the mustard. We carried the man back to a first-aid station, but he died a few days later from the severe burns he had received. Our platoon had about 50 men and one officer when we went into the line at Whizbang Hill. I was in command of the platoon when we were relieved about seven days later, and I had seventeen men in the platoon—so you can see that we were in a pretty tight place to have suffered such casualties.

HARRY CAMPBELL PNEUMONIA VICTIM

(Pontiac Daily Leader, April 11, 1919)

On the eve of relief from the arduous duties of service in the army of occupation, on the very threshold of returning to the beloved homeland he had fought so valiantly to save, Harry Patrick Campbell, a member of the Machine Gun company of the 129th infantry, succumbed to pneumonia in a hospital in Ettlebruck, Luxemburg. Weakened by long exposure to the elements in the

flaming days prior to the signing of the armistice, when the Yankee soldiers fought in the strips of forest in the Argonne and in the mud and water in trenches in the fields of France, Private Campbell was an easy victim to the dread disease, having been ill but a few days.

It was but yesterday morning that his prostrate parents received a long letter from him telling that he would soon be home again and that his unit was preparing to go to a seaport for transportation back to the good old U. S. A. The letter was dated March 24.

The sad incident has torn the very hearts of the little home on Sherman avenue. With one gold star already displayed for the death of their younger son, Joseph Campbell, who was electrocuted at the Great Lakes on July 17, 1918, now another death has saddened the home.

His brave mother, Mrs. Julia Campbell, is frantic, brooding continually over the irreparable loss of her two hero sons. "My boys, my boys," she sobbed. All night long Mrs. Campbell cried hysterically asking for her sons.

NURSE WRITES PARENTS

(Pontiac Daily Leader, May 10, 1919)

"April 3, 1919. My dear Mrs. Campbell: Washington has notified you long before this, the news which must have brought much sadness to you, and Chaplain Smith, who is stationed here, I know, has written you details regarding your son's death, but as a representative of the Home Communication section of the American Red Cross, I want to add my deep sympathy to theirs, for truly I feel much for those whose soldier sons will not come, but who have gone beyond on this side of the Atlantic.

Your boy came to the hospital on March 27, suffering from bronchial pneumonia. His American doctors and nurses did all they could for him, but he was only sick a very short while, as at 5:30 this morning of April 1 he quietly passed away, having had the Catholic priest with him the night before who administered to him all the last blessings and sacraments of the church.

I talked with him in the evening of March 28, and he talked of you and said in a few days when he felt a little better he wanted me to write you for him, so although you will never receive that letter, still I know it is of comfort to you to feel that he had you in his thoughts and wanting you to hear from him. He was buried with full military honors in the little A. E. F. cemetery which is next to the church nearby the hospital. The priest held the service while a squad of our American soldiers stood by your son's coffin, which was covered with an American flag and flowers which the Luxemburg people gave as a mark of honor to your boy. I took one of the flowers and am enclosing it to you. As the coffin was lowered the bugler sounded 'taps' which resounded so beautifully in the quiet cemetery here, it seemed like a call from beyond. His grave is No. 57 and is registered with the Graves Registration Bureau of the A. E. F. I wish there were more I could tell you to be of comfort to you, but all I can say

is what a splendid patient your son was and that we all who are here extend to you and to all the family of Private Campbell our very deep sympathy and wish with you that your son might have been spared to go home to you.''

129th LANDS AT HOBOKEN

(Pontiac Daily Leader, May 22, 1919)

Big Delegation meets boys from Illinois. Gloomy weather fails to dampen ardor of home-coming soldiers or welcoming crowds.

Poking her nose through a dense fog, the giant transport Leviathan entered New York harbor this afternoon and proceeded to her dock at Hoboken.

Harbor craft carrying home folks from Illinois met the Leviathan down the bay and escorted her to her dock.

There was a big delegation on hand to welcome the 129th Infantry from Illinois.

The great vessel's decks were packed with troops, who waved and shouted. Many who came from the west to meet the troops were gathered at Hoboken ready to cheer the men as they marched from the transport. The gloomy weather failed to dampen the ardor of the welcoming delegation or of the khaki clad boys as they marched from the vessel.

Other transports which had been waiting in the lower bay for the fog to thin out were expected to move up to their berths in the late afternoon despite the mist.

HOME FOLKS WELCOME 129th

(Pontiac Daily Leader, June 2, 1919)

Prairie Division Men Given Royal Welcome.

Returning Heroes Detrain at Chicago This Morning and are Accorded Monster Demonstration.

With fair skies above them and joy crazed relatives pressed tightly about them, the second contingent of the 33d Prairie Division passed in final review here today.

At 11 o'clock a whistle was blown by a mounted officer at the head of the column. Drum majors raised their batons, music blared forth and wave after wave of khaki clad soldiers passed down the streets.

More than a million persons were believed to have participated in the welcome to this contingent. With arrival down town the khaki clad soldiers were surrounded by relatives from all northern Illinois. Fathers, wives, sisters and sweethearts were finally torn away from their boys and the parade was on.

Pretty girls strewed the heroes' path with flowers.

Hobnails dipped into a literal carpet of blossoms. Overhead an airplane circled, capering the joy of the city. Occasionally the bomb dropping device intended to deal death to the enemy, released showers of flowers which fell on the shoulders and tin hats of the doughboys.

The men were welcomed with a steady roar of cheers. The cheering rose to a crescendo with the appearance of the head of the parade, died away momentarily to be renewed again when some particular hero was sighted or when Col. Joe Sanborne passed by with his staff.

CO. F SPEEDING TO PONTIAC

(Pontiac Leader, June 6, 1919)

Local Heroes Expected to Arrive on Hummer.

Livingston County Soldiers Receive Discharges at Camp Grant and Entrain for Home.

They're on their way home!

This was the good news received here this morning concerning "Pontiac's Own" who have been at Camp Grant, Rockford, for several days awaiting their honorable discharges.

True, several of the doughboys arrived home last night and during the early hours of today, but the greater portion of them will tonight sleep in the bed that mother has been fussing over and about for the past two weeks or since she learned that her son had arrived in this country again.

The Chamber of Commerce officials arranged for a reception committee and the band to meet the afternoon train in case any of the boys did arrive at that hour. Tonight the same committee and the band will be on hand to meet the Hummer and every citizen is urged to turn out and give the home-coming lads the proper sort of a reception.

PONTIAC SOLDIERS WARMLY WELCOMED

(Pontiac Leader, June 7, 1919)

'Twas the end of a perfect day. As the old town clock on the court house tower pealed solemnly the hour of twelve, a shrill whistle rang through the air, warning the hundreds of anxious welcomers that the train bearing the last contingent of Pontiac and Livingston county's own was speeding onward and drawing close to its destination. It carried a score or more of members of the 129th, who are back from war.

Pontiac turned out en masse last night to welcome her heroes. Delirious thousands met the Chicago & Alton "Hummer" when the vanguard of Pontiac's contingent of troops of America's fighters reached their native town. Long before the scheduled time for the train to arrive hundreds of anxious mothers, fathers, sweethearts, wives and brothers were wending their way toward the station. By train time the biggest crowd that ever welcomed troops in Livingston county was on hand to greet their heroes. Parents paced impatiently up and down the station grounds, each minute seeming hours, realizing that it was but a question of minutes until they would realize what for two long years they had longed for—the return of their soldier sons.

As the "Hummer" made the curve just north of this city a tremendous cheer rang out from the waiting thousands. The big iron horse roared down the tracks. Khaki clad boys hung from the windows as the train sped onward to the station. The immense crowd went wild. Joy leaped all barriers. A great hysteria swept over the mob. The crowd surged in toward the coaches.

A moment later Alonzo Powers, the first of the gallant fighters, swung from the train. Others followed as fast as they could file through the aisles. Powers was greeted by his parents and his sweetheart.

As fast as the bronzed heroes alighted from the coaches they were swept away by their relatives or friends. Hundreds of persons who had relatives and could not reach the train were ferociously tearing their way through the throng, endeavoring to get to them. A few minutes later the fifty-one returning heroes were clasped in the arms of their loved ones.

The khaki army was swallowed up, completely absorbed by the onward rush of that other great army of loved ones. The strain was too great to bear for those mothers and sweethearts, and the barrier came down before the wild rush of women hungering for hugs and kisses that had been denied them so long. The men ran to meet them with heart pumping, throats choking and tears trickling down their red bronzed cheeks. In that first desperate rush those who could not find their own son or husband or sweetheart fell upon those nearest and kissed them in promiscuous abandon.

129th REGIMENT WINS HIGH HONOR

The 129th regiment has been awarded decorations by the United States government and the former French corps commander has asked that recommendations be submitted for the Croix de Guerre.

THE ORDER

The order reads:

"The armistice has been signed and hostilities have ceased, at least for the present. The division commander takes this opportunity of expressing his appreciation and pride to all ranks for their efficient and effective work.

"Shortly after leaving New York in May, 1918, the division took station with the British in the defense of Amiens.

"On the morning of July 4, 1918, part of it attacked, and Americans for the first time in history were associated with Australians, winning the victory of Hamel—described by the commanding general of the Australian corps as 'an historic event of such significance that it will live forever in the annals of our respective nations.' The dash and gallantry displayed on this occasion was recognized by the British commander-in-chief and rewarded by the king. The engagement had far-reaching results.

HELPED IN FINAL ADVANCE

“On the 9th of August, at Gressaire Wood and Chipilly the division materially assisted the beginning of what developed into the final British advance, and were again honored by the British nation.

“On September 26th and October 9th, as part of the First American army, it carried all its objectives in the Verdun sector and held the territory won on both sides of the Meuse.

“It has been awarded decorations by our government, and our former French corps commander has asked that recommendations be submitted for the Croix de Guerre. Such is the record of this division.

“The commanding general congratulates officers and men, soldiers of the great war, on these things done by them in the service of their country.

“This order will be read to the troops at the first formation after receipt by the commanding officers of each unit.”

HIGH TRIBUTE PAID THIRTY-THIRD DIVISION

COPY OF GENERAL ORDER ISSUED BY GENERAL PERSHING CONCERNING
OUR SOLDIER BOYS SENT HOME

A copy of a general order signed by General Pershing, in which the Thirty-third division, of which our soldier boys of the 129th regiment of infantry is a part, has only recently been received. The order, which pays high tribute to their bravery, is as follows:

HEADQUARTERS THIRTY-THIRD DIVISION,
AMERICAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCES.

Bulletin No. 141.

Luxemburg, Dec. 27, 1918.

General order 232, Headquarters A. E. F., dated December 19, 1918, is published for information, and for compliance with the last paragraph thereof:

“It is with a sense of gratitude for its splendid accomplishments, which will live through all history, that I record in general orders a tribute to the victory of the First army in the Meuse-Argonne battle.

“Tested and strengthened by the reduction of the St. Mihiel salient, for more than six weeks you battered against the pivot of the enemy line on the western front. It was a position of imposing natural strength, stretching on both sides of the Meuse river from the bitterly contested hills of Verdun to the almost impenetrable forest of the Argonne; a position, moreover, fortified by four years of labor designed to render it impregnable; a position held with the fullest resources of the enemy. That position you broke utterly, and thereby hastened the collapse of the enemy’s military power.

“Soldiers of all the divisions engaged under the first, third and fifth corps—the 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 7th, 26th, 28th, 29th, 32d, 33d, 35th, 37th, 42d, 77th,

78th, 79th, 80th, 82d, 89th, 90th and 91st—you will be long remembered for the stubborn persistence of your progress, your storming of obstinately defended machine gun nests, your penetration, yard by yard, of woods and ravines, your heroic resistance in the face of counter attacks supported by powerful artillery fire. For more than a month, from the initial attack of September 26th, you fought your way slowly through the Argonne, through the woods and over hills west of the Meuse; you slowly enlarged your hold on the Coter de Meuse to the east, and then on the first of November, your attack forced the enemy into flight. Pressing his retreat you cleared the entire left bank of the Meuse south of Sedan, and then stormed the heights on the right bank and drove him into the plain beyond.

“Your achievement, which is scarcely to be equalled in American history, must remain a source of proud satisfaction to the troops who participated in the last campaign of the war. The American people will remember it as the realization of the hitherto potential strength of the American contribution toward the cause to which they had sworn allegiance. There can be no greater reward for a soldier or for a soldier’s memory.

“This order will be read to all organizations at the first assembly formation after its receipt.

“JOHN J. PERSHING,

“General, Commander in Chief, American Expeditionary Forces.”

Pontiac’s colored soldier boys were given a farewell banquet at Redman’s Hall last evening and the affair, which was under the direction of the Chamber of Commerce, was attended by a large number of representative citizens. The demonstration was a notable one and the young men in whose honor it was arranged have just cause to feel proud of the consideration and sincerity shown by the citizens of the community.

Attorney A. A. Lowry presided as master of ceremonies and following an earnest invocation by Rev. D. A. Bassfield a delicious menu was supplied by the colored ladies of the community. During the banquet Burch’s Orchestra gave an enjoyable concert and John Loughran sang a number of patriotic songs.

Following the menu the soldiers were addressed by a number of prominent speakers including the following: Mayor W. H. Bentley; A. M. Legg, President of the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce; Erastus Hoobler, Vice-President of the Chamber of Commerce; Attorney L. W. Tuesburg; Attorney F. A. Ortman; S. A. Rathbun, Chairman of the Livingston County Red Cross; W. J. Butler; J. H. Greenebaum; J. M. Lyon; J. A. Gaff.

Upon request of the toastmaster, Capt. Ivan Harper of Co. K, 8 Ill. Inf., made a strong address expressing his appreciation of the respect shown his men by the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce. “I am proud of my Pontiac boys. They are among the best in the regiment.”

All of the colored soldiers present gave expression to their appreciation of the regard shown them by the citizens. During the evening a cash contribution was taken up and given the soldier boys.

COMPANY K NEWS

(By Corp. Guy Lowry, Special Correspondent)

Peoria, Illinois, Sept. 30, 1917.

All the Pontiac boys are enjoying good health and also feel somewhat better after their trip to Pontiac last Monday.

On last Thursday morning I was greeted by Top Sergeant Tisdell as Corporal Lowry, and no one could have received a greater surprise than I. There were several other Bloomington boys who received the same honor as myself.

Russell Porter was raised from second-class private to first-class private.

On last Saturday Richard Jackson and Joseph Boswell were among the eleven men who went to Canton, Illinois, to be escorts at the funeral of Charles Michael, who was a member of Company I, of Springfield. Young Michael was on the border last year and caught a cold on Ten Mile Hill and did not recover from his illness. These two Pontiac boys said they were well taken care of and received the good will of all the people in Canton.

Yesterday Private Joshua Ward was put in the cook kitchen and made a first-class private.

Private Mose Grisson has received his discharge papers and has returned to his home in Pontiac.

Corporals Jacob Ward and Leonard Marshall are still on the job doing fine work.

OUR COLORED SOLDIERS

Pontiac's colored sons showed themselves not a whit less patriotic than their white brothers. The declaration of war was no sooner signed than the colored boys of Pontiac evidenced their zeal and loyalty by their volunteer enlistments. Many of them joined the colors at Bloomington, being enrolled with Co. K, Eighth Illinois Infantry, which was later transferred to the federal service as the 370th Infantry.

In July, 1917, the company mobilized with the regiment at Peoria, leaving for Camp Logan, Texas, on October 12. They left Camp Logan in March, 1918, and reached France, April 22. They were trained with a French division from April 29 to June 23, when they went into the trenches near Regonville for a week. Following this, they were ten days in the trenches at Vraineourt, being with one of the best French divisions.

The 370th left for the Verdun front on August 16, 1918, and went into the front line trenches on September 14. Here they were subjected to heavy shell fire and gas attacks, and rendered gallant service in their pursuit of the enemy.

They were transferred to Honoyn, and on November 9 were again pursuing the fleeing enemy forces, and were in the battle line when hostilities ceased with the signing of the armistice on November 11.

It is said the old Eighth probably made the last capture of the war. The story is that the objective given the regiment on that day was not particularly difficult, so the negro troops neglected to stop when this objective was achieved, and kept on going. The French divisional commander sent a messenger to the colonel in command of the 370th, ordering the men to cease firing at 11 a. m., but by the time the messenger caught up with these whirlwind troops it was ten minutes after the Germans had stopped firing, and just as the colored boys were writing into their history of brave deeds another notable one—the capture of a German army train of fifty wagons.

On January 10, 1919, the 370th reached Brest, France, and landed in New York on February 9, where they were given a great ovation by the people of that city, as they were when they reached Chicago, on their way to Camp Grant, Rockford, Illinois, where they were to receive their discharges.

The record of the 370th is indeed a glorious one. Perhaps no higher compliment has been paid them than was that they received from the enemy. So fearless were they in their advances upon the enemy that the Prussian Guards, some of the Kaiser's choice troops, named them the "Black Devils." Many of the boys of Co. K wear decorations for distinguished service, conferred upon them by the French and American governments, officially attesting the devotion and bravery of these lads.

COLORED FIGHTERS FILTERING HOME

(Pontiac Daily Leader)

Pontiac's dusty heroes, members of the "Black Devils," as called by the Germans, veterans of a hundred battles, are drifting back to their home town one by one.

Jacob Ward arrived in town some time during the long hours of last night. Alonzo Barnes and Joshua Ward are still spellbound in Peoria, and are expected to arrive home some time tonight. Guy Lowry and Leonard Marshall, two other members of the "Partridges" from this city, are confined to the base hospital at Camp Grant, Lowry suffering from a boil on his shoulder and Marshall with pneumonia. Pontiac's dusky population are meeting every train from Peoria and are "rarin'" to give the boys a real welcome when they arrive.

"Where are the rest of the boys?" a Leader reporter asked Jacob this morning. "Well, I'll tell you, them devils can't get away from Peoria long enough to come home! It's just banquets and then more receptions, and they

haven't got time to come home. But I stayed away as long as I could and just had to come home."

HAVE BANQUET COMING

When Pontiac's fighting colored heroes all get home they are to be the guests at another banquet planned by the Chamber of Commerce.

Jacob Ward and Jodie Boswell, the two "Partridges" already home, are the center of a host of admiring friends. These colored boys were all enlisted men. They enlisted with Company K at Peoria, Ill., in July, 1917. They went to a southern cantonment, where they received their preliminary training and sailed for France from Hoboken, N. J., on April 6. They landed in Brest, France, on April 22. After a short training over there they were taken up to the lines and engaged in their first fight at the Argonne forest, where they fought for a number of days, and were later in the St. Mihiel sector. After the battle at St. Mihiel they were sent back to a rest camp for a week and again entered the line on the Soissons front.

AWARDED WAR CROSS

It was during the engagement on this front that "Josh" Ward made the Germans like it. "Josh" and several of his partners captured some German cannon, for which he received the Croix de Guerre, being decorated on September 21 by a French general.

When all the work was done in the Soissons sector the "Black Devils" were sent up to the Belgian border to scrap the Huns, and were the first allied forces to reach that territory.

"When the armistice was signed we were on the Belgian border and fighting like the devil," said Jodie Boswell, "and then we were sent back to a rest camp and all of a sudden they were saying, 'All aboard for the United States,' and believe me, dat didn't make dis gang of boys sore eider."

GLAD TO GET HOME

The regiment, officially the 370th United States Infantry, and formerly the Eighth Illinois, arrived in New York on February 9 and were sent to Camp Grant, where they were discharged.

"I sho' am glad to get back to dis town and it's de best town in the world," said Private Jacob Ward, "and I don't intend to leave it again for a long time."

These brave colored lads fought and suffered in the front line trenches for six months. Seven originally left this city and were fortunate in having only one wounded, he being George Holiday, who is at present in a hospital in Kentucky suffering from wounds in the right knee. The personnel of Pontiac's "Black Devils" is as follows: Corporal Guy Lowry, Alonzo Barnes, Leonard Marshall, Joshua Ward, Jacob Ward, Leonard Marshall and George Holiday (wounded).

LIEUT. C. M. DARGAN NOW AT FT. DODGE

Camp Dodge, Des Moines, Iowa, Aug. 30, 1917.

Since leaving our good town of Pontiac over two months ago I have been moving around the middle west. My first assignment was to Fort Riley, Kansas, to the medical officer's camp. There we had a strenuous and intensive course in military medicine, hygiene and sanitation, and instruction in army regulations. Our day began at 5:15 in the morning, and except for meals, was one continuous schedule ending at 4:00 in the afternoon, with a four or five mile hike. After supper we studied until taps, at 10:00 o'clock.

In the middle of July a great many of us were sent out on assignments to the different states in the central department for the purpose of mustering into the federal service the National Guard. To my lot fell Wisconsin and for nearly a month we were stationed at Camp Douglas, Wisconsin, inspecting the 14,000 men of that state.

I returned to Fort Riley last week and a few days afterwards was assigned as regimental surgeon to a new infantry regiment to be formed at Camp Dodge. I understand that many Illinois men will be sent here, and perhaps some from Pontiac. I am sure they will be surprised at the immensity of the project here and with the rapidity with which it has been built. Until the present year this was the site of the state rifle range. Now large tracts of land have been added to the original reservation until it covers an area of nearly 3,000 acres. Upon this has been built the double-decked type of barracks with which you no doubt are familiar. These barracks extend for four miles along the interurban tracks. It is expected that 40,000 men will be taken care of here this winter.

In the medical line we are going to have our hands full. We regimental surgeons must individually, with our assistants, organize and equip our detachments, teach them the principles of hygiene, nursing, drilling and ambulance work, then take charge of a regimental hospital of thirty to fifty beds which will be an integral part of each regimental organization. The enlisted men in this department will be trained to be efficient nurses. You may be sure that the medical aspect of this war is being thoroughly organized and trained.

COUNTY SOLDIERS EN ROUTE TO CAMP

(Pontiac Daily Leader, September 6, 1917)

Sixteen young men, Livingston County's first offering to the new national army, left this morning for Camp Dodge, Des Moines, Iowa, the training camp for the drafted men of Illinois.

The sixteen, under command of Silas Max Trumbo, left over the B. P. and J. electric line at 5:45. Accompanying the young men was John S. Murphy, secre-

tary of the local board. He went as far as Joliet and remained with them until they boarded a Rock Island train. They are expected to arrive at Camp Dodge about 8:30 tonight. Despite the early hour of their departure a goodly number of persons were on hand to bid them farewell.

Last evening the entire sixteen were guests of the board at dinner at the Phoenix hotel. Following the tremendous reception given them during Tuesday evening they were excused until 5 o'clock this morning. Many of them slept last night in the jury room in the court house, a large, clean and airy bedroom. Others residing here or having relatives in the city remained all night at home.

Late Tuesday afternoon Secretary Thomas Killin, of the local Y. M. C. A., on behalf of the directors of that institution, presented each of the men with an introduction card addressed to the secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at Camp Dodge.

Camp Dodge, Iowa, September 6, 1917.

For once the 5:10 was on time and the first contingent from Livingston County was soon on its way. We arrived in Joliet and had a dandy breakfast at the Woodruff Inn. While we were killing a couple of hours there the bunch had a group picture taken which we hope will be good. At ten o'clock we took a local train along with groups from Kankakee and Joliet in a special car and picked up three more at Morris, Ottawa, and LaSalle.

The car was set out at Rock Island at 1:30, allowing us thirty minutes to get dinner at the railroad lunch room, and it was then hooked on to the Coast Limited which arrived at Des Moines at seven o'clock. After supper at the Randolph Hotel we caught a car for Camp Dodge, arriving here at 9:20, and were at once registered and assigned.

After assignment each man was taken to his company's quarters, issued a straw mattress, blanket, and eating utensils, and assigned to a sanitary cot on the second floor of the barracks. On the first floor are recreation rooms, dining rooms, and company headquarters. Between each two rows of buildings are the bath and toilet rooms. Of course although the buildings themselves are completed, yet a great many details have not been finished. But when the rest of the men are received into camp it will not take long to have it in shipshape order.

It was impossible to obtain at this time the various assignments of the men. The writer was assigned as follows: Private, 1st Bn., 313 Engrs., Co. C. However a complete list will be posted within the next few days and a copy will be forwarded. The conditions and surroundings of the camp are first class, the food is especially good, we are getting a good variety, well cooked and plenty of it. The officers are an especially fine bunch of men and seem to take a special interest in getting this division into shape as soon as possible.

Few people realize the magnitude of this camp, but it stretches for three miles in a line of four two-story buildings wide and will house forty-five thousand men. Everybody from Livingston County is well.

A LOYAL GREEK

Several days ago Pericles Nicholas Petropolous, a Greek of this city, was examined for service in the new national army by the local examining board. He refused to make a declaration for exemption at that time on account of being an alien, stating that he desired to go with the boys from Pontiac who would be called for service abroad. He passed the examination and in order to make the possibility of rejection because of being an alien as remote as possible he appeared before Circuit Clerk J. G. Whitson and applied for his first naturalization papers. He stated in his affidavit that he was born at Scopo, Thracy, Turkey, and that he was twenty-three years of age, and that he had been in the United States since November 13, 1913. His name appears in the accepted list posted today and he now hopes he will be accepted as a member of the new army and that he will get a chance to fight somewhere on the European battle front. He is especially desirous of getting a chance to fight against the Turks who, he says, have tortured and oppressed his parents for many years.

SECOND INCREMENT OF NATIONAL ARMY DEPARTS

(Pontiac Daily Leader of Sept. 19, 1917)

Livingston County's second offering of young men for the new national army and the battle for world-wide democracy is off on the long journey, the first of which ends tonight at Camp Dodge, Iowa.

Pontiac and Livingston County citizens gave them a royal farewell Wednesday night. Although the rain drove many away from the outdoor exercises, yet thousands jammed the street in front of the speakers' stand and stood with bared heads all during the length of the program.

The evening's program began with the 6 o'clock banquet tendered the soldiers of the national army at the First Methodist Episcopal Church by the Chamber of Commerce. The young men were first addressed by Rev. M. L. O'Hara. Music was furnished during the banquet by Burch's orchestra.

Immediately following the banquet the young men were escorted through the business section, the line halting at the speakers' stand on the west side of the court house, where they listened to short addresses by representative citizens of the county.

Camp Dodge, September 21, 1917.

Chairman H. E. Torrance, Pontiac, Illinois:

We all arrived O.K. and I wish to say that we had the best bunch of fellows that I have seen arrive. We left Pontiac at 4 o'clock Thursday morning and arrived at Joliet at 6:15. After breakfast at the Woodruff Inn we joined in the parade with the Joliet Commercial Club and selected men. We left Joliet at 8:30. We had great difficulty in reaching our train as no police assistance was rendered us. Mr. Murphy and myself made a way for the men in front and we had no more than reached the train when it started.

George Sherrington and the men in our last squad were left at the station as the conductor would not stop the train. The train stopped at Seneca to pick up two cars of men from Kankakee and while there "Curly" and the rest of the boys caught up with us on a train leaving Joliet ten minutes later. So all was well after the "scare" and otherwise we all enjoyed the trip and there was a jolly crowd throughout. We reached the interurban switch at Des Moines at 6:30 without going into Des Moines, but there were so many trains we did not get into camp until 8:30 that night. They are not prepared to handle the present amount of men coming in and the first night was rather tough on the boys.

"Curly" was assigned to the engineering corps and I was assigned to the 349th Infantry, Company M. Have been cleaning our mess house up today and will have our first meal in there tonight.

CAMP DODGE MEN WELCOME PAYDAY

(By S. Max Trumbo, Special Leader Correspondent)

Camp Dodge, Iowa, September 29, 1917.

The first of this week's work was begun by breaking in the second bunch of men who arrived during last week. At 7:45 a. m., previous to which we have had breakfast and calisthenics, we are marched two miles northwest to the temporary drill grounds. Here for two and one-half hours the men go through drill and are then marched back for dinner. At 1:10 they are assembled again and go over the same general grind, being dismissed for a short rest at 4:30.

Each day men are detailed for different work, each taking his turn. The work consists of carpentering, plumbing, grading grounds, cleaning barracks, quartermaster detail, kitchen police, dining room waiters, and orderlies.

The various companies were sized up this week, the tallest men being at the right end of each company, acting corporals and corporals acting as sergeants were appointed. So that now for the first time the various units are taking on a resemblance to real troops. Clothes were issued in large quantities so that almost all the men are in uniform, except those who are not proportioned symmetrically, according to ideas of army tailors.

Almost all the various units are in their permanent quarters for the winter, although a few minor changes will be made later. The barracks are nearly all finished as far as the actual construction, and a couple of weeks will see everything ready for the entire bunch of drafted men. The general health of the men here has been fine and should be, as a medical officer is detailed as inspector and a rigid inspection is made of the quarters, kitchens, grounds, etc., every day and if you could hear the calling down a mess sergeant gets over two or three grease spots on the kitchen floor you would appreciate the efforts made here toward absolute cleanliness.

The writer made a trip down to the 349th Infantry last night and saw Joe Whalen, McMillan and Fenton. They said that the boys were all well and working hard for promotion. All had a word of praise for the comfort kits furnished by the local Red Cross. The big thing of interest is the signing of the muster roll tomorrow morning, for pay day will be a welcome happening for the new soldiers who have patronized the exchanges or stores for sweets and fruits pretty freely. The one big drawback is the absence of a laundry of any description here at the camp, so that every soldier is his own wash-woman and rubs dirty clothes with a mixture of Ivory soap, sand and cold water.

Dear Friends: We, the undersigned, each received a sweater you sent to us through James Mauritzen, and we wish to thank you most heartily. We appreciate what the Red Cross has done for us; they have certainly treated us fine every place we have gone and no one can realize how much good they are doing for the soldiers until you become a soldier and see for yourself. The sweaters are all fine and will come in mighty handy during the cold days coming this winter. We have had a few cold days already but for the past few days the weather has been nice and warm. You can rest assured that if we ever get the opportunity to repay you in any way we will be only too pleased to do so. Again thanking you, will close with regards to all.

PONTIAC DRAFTED MAN TELLS OF TRANSFER FROM CAMP DODGE

Camp Logan, November 12, 1917.

Just a line to let you know that we arrived at this camp quite safely. We boarded the train at Camp Dodge at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning, November 3, but were delayed in leaving there through a small accident. We pulled out somewhere about a quarter of a mile from the camp and were just about to pull onto the main line when the front trucks of the engine left the tracks. The trucks under the second car also jumped the tracks. Myself and forty-six others from my company were in this coach. It gave us a little shaking but did no damage. We finally got to Des Moines about 1:00 o'clock and had our dinners on the train. We left there at four and got to Kansas City, Missouri, at 6:15 Sunday morning. From there we were sent south. We stopped at

several places for ice and water to drink. At one place where we stopped were a number of Missouri girls with apples for the boys. Each car got a market basket full and as there were fourteen in the train you can see the girls were well supplied.

Before we reached the next stop we were in a collision with a handcar. Two men were working on a bend in the track. The train came upon them so suddenly that they were taken completely by surprise and did not have a chance to get their handcar off the track. One pair of the wheels of the handcar were jammed into the front truck of the engine, compelling the stopping of the train until the wreckage was cleared away. We reached a small town about eleven o'clock Sunday morning and all of the soldiers got off for exercise. We were marched for one hour through the town. Church services were dismissed and all the members of the congregations came out to watch us as we passed by. The crowds took up a collection with which to purchase more apples for us.

We stopped twice like that on Monday. We reached Camp Logan at four o'clock Tuesday morning. All of us were asleep with the exception of the guards. I do not know how long we will be here.

Dear Friends: We arrived here all O.K. but tired. Sixteen of us left Pontiac last evening on the 7:50 for Joliet, transferred there, and arrived here at Camp Dodge, Des Moines, Iowa, at 8:40 this morning. The train we were on picked up soldiers all along the way to Joliet and a more fun-loving, gay-hearted lot it would be hard to find anywhere. We were soldiers of Uncle Sam after 1:30 Monday.

The Red Cross gave us a supper in the Presbyterian church at Pontiac, and Burch's orchestra played national airs while we ate, and afterwards we were spoken to by some judge of Pontiac, the Presbyterian minister, and T. F. Donovan of Joliet, formerly of Chatsworth. The speeches were all short but full of patriotism. The Red Cross presented the boys with a comfort kit each, for which we will no doubt find plenty of use.

We have done nothing today so far but eat, make a bed apiece, and have a fine time in general, but the sergeant told us our fun was coming. We will remain under partial quarantine for two weeks, no Y. M. C. A., or depot for us, but we can write and can go about the grounds. We now belong to Co. I, 3 Bn., 163 D. B., Camp Dodge. With best regards and love to all, I remain,

PVT. CHARLES IRVIN DEAD IN FRANCE

(Pontiac Daily Leader, January 9, 1919)

"I am in a hospital in southern France and expect to be back to the good old U. S. A. and you before long," said Private Charles Irvin in a letter written to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Irvin, 516 N. Walnut street. The letter was

written under the date of October 24 and Private Irvin was recovering from machine gun bullet wounds in the right leg just below the knee. Today another gold star has been added to the service flag of Livingston county and the first gold star on the service flag of his family, for Private Irvin is dead.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Irvin were in receipt of an official notice this morning from the war department at Washington, D. C., stating that he had died of pneumonia following wounds on December 2, 1918.

Private Irvin was among the first of Livingston county draftants to enter the world conflict. He was a member of the second draft contingent which left this city for Camp Dodge, Des Moines, Ia., early in September, 1917. He remained at Camp Dodge for several months and was later transferred to Camp Pike, Little Rock, Ark., where he received his overseas training. He sailed with the 38th United States infantry and landed in France in April of 1918. After training a short while he and his doughboy regiment entered the thick of the fighting, where he struggled for the cause of democracy, facing death and untold hardships until he was wounded on October 8, when a Hun machine gun riddled his right leg with bullets. He was removed to a field hospital and later to a base hospital, where he classified as unfit for further service and was to be invalided back home. Complications set in which caused his death.

He is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Irvin and was the pride of their fighting family. Mr. and Mrs. Irvin can well be proud of their boy who gave his life for his country, as well as of the other four boys who contributed their services to a just cause.

Charles S. Irvin was born in Odell, Illinois, on December 6, 1894. He lived in that city several years and received a portion of his education in the schools of that place. Later he moved with his parents to Indiana where they made their home for a short while and several years ago removed to this city. After returning here he entered the Pontiac township high school, where he completed his education and then took up the duties of a farmer in Esmen township, which occupation he was successfully following when called to the colors.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Irvin, of this city; one sister, Mrs. George Clay, of Logansport, Ind., and five brothers, Leo Irvin, naval service, San Francisco, Cal.; R. J. Irvin, 68th C. A. C., France; Clyde Irvin, Handley Paige aero division (discharged), Waterloo, Iowa; Robert Irvin, Jr., 118th Engineers, A. E. F., and James Irvin of this city.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church of this city, which teachings he followed during his life. He was a young man of sterling qualities and habits and will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

SAUNEMIN HERO WELCOMED HOME

(Cullom [Illinois] Chronicle, November, 1918)

Willis Heylin received a great ovation on his arrival in Saunemin, Tuesday morning. As stated in this paper, he returned from France about a month ago and has spent about thirty days in hospitals in the East and at Ft. Dodge,

Iowa, having been severely wounded in the fierce fighting around the Verdun sector in the month of July. We have not heard his story direct from him, but we have been told that his company went over the top and in a fierce battle in which a large number of his companions were killed, he fell badly wounded, but not until he had dropped a Hun with his pistol. The duel was a hot one and Willis realized that it was either he or the Hun, and his marksmanship and grit finally won and Hun went "West." Just a short time afterwards a big shell lit in a trench in which he and thirteen companions were located and the thirteen were killed and he wounded. Two of his companions fell on him. He had taken all of the relics from the Hun he had killed and they were fastened to his belt in such a way that when his companions fell on top of him he was compelled to cut his belt and leave the relics in order to get out. After crawling from under his dead companions, he lapsed into unconsciousness and the next thing he remembered was being in a hospital, which he found out afterwards to be three days later. His limbs were badly shattered and but for his weakened condition one of his limbs would have been amputated. This weakened condition proved to be a blessing, for his limbs are doing nicely and, while one of them will always be stiff, he will be able to get around in good style.

SERGT. R. R. LAW DEAD IN FRANCE

(Pontiac Daily Leader, November 2, 1918)

Another Pontiac soldier boy has given up his life in France.

This morning Jacob R. Law of 1709 South Locust street, received a telegram from the war department in Washington stating that his son, Sergeant Raymond Richard Law, had died in a hospital in France, death being due to bronchial pneumonia.

He was a member of the first large draft contingent which left this county following the departure of the original sixteen. He was sent to Camp Dodge and later to Camp Pike, Ark., where he completed his military training and had been in France for the past six weeks. He was a member of Company I, 354th infantry.

JOYFUL AS HOMECOMING APPROACHES

Somewhere in France, December 25, 1918.

It is with a light heart and many visions of my friends and loved ones at home that I am writing this note. When has the world appreciated the peaceful tidings and greetings of Christmas more than the present? It is with a proud heart that each "Yank" is now penning home a few lines, for they have completed the task of helping to rid the world of that raging maniae for humanity's sake. It is not for me to say what the Sammies have done as the pages of history will reveal that to the world.

You people can imagine the feeling of relief from that strain of not knowing when or where you would be "knocked off," or the adverse conditions we had to live under. But when we cut asunder from the shores of America by the lifting of the gang plank we realized our situation and met it as men should. The night that the news of the signing of the armistice reached us is an incident I shall never forget. About 9:30 p. m. I was returning to the camp after having completed my duties for that day. Our camp was situated in a valley between two mountains and over the one to my right the moon was just showing its face, and down at the camp the men and officers had started monstrous camp fires. To see the men gathering around, singing those old familiar songs, why you could nearly swear that each one had offered a prayer and were many miles across the sea receiving the caresses of their loved ones.

I will not go into details about the geographical situation of France, but will say a few words about the hospitality of the people. Never were we refused the slightest favor by them, and many families took the officers and sergeants into their own homes and billeted them. Their hospitality is exceeded by none.

It might interest you to know that I belonged to the heavy artillery corps. We carried the six-inch rifle, the largest field gun ever used up to this time. As we can now divulge some secrets I will say that it weighed thirteen and a half tons and all the maneuvering was done by the aid of tractors (Holts). Most of the maneuvering was done at night, moving from one position to another, and all we had for lights to guide the convoy were flash lights and the material they use in cigarette lighters. I remember one night, my first, I walked on the road in front of one of the tractors guiding it by the aid of my flash light. It is useless to try to relate all my experiences as I have not the time nor space.

It is now 7 p. m., Christmas day, and it comes to my mind that you people are about to sit down to your Christmas dinner. Many homes have vacant chairs yet, but the feeling that before many months they will be filled once more makes the heart beat faster. The ones I feel for and sympathize with are the ones who received that telegram, those words which have broken thousands of hearts, "Killed in action," or "Died of disease."

The day of our return home is fast approaching, for tomorrow morning at 3 o'clock we are to go through the delousing house and receive our new equipment. To stand up on that deck bidding adieu to France will be a happy moment to each Yank. We are told to expect a rough voyage, but that does not fill us with fear as the mere riding of the waves is a joke to us now.

As my time is limited I must close and thank all for their kind wishes and also thank them for so nobly upholding the boys from around Chatsworth during our stay here. Our people can never conceive the machine Uncle Sam has here. Wishing that you enjoy a Merry Christmas, and will have a joyous and prosperous New Year, I remain,

YANKS HELP CELEBRATE FRENCH INDEPENDENCE DAY

(By Lester W. Foulk)

Somewhere in France, July 14, 1918.

This is the biggest day we have had since leaving the states. Today the mail came in, and believe me there was rejoicing in this camp. We get almost no news here, even about the battle front, and any news is wonderfully welcome.

Another feature of the day was the commemoration of the French Independence day. First at about 9:30 a. m., after inspection, the battalion was drawn up, one-half facing the other, about twenty yards apart in a stone-walled court in the center of the village. Then came a number of little school girls seven or eight years old in their little white aprons and polished hobnailed shoes or sabots, each one spick and span, escorted by their teacher, who is a perfect Charlie Chaplin without an ounce of make-up.

Then followed an old man with dark bushy whiskers and wearing a fancy blue uniform, accompanied by a funny "Oeuf"—the mayor of the village. All marched to the head of the battalion where our chaplain who had charge of the ceremonies was stationed and arranged them along as a choir. Followed then our flag and the French flag, borne by two of our color sergeants, preceded by four buglers who played a march and accompanied by an armed escort. The flags were then placed in the center space and saluted by the assembly. Then followed songs and a sermon by our chaplain and the benediction by the chaplain ended the ceremony for us.

From the reports that come in to us, which are fairly authentic, the Allies are on the way to an early victory which we are hoping for, although of course most of us would like to get up there for a while and get in on the big clean-up.

We just now heard some good news—that Americans had captured 28,000 Huns and had 75,000 surrounded in a trap. Hope it's true, don't you?

Do you folks know what I'm thinking of now? It's this! Some of your cherry pie. Haven't had any pie for a long, long time. Be sure and save me some cherries for pie when I get home.

Haven't seen any fighting Germans yet but have seen great bunches of German prisoners.

Must put out my "glim" now and go to sleep.

PONTIAC MAN WOUNDED

Mrs. David Williams, Sr., was in receipt of a letter yesterday from her son, David Williams, Jr., a member of Co. F, 132 Inf., stating that he had been wounded in action on October 6. He stated that at present he was in a base hospital behind the lines and that he was getting along fine. Dave was a member of the original sixteen draftants from this city to Camp Dodge, and was later transferred to Camp Logan. He has been in a number of important battles along the western front, and this is the first injury that has befallen him in his months of hard fighting.

DEPARTING SOLDIERS GIVEN NOTABLE PATRIOTIC FAREWELL.

(Pontiac Daily Leader, April 3, 1918)

Amid the cheers and farewells of nearly 2,000 people Livingston County's largest contingent of drafted men left this city at 7:05 o'clock Wednesday evening for Fort Wright in Long Island Sound where they are to take up their training in the Coast Artillery Branch of the United States Army.

The party was provided with two special coaches by the Alton system. At Chicago they were transferred by Parmalee busses from the Union to the Michigan Central Station, from where they left at 11 o'clock Wednesday night on a special carrying drafted men from Livingston, LaSalle and Kankakee counties. The men were provided with tourists sleepers at Chicago for their journey eastward.

H. E. Torrance and Dr. J. A. Marshall of the local examining board boarded the train with the drafted men and accompanied them as far as Chicago to see that they were properly cared for.

Promptly at 4 p. m. the 159 men assembled in the Methodist church and each man was presented with a comfort kit and a Smileage book. The comfort kits were presented by the ladies of the Red Cross and the Smileage books by the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce.

At the close of a program arranged for the men they filed into the church parlors and were served a sumptuous banquet.

Following the serving of dinner the drafted men headed by the Pontiac Military Band and accompanied by many hundred citizens paraded through the streets of the business section.

The crowd which assembled at the station to bid the boys God-speed filled the depot grounds and overflowed into the city park, being one of the largest gatherings of like character ever witnessed in Pontiac.

Fort Wright, New York, April 7, 1918.

Dear Parents: I suppose you are wondering how I am getting along by this time. I am O. K. We are in our new home now; arrived here about 5 o'clock Friday evening. Most of the fellows were in good shape when we got here. Of course there were a few that had a little trouble, to take the pleasure out of the journey; one had mumps, one the Liberty measles, one lost his hat, another his suit case. I suppose we looked like hoboes coming in from the jungles the way these officers and soldiers sized us up.

We got plenty to eat Thursday, the first morning on the train. We ate breakfast at Detroit, served by the Red Cross in the basement of the depot. They also put our dinners in the cars there. At Niagara Falls we received our supper and Friday we got our breakfast and dinner at Springfield, Massachusetts. All were box lunches except the breakfast at Detroit.

We stopped at Niagara Falls for about ten minutes. It certainly was fine, the sun shining against the mist above the falls made it look like a rainbow.

Fort Wright is an island in Long Island Sound. I have not seen much of it yet, but it looks as if it were about seven miles long and two miles wide. It used to be a summer resort and it is forty-five minutes' boat ride from land; I should judge about eight miles.

We drilled yesterday. The sergeant took us for a four mile walk this morning. We are about straightened up here now; there are about 140 men in the room I am in. We get up at 5:45, have reveille at 6:00, and have to march a little; have breakfast at 6:30. I will have to close as it is almost 9 o'clock and the lights go out then, and then mum is the word.

Ft. H. G. Wright, New York, June, 1918.

I have passed the examination to go with the band. Before joining the band I was a secondary arm-setter in the plotting room of the range section of the guns, in the ninth company. When the sentinel sighted a ship they telephoned us the message. We got the range and distance for the men at the guns to set their pieces so as to hit the ship. We had to report every thirty seconds in this sort of work.

There is always something to do; for instance, I am scheduled to practice four hours on the drum this afternoon, or I practice on the piano every opportunity.

I volunteered to go to France as bass drummer for the 68th regiment, and if I get to beat the old drum for the troops and in the regimental band I will be the happiest kid on earth. No one knows for sure just who is going to get to go.

The German subs that did the damage on the eastern coast are near this island. They have a gun crew on all guns, day and night, and sub chasers are out by the dozens. But they haven't got them yet. We look for trouble any time. A government boat is here now defending the island.

Today the companies are breaking up. Some are being transferred to other forts, and some are getting ready to go across with the regiment. It will be about four weeks, probably, before they leave. I am enjoying the best of health and like the life.

LIVINGSTON COUNTY'S COAST ARTILLERY IN FRANCE

St. Denis de Piles, Gironde.

This is Christmas night and I am going to write a few lines to you on this occasion, as I have been thinking a great deal of home and home folks today, wondering where you have been eating Christmas dinner, and hoping that you

have had a nice Christmas. We had a splendid time here and a very fine dinner—turkey with dressing, mashed potatoes and gravy, peas, celery, jam, pie and coffee. We got a Christmas box from the Y. M. C. A. and another from our battery, containing chocolates, gum and nuts, in addition to the nice package which you sent to us. The day was nice, warm and sunshiny until about noon, when we had a hard rain with sunshine again in the afternoon, at which time a friend and myself started on a long walk, and on our return trip we called on a very nice French family, with whom we have been acquainted for some time, dividing our candy and gum with the children, which seemed to be a great treat for them, as the poor kids over here get very little candy and do not have toys like the American children.

We are located four miles from Libourne, a city of 30,000, and twenty-five miles from Bordeaux, which is the port from which we will sail when we return to the States. When we landed in France last summer we were nearer the fighting line than at any other time since. We were then within sound of the big guns at that time. At the time the armistice was signed we were getting in shape to go to the front.

Jan. 9, 1919, Cauterets, France.

We have been granted a furlough and about twenty of us boys are located at this place up in the Pyrennes mountains, taking two weeks' vacation. This is a wonderful place, a great health and pleasure resort. We are very busy taking in everything to be seen and heard and do not find a great deal of time to write. This is one of the leave areas which the government has picked out for the American expeditionary force boys who are fortunate enough to get a furlough. This is on the border between France and Spain, about two hundred miles from our camp. This is a great treat for us, as we are putting up at fine hotels, which is quite a contrast to sleeping in barns and old houses, which has been necessary in the camp. On our way we stopped overnight at Bayonne, which is quite a large city, and I was very much surprised to see such up-to-date department stores there. We went through a very old cathedral, which was the finest I have seen in France, also visited a chateau which is over 1200 years old, in which Frenchmen of great title have lived in times past. When we reached the foothills of the Pyrennes, we took a trolley ear to reach Cauterets. Cauterets is a second Monte Carlo, only a little more exclusive. We are getting plenty to eat, with breakfast at 8:30, lunch at 12:00, dinner at 7:00, and life is much different from our regular routine in camp. We have real beds here to sleep in, and we are wondering if we can enjoy camp life on our return. They have a very fine Casino here, and it is now being used for the Y. M. C. A. and is certainly ideal in every way. They have a very fine theatre in the Casino and a show of some kind every night, also one of the very finest club rooms. I can assure you we enjoy the billiard tables. The canteen is always open for business, and we can buy almost anything in the line of

eats, but best of all there are about twenty Y. W. C. A. girls to wait on us, and it surely seems good to *parlez-vous Anglais* once again.

We have been on several long hikes up the mountains, but haven't reached the tops of any of them thus far. We got into snow up to our waists, which stopped us from going any farther. There are a great many side trips which we intend taking before leaving here. This is certainly a wonderful trip and has changed my mind about France, as it is a beautiful country with wonderful scenery, which is apparent when one is permitted to get out of camp to visit different places.

I am sitting tonight on my bunk thinking of home and friends that are far away. My candle is burning low and my cigarette is out but it makes no difference if the war lasts a hundred years. I don't want to come home until the last shot is fired and I don't want to come home until I have accomplished something, so you see we don't get homesick in the army. The boys are singing "Over the Hill to Berlin." It is a song we composed ourselves.

We are regular soldiers over here. Our French comrades treat us like brothers and they try hard to please us. The Y. M. C. A. gives us entertainment and all kinds of amusements. We want for nothing and we are the happiest bunch you ever saw. Why, we seem to be on a vacation. There is not one of us that would want to be drafted for the world. Battery C is worthy of all volunteers and we are certainly glad we volunteered. I hope the war is over before the drafted men get here or they will be getting all the credit, just the same as the public gives them now. We never had any band follow us to the train and we didn't want any, but we think we have seen a better time than the drafted men will ever see because by the time they get here the people's curiosity will be over.

I must close as my candle is just about burned out, so I will light a cigarette and retire to my little bunk upon the boards. Answer soon.

THEODORE BOURLAND WRITES OF SERVICE WITH FRENCH

Aboard S. S. La Tourraine, June 10, 1917.

This is Sunday noon and late Monday night we make Bordeaux. It has been a very uneventful trip. Day before yesterday dolphins and today whales. No U-boats.

There are about 220 ambulanciers aboard—jolly fellows. The Tourraine is an ancient tub, 17-knot, second class with all manner of unlaudable smells. I have a stern cabin, first class, occupying it with three very compatible fellows,

one of them Max Balfour, a cousin of Sir Arthur Balfour. There is a hospital investigation committee of the Red Cross aboard, including Mr. John Rainey, of wild animal photography fame.

It is real impressive to be on deck at night. It is pitch dark, of course; no lights anywhere, portholes shrouded. All ships are painted battleship gray. We have a gun at either end and on watch, in charge of a very hard-boiled marine who speaks no English. I am told his French is very lurid. Also on board are English-French military interpreters.

An unusual incident occurred today. They were taking movies of the after-gun and a gunner pulled the trigger, or whatever they pull on a "75," not knowing it was loaded. Of course it went off toward the coast of Iceland with a terrific boom, frightening the steerage to death and causing a tramp steamer a few miles to the south to wigwag desperately. The poor gunner got an awful reprimand.

Somewhere in France, June 17, 1917.

Am in camp for ten days. I have enlisted in the transport service, (camions), we call it, for the reason that ambulances are no longer active. I pack a casque, and a gas mask, and drive a five and one-half ton Pierce-Arrow. We are now working miles away from the lines, out of range, though all day and night we hear the big guns grumble away and as one approaches the noise gets louder.

A VIVID PICTURE OF BATTLEFRONT

Somewhere in France, June 29, 1917.

I am now in a permanent camp near the front. Not as pretty a place as the former camps, but much more useful. This is the place I'll remain until this sector is inactive, and from rather strong local rumors I am led to believe that this sector's activity is only commencing.

On days fair and without much wind our evening's amusement is to watch the air battles. About 6 o'clock, while we are eating, one usually hears the indescribable noise of shrapnel in the air, then there appear the opening spots of black or white smoke and from six to twenty airplanes chasing about like so many clumsy but playful birds of prey. We are pretty well under the trees here, so the chances of being bombed are pretty thin, and if they did locate us they'd probably get the camions, not the men, machinery being of greater value than flesh.

A few evenings ago I, with two companions, went to a church two kilos distant. Moonlight. One goes up a sort of Pre-Raphaelite mound, a winding upward road, then through an ancient cemetery and then a ruined wall into a vaulted hole and up a pitch-dark winding stair to a tower top. From this tower one looks west, down on many kilometers of front, the whole horizon is alive—smoke clouds, star-shells, signals, and the continued roar. In through

the belfry we saw three bells which have hung through many wars for four hundred years. One passes into a lofty niche and looks down into a peaceful nave, white and lit by a solitary candle. On one side of the candle is a bronze of Jeanne d'Arc; on the other, Saint Louis—almost dark and almost light with suggested images.

I started my first drive at three in the afternoon. We went to the park where we loaded up—no ammunition this time, but trench supplies. We proceeded, between numerous lines of soldiery, mule trains, all the portable things of war. In half an hour we arrived at a certain village under a hill. There we stayed till 10 o'clock, when darkness fell. This was the noisiest place I ever hope to see. The hill above the village was covered with batteries of 75's, 105's, and a few 240's. These were eternally pegging away to and beyond a dark ridge three kilos distant where lie the Boches. The Boches did not reply as often as one would expect.

At dark we cranked up and went into the moonlight. All the roads we traversed had woven screens of boughs or cloth on the Bosches side. Fancy driving a car weighing 10,000 pounds with a 7,000 pound load, at night, without lights, at twenty-five miles an hour; it's rather thrilling, at least, the first time.

One sees few people above ground on this particular road. On either side are the screened entrances to the dugouts where one sees an occasional shadow or a lighted candle. Then we turn and crawl along a wall; "wall" by courtesy only, as the thing is lying about in small pieces, but the Germans were not shelling it that night. Then the chateau where our loads were to be left. Not a light. The roof had been honeycombed with shrapnel. We were told to drive our camion around the end of the chateau. There they unloaded our sacks.

Bosches were shelling some point in our rear in a desultory, bored sort of way and one heard them as they went across, way up over. It is an awfully peculiar sort of noise. Sounds like a human wail. Stuck around half an hour until our van got together and drove home. Back to camp at 3 a. m. Out again last night. Drilled this morning.

For the last two nights we have had a gratis exhibition of pyrotechnics and a little more noise than is comfortable. The roads are packed with traffic; there's the deuce to pay. The Bosches just ruined one park a few days ago. When we arrived the place just simply wasn't there.

A YANKEE IN ENGLAND

Somewhere in England, September 19, 1917.

Dearest Parents: I suppose you folks are wondering how we got across and how I am getting along. We had a good trip with fine weather all the time except the first day, when it rained and the hatches had to be closed to keep waves that came overboard from wetting our bunks; outside of that, it was fine.

We were on the boat twenty-two days and were certainly glad when we landed on September 16. We never sighted a submarine on the entire trip, but two of the other transports, which left us after we got our destroyer convoy, saw one and an American transport sank it by ramming it. We landed in Liverpool and came to this training camp by rail. It took about ten hours to make the trip and we were some hungry bunch when we got here, for we hadn't had anything to eat since breakfast except corned beef sandwiches.

The feed here is not as good as we had back home, but we have got to take into consideration that the English government is feeding us and that they are saving on the food.

We took a hike yesterday and I certainly saw some fine looking country and some pretty houses, but it seems funny that on the entire trip through England and all around here we haven't seen a wooden house.

The railroad coaches and engines, also the freight cars, are a lot different from the ones in the United States. The coaches are divided into first and third class compartments and have side doors. The freight cars are only about a third as large as ours at home and they look something like the cars we have at home in the coal mines. The engines have no headlights or bells and they are a whole lot smaller than ours. The women and girls here do a lot of the work of men. They have girls for conductors on the street cars, and they deliver milk and do other work.

The people around here treat us fine and wherever we go they stop us and ask all kinds of questions about the United States. Some of them thought we were Canadians.

PONTIAC SOLDIER BOY WRITES FROM FRANCE

Writing under date of October 2, 1917.

Have just returned from a sixty-five mile trip around the front and have seen some wonderful things, but will have to refrain from writing of them as censor forbids. The last letter I wrote was written while in a French hospital. At that time we were not able to send men to the American hospital but now they are doing so. We had a great time with the French nurses. They could not speak English, nor we French, so we had to talk with our hands.

Suppose you read in the papers that our regiment was the first of the Americans to put the grand old flag on the front. We received quite a write-up in the Paris edition of the New York Herald and Chicago Tribune. Quite some honor for a bunch of rookies. Sunday, with two friends, I took a stroll about the famous Argonne forest and had a fine trip. We stopped at a funny little house and the obliging French woman cooked a fine meal of egg omelet, French fried potatoes, fish, bread, etc., and we sure went after it. Returning we proceeded to get ready for the nightly visits of the Germans. They certainly have

been after us with their airplanes, bombs and machine guns, and they kicked up some dust. Speaking of dust, when I came back tonight I was white from the dusty roads. We passed truck trains, wagon trains, and soldiers in endless line, all raising their quota of powdered stone. Had a visit from Floyd McDonald, of Odell, who is driving an ambulance. He drove into the hospital grounds one evening. Have not seen Theodore Bourland.

PONTIAC SOLDIER ON FRENCH FRONT

John Caviezel, a member of the headquarters detachment of the Second Regiment, U. S. Engineers, A. E. F., writes under dates of November 2-9, 1917:

There is not a family over here that has not been affected by this dreadful war. I met a young French soldier who is nineteen years old, and his father has been wounded so that he will be a cripple for life, and he has had four brothers killed, so think of his poor mother. There is an orphan home near here in which there are children from seven to fifteen years of age, each of whom has his right arm cut off. That is what the Germans did when they went through that part of France in which these children live. It is certainly dreadful.

Yesterday was our pay day, the first I have had for three months. We were kicking about having no money to spend and now we are kicking because we have no place to spend it.

We are sure a busy bunch of fellows building billets for the national army. Almost every place one goes he can see these buildings built for the American soldiers. There is going to be a large aviation camp a half mile from our camp. It is to be the largest aviation camp in France.

It is not all hardships over here. We have some pleasure. We can pass our time reading, writing, playing cards, or listening to the Victrola. Our company had a Victrola and a bunch of records when we left the states and they shipped them over here. Believe me, we sure do enjoy the music.

Our regiment is busy every day building roads although it is pouring down rain. These roads are known as war roads, crushed rock and cement. Other companies are cutting wood, building billets for the national army, others are building railroads, and other necessary things for the boys who are to follow us.

This country might be old-fashioned and a thousand years out of date, but they sure have got it on the United States on roads. I have not seen a dirt road since I have been in France. All of the roads are crushed stone and cement, and they are not "would-be" roads. There are no cracks in them like in the road at the county farm at home, and are eighteen feet wide.

I guess they are resting in the firing line near us as we do not hear much cannonading any more. The Germans sure did surprise the Italians, but wait

until next spring when all of us boys who are over here, and who will be here by that time, get busy. We will show the world that the United States soldier can uphold the reputation of that country.

WAYNE ALLEN WRITES OF HOSPITAL SERVICE

Hospital Unit 12, Somewhere in France, November 6, 1917.

We are planning a big time for Christmas morning here. We are going to get a bunch of nurses and men to go through the wards and sing carols. Each ward is to have a Christmas tree and every patient will receive a present. The hope is to make it as homelike as possible for them. Whenever you send me anything send something that they can use, such as nuts, candy and books. When you send magazines I give them to the wounded men and if you know anyone in town who does not have anyone to send such things to I will be so glad to get them for the men here. I enjoy doing this kind of work. You have no idea how these men enjoy reading. There is so very little paper here that it can not be used for books, and reading helps to pass away the time.

The Y. M. C. A. is doing a wonderful work in this line, but our work is of a general nature and these men enjoy the personal touch. I will never forget, nor do I want to forget, any of the friends I have made here. Men from all over the world all fighting for the same cause. This army experience is very different from the one I had on the Border; that was like a little firecracker compared to a big cannon.

We have one especially sad case which is leaving us today. During the last air raid bombs were dropped in one of the wards and one of the United States ward orderlies lost one leg and the other was so badly cut up that it had to be taken off. He has had three operations and every time they took more of the leg because of gas poison. He is a wonderful boy and this morning when we put him on the train there were French, British and Japanese officers, besides United States officers, to see him off. They are taking him through Paris. They want to get him home by Christmas. Two of our men went with him.

I would like to get away for a while but I like this work and do not want to leave here until the war is over. Hope it is over soon. I am well and happy.

VIGNETTES OF A MARINE'S LIFE AT THE FRONT AND IN THE ARMY OF OCCUPATION

December 26, 1918, Ariendorf, Germany.

I attended officers' school at Langres and passed as second lieutenant October 1st; left there October 25th, went to Paris; stayed there two days to locate my regiment, and heard they were preparing for the big drive. I left Paris on the main line for Bar le Duc, then to a small station from there, and hiked the rest of the way; got to my company, the 76th, just in time.

Went over the top November 1st; cannot mention the casualties. All I can say now is, we put the Huns to flight, and I thank God I am alive. It was terrible to see the boys give up their lives, and peace so near. We reached the Meuse river and cut off their main railroad line. We held the line a few days and were to take some heights across the river, near Mouzon, which was strongly held by machine gun nests and artillery. We were to cross the river on bridges thrown across by the 2nd Engineers. Our 75's were putting a good barrage for us. We reached the bridge, the 5th crossed, the 6th started across, when the bridge was blown up. The other bridge wasn't finished and the Huns were shelling us to beat h——. It was getting daylight and we moved back. The 5th reached their objective, and started to go over again when the white flag was hoisted, telling us the armistice was signed.

Both sides shelled right up to five minutes of eleven o'clock. That night we could see camp fires all over the woods and hillsides. Such a change from the night before, when we could not strike a match or smoke, for we were under enemy observation at all times. Imagine our feelings, which we will never be able to describe; we could stroll out from under cover, smoke, talk, and thankful to be alive.

We stayed near Braumont until November 17, then crossed the Meuse and started on our way to wind up the watch on the Rhine. We spent one night at Arlon, Belgium. They gave us a great reception, as did some American prisoners from the 26th Division whom the Boche had given up. They surely were glad to see us.

The Germans were only about 24 hours ahead of us at that time. We arrived at Brohl on the Rhine at 1 p. m., December 9, and arrived at Ariendorf on December 16.

The country here is very rough and beautiful. Our observation posts are on top of the mountains, so one has a wonderful view of the Rhine valley.

You never dreamed your son would ever sleep in a castle on the Rhine, but here I am, and am in a wonderful room—white twin beds, silk galore, mirrors everywhere, beautiful rugs, couch, chairs, writing desk and stationery, tub and shower bath, electric lights, and button to call the butler. We have our own orderlies. Some difference between this and a shell hole. Only those who have had experience of sleeping in both can realize the full meaning.

Jan. 6, Honnigen, Germany.

I have been transferred to the 73d M. G. Co. Sure hated to leave the 76th, for they have proved their worth many times, but I will still be in the same regiment.

I spent Sunday evening with the officers of the 76th at the castle. The Count and Countess entertained us with pictures of their travels. We were in a big living room where there was an immense fireplace, polar bear skins of all kinds, deer horns, and relics of all sorts. We were seated—or buried—in easy chairs by the fireplace, smoking. The lights were turned out. The Countess

went through an enclosure from the living room and played a wonderful pipe organ. It sounded like it was a great distance away from us. Can you get a mental picture of it all? It seemed like a dream, and was wonderful music. We surely spent a pleasant evening with Count and Countess Westerholtz.

PETER E. BULAND, WOUNDED, SHOWS THE SPIRIT THAT WINS

The following is a copy of a letter received by Alton E. Johnson, of Dwight, from Emil Buland who is in an American Hospital in France:

January 24, 1918.

Dear Old Friend:

While looking over the news items from Dwight in the Pontiac Leader of December 20, I noticed your name and wondered if you are the old school boy chum of Morris. Truly, our paths have led us far apart since those days, and I have had ample time to ponder over the past during my stay in the hospital.

Letter writing is my chief indoor sport at present, and that is the reason I am going to wish this on you with the hope that it brings a line or two from you in return.

When the United States declared war on Germany I happened to be working at Fernwood, Idaho, and twelve of the fellows employed in the same mill in which I was a planer operator, decided that the bunch of us enlist. So we went to Spokane, Washington, and all but three of us passed the army examination. We three tried the Marine Corps, and I was the only one accepted on a waiver. I was sent to the marine barracks, Mare Island, Calif., and after spending two weeks there was rejected by a medical officer who had orders from the surgeon general to accept only men in the pink of condition, and I was sort of peeved until I learned that the British army had a recruiting officer in the city and wanted men for a railroad construction battalion in the Canadian army.

The physical examination was not so stiff as the United States, so I passed O.K., and in company with a number of other men was sent to Vancouver, B. C., for training. After spending several weeks there we were sent to Toronto, Ont., where we spent two months and then came overseas to England for training. I had been in France but three weeks when I was put out of commission by "Fritz."

Our work is sometimes carried on under shell fire and it happened that the machine guns were busy when I was wounded. Some American engineers who were working with us that day did noble work and carried great praise for their bravery and resource. You have probably read of it by this time, for I saw it in a Chicago paper.

My youngest brother, who is in the United States cavalry, has been here for some time, but I haven't heard from him yet.

When I came down the line after being wounded and learned that I was in an American hospital I was certainly glad. The unit was raised in Chicago and has been here for some time. Most of the doctors and staff are from Chicago and a Sergeant Allen from Pontiac. There is a Morris boy named Albert Hall but I do not remember him.

I receive the best of care and I am mighty proud of the good work being done by the "Yanks," and I feel like a Yank again when I am here.

I will probably be sent to Blighty soon for treatment. The bones in my leg are fractured where the bullet went through and it will be some time before I will be able to join my battalion.

England has made great sacrifices in this war and has done nobly. The Tommies are the most cheerful kind-hearted chaps you ever saw, and no matter how painful the wound you don't hear a murmur about it. I hope our boys from the States will be the same, and judging by those I have seen I think they will be.

It is nearly time for lights out so I must close, hoping to hear from you some time. I remain,

LIEUTENANT SHROYER WRITES OF ENGLISH AND FRENCH IMPRESSIONS

February 3, 1918, Somewhere in France.

At last I have reached my destination for the next three months and will be attending an artillery school. I am sure it is going to be very interesting and will be a fine experience for actual use later on the front.

The day is Sunday and the hour is 1:30 P. M. I am writing at the "Y," their quarters here being in a lovely chateau, loaned to them by a Frenchman. It is an elegant place, finely furnished, big fireplace in each room. It is more like an exclusive club on some beautiful avenue in Paris. A victrola is rendering music of all kinds, mostly American pieces, comparatively new. While on the subject of the "Y" let me say that it is a wonderful institution and deserves the support given it by the American people.

You probably have received the letter I wrote on the steamer in which I told what little I could. After landing in England, there being only officers on our boat, we went to what is called a rest camp located somewhere in England. You remember how you girls at camp used to sing "Keep the Home Fires Burning" and I always think of that time when I hear it. It is the most popular song with the soldiers over here.

The night we landed we marched along to the station to get to the train for our destination. The streets were dark, as are all streets over here, and as we

reached the end of our walk and stood waiting in line before entering the station out of the darkness the voice of a woman began to sing "Keep the Home Fires Burning." It was the voice of some poor charwoman, and while it was coarse and broken yet a perfect hush fell upon the men and not a sound until she had finished her song, and ended by saying in her broken tongue, "God bless you and bring you safely back."

A week ago was a day of national thanksgiving and prayer in England, so special services were held in the churches. A very beautiful cathedral is located in the town near our camp, so several of us attended the Sunday evening service. The bishop preached one of the best sermons I have heard in a long time, the subject of course being on the war and the conditions therefrom.

We were at this place only a couple of days, but I enjoyed roaming about the quaint old English town with its narrow streets and interesting shops. But everywhere one can see the strain of the war upon the people and how changed it has made the lives of all and the end cannot come too soon, but there is a determination that the end must be a right one.

After landing in France I saw several hundred German prisoners, and they seemed to be well booted and clothed and showed no marks of underfeeding. But as they went by, a sober unresponsive lot, one could see that they are but parts of a war machine, not knowing the why and wherefore of their fighting, but only doing as they were ordered by their government to whom they are but mere tools.

For the present we are faring pretty well; our food is very good and cooked most appetizingly—leave it to the French for this, but do not take this as any criterion as to conditions here. Food stuffs are very scarce and everything is on a card basis. It is only by reason of their economy and their ability to make the best out of everything that the French get along as well as they do.

We have had most pleasant weather and the peasants are working their fields getting in readiness for the spring planting. Mostly women are doing this as one does not see young or middle aged men about. I wish I could write more of the detail work here but censorship does not allow. I think of you all and always keep in my vision of the future the pleasure of seeing you all again. That is the vision we all have—the return—and to those of us who do return it is going to be the event of our lives in the eagerness and happiness of it all.

BECOMING ADAPTED TO FRONT LINE LIFE

Somewhere in France, March 15, 1918.

We have been in the same place nearly all the time since we landed. We get a pass for twenty-four hours about once a month providing we behave and are not on the black list. Have been to one large town several times; went through the cathedral, one of the oldest ones in France, one Sunday morning while they were having services. There is not much else of interest there except the mademoiselles.

I think about the most eruel thrust of all in this war was the trip across on the boat. We were about fourteen days on it and the cats were terrible. Stayed about five days in England and while there went to London and paraded before the King and Queen, then came to France; stayed in a rest camp on the coast one night. The first squads of us left early next morning to establish a camp somewhere up towards the front. We were all glad to leave because we did not get anything but tea and hard tack for supper and the same for breakfast. We landed at the place about five the next morning, cold and tired. The first thing we knew we heard shells bursting, and if you think a mum pool game is quiet you ought to have been there. They were not very close to us but they were our first dose. A day or so later some bursted in the field about half a mile from us, so close you could see the dirt flying in the air thirty or forty feet. As soon as it was daylight that next morning we saw our first airplane, didn't know if it was a Fritz or not, might have been anything for all I knew, and we were a little uneasy for a while, but it was English. These things are all very common to us now. I think all the seare has left me since I have found out how to protect myself against the different things. Before we left the coast they gave us gas instruction and each one a gas mask. Of course that "put up our wind," as the Tommies say, but none of us were gassed. No one fears gas any more since we have learned more about it. We have a good protection against every attack they can make, so why worry?

Wish I could tell you a whole lot but the censor is very striet. They just brought around a list of "don'ts" for letter writing, and we all signed it, about a yard long, so there is no use disobeying it. If we do it means the guard house and I am "fed up" on that. That is what the Tommies say when they have enough of anything. I am afraid to tell you what the Yanks say.

I want a transfer to the signal corps if I can get it. Just at present there is no chance, but may get one later on. Either that or the infantry. Have a bid in for them both.

ALLSOPP FINDS FASCINATION IN FLYING

148 Aero Sqdn., Somewhere in France, April 30, 1918.

I have travelled over most of northern France and part of England. I have had some exciting times since I came to France. I have been under shell fire and have had bombs dropped all around me, neither being very comfortable. I have been so close to big guns and shells that they rock me to sleep in my bed at night. One night I woke up in the middle of the night and heard some shrapnel shells going over, or rather coming down. They seemed to sing over my head about half an hour before they would finally land and explode, though they explode only a fraction of a second before they hit. When they explode they sure shake the hut. I have been within a block of the place where a fifteen shell landed

and the concussion was enough to knock you cold without any of the shell hitting you. All of the fellows near me dropped to the ground right away, but I did not understand the idea and stood up to watch the bricks fly. All at once I heard a fierce thud and a piece of shell buried itself in the ground back of me. I do not stand around any more to watch bricks fly; I double up and cover as little ground as possible.

Riding in an airplane is not as dangerous as you might imagine, but if you ride in one once it fascinates you so that you will want to go again, and to see a man fall and get killed does not spoil it. It is far more enjoyable than auto riding, you can ride upside down, or dive, or fly on the level, and if the air is rough you bounce along like a canoe on rough water.

ENGLISH AND FRENCH IMPRESSIONS

Somewhere in France, June 24, 1918.

At this minute I am sitting in the Y. M. C. A. with plenty of smokes handy and a big piece of chocolate candy in my left mit, a phonograph playing popular music near me and everything is lovely.

I left the good old U. S. A. about the first of April and arrived in England in eight days. England is one of the prettiest places I have ever seen. The houses are of red brick with the farms fenced with stone laid in mortar. The farms in England are beautiful, everything is so clean looking, just like a city lawn. The country is rolling and largely devoted to grazing. We received a joyous welcome everywhere we stopped, and if there ever was any enmity between England and America it is surely wiped out now.

The English Channel is the roughest piece of liquid on the globe, and it was there that I got my first taste of seasickness which was very light but sufficient. Seasickness is a funny thing. At last in desperation you throw up the sponge and pray to die, but as the prayers of the wicked avail nothing, you are out of luck. Everyone on board was sick, even the sailors and two little dogs on the boat were sick, too, which was a funny sight—if one were able to enjoy humorous sights.

In the English rest camp they give you an English bath. You are put in a room full of steam as hot as hades, and then as soon as you get a good sweat up they put you under a cold shower with the water darn near freezing.

France is a nice country but not nearly as pretty as England. The houses are nearly all stone covered with cement, and roofs of tile and while not pretty on the outside are nice enough inside and are very stable, and shelter not only the inhabitants, but as a rule the horses, cows and chickens. The farm lands in France look poor to me, can't compare with Illinois farm land and the chief crops seem to be hops and wine. Roads are very good throughout both England and France, but I am told they were even better before the war.

SPIRIT OF AMERICAN FIGHTERS PRAISED BY HOSPITAL
ATTENDANT

June 17, 1918.

Always before I have tried to make my letters get as far away from the war as I could, but today I can't talk or think of anything else. I can't tell you much of what we are doing, but may say that for the past few days the boys we have been carrying have been through hell. Things have been most exciting for us lately, too. You know the enemy thinks of the Red Cross only as a target, and his planes are very active, but then so are ours. Even in Paris one is constantly aware of what is going on at the front. Sometimes at night the whole sky is like a sheet of flame for hours at a time, then too "les grosses Bertha," as the French call the Boche long-range gun, is on the job every few days. The other day several shots fell within half a mile of where I was during the afternoon, but we simply laugh at Bertha. Of course, it is a wonderful gun but as a military weapon its value is practically zero. The other day one fell about two hundred yards from where Sergeant Higman and I were standing. Of course we went over to see the hole. It had struck a stone wall, exploded and buried itself at the foot of the wall, but didn't do any damage in particular. The funny part was that when a crowd came over to see the hole they trampled on a potato patch and the owner came over and ran us off with a hoe.

There wasn't even enough interest in the hole for any of us to bother talking back. That shows how accustomed one gets to that sort of thing, but in the trenches it is terrible. We don't have to go in there, though in some branches of the medical department they do. On the last trip back we carried a bunch of the lads that I knew, all shot to pieces. Several others had been killed on the field. It is when someone he knows is among the ones who "get it" that a fellow comes to hate war and those who cause it.

I hope the next letter will be more cheerful than this. Maybe it is because I am sleepy that this one is so gloomy. None of us have had any more than three hours sleep out of the past thirty-six, and don't expect any more than an hour or two for at least eighteen more.

Love to all and don't worry about any danger to me. It is simply that the whole thing seems so inhumanly cruel that it gets on one's nerves sometimes.

June 28, 1918, Somewhere in France.

Your letter of June 1 received. Thanks for your inclosed clipping of the boys leaving for the draft camps. It may seem hard for their folks to give them up but the sooner they get over and do their bit the sooner will we all be back in the dear old states.

As far as the boys are concerned, after the first couple of weeks they won't mind camp life at all. Certainly not if it agrees with them as well as it did with me. Then when they get over here they are likely to be too busy to find time

to be lonesome. Of course there is always a feeling that maybe some piker back home is running around with your girl while you are gone, but then for that you can solace yourself with the thought that your day is coming. If that isn't enough there are loads of the prettiest French girls over here who dearly love "les soldats americains," and who are just crazy to teach French—and other things. France is the land of romance, you know.

Everywhere we have gone the people old and young seem to vie with each other in showing us a good time. Needless to say we are quite willing to be shown. In Paris they are planning a July Fourth celebration that is to be one of the biggest things held there for some time.

Now don't get from what I have said of good times that we see nothing else. That is all very well when we are far back of the lines where there is nothing more disturbing than a few shells from "Bertha" or an occasional air raid. I have said little about the other side, not only because I may not say much, but because I simply cannot find words for it. All I can say is that the absolute heroism the American boys have shown for the past month or two in the trenches certainly never has been surpassed in any war of any time. And it is not only their reckless courage on the field but their wonderful pluck when we bring them back torn and bleeding after the excitement of the fray has died down.

I am thinking particularly of one fellow, a corporal from some little town in Ohio. A shell had burst near him and he had lost one leg and was wounded in the side. It was about three in the morning and he was alone in one of my ward cars when I heard him crying to himself. Naturally I thought he was crying from the pain and the grief over the loss of his leg, so I tried to cheer him up by telling him that the fun would soon stop and it wouldn't be long before he would be back home again. He stopped crying and gave a sort of snort and said, "Hell!! Do you think I am crying for that leg? I am crying because I can't get back with the boys to get some of those damned baby-killers." How is that for clear grit? And then to think that there are people who call themselves Americans who won't even buy a Liberty bond or give a dollar to the Red Cross.

Give my regards to all and don't fail to write a long newsy letter. With love,

MARINE GIVES GLIMPSES OF LIFE AT THE FRONT

Somewhere in France, July 15, 1918.

We left for the front the night after I wrote your last letter and just got back to the little village of ——— day before yesterday. Do not know how long we will be here. Most of the townspeople have left this place as the village is shelled frequently. The "front of the front" is some different than I had pictured; things were very interesting up there and very uncomfortable sometimes. I have heard music that bored me and was unpleasant, but the worst

music that I know of is the noise of those Hun shells singing through the air. It surely makes one think some and takes all that desire for adventure out of you. It is not fear of death; it is some sensation that is unexplainable. Our company came out good and I have decided that we are a lucky outfit.

July 26.—Am back from the front again. My July 15 letter was written from a little village where we were billeted. We left that place one night in auto trucks. We thought we were going farther back of the lines, but instead of that we were rushed to another sector of the front lines where we took part in one of the liveliest arguments of the war.

How any of us came through unhurt is more than I know because we went through a storm of machine gun bullets as thick as raindrops. We thought the other front we were on was pretty lively, but it was very quiet compared to the one we just left.

There is one thing about this life—it will never grow monotonous for you never do the same thing twice. They sure keep you guessing as to what they are going to do with you next.

If you see any of my friends over there who are craving excitement or pastime tell them to get in the army and go over the top. I can recommend it as the best of all out-door sports.

DWIGHT BOY WOUNDED

Dwight, Ill., Sept. 17.—Mrs. Delia Smith Biggers received word recently that her son, Sgt. Carter Smith, had been seriously wounded in the leg in an attack on the Germans on August 10. Sergeant Smith expects to be sent back to the states soon. Following is a copy of a letter received by Mrs. Biggers from the nurse who is caring for her son:

August 16, 1918.

Dear Mrs. Biggers:—I have just been having a talk with your son, Sgt. Carter Smith, and am writing you to say he is in very good spirits indeed and wanted me to tell you. He was wounded on August 10, and was brought here with a number of our American boys.

We have a splendid hospital here with all American nurses and doctors and our boys are receiving excellent care. We are so proud of what our boys are doing and will see that they get everything in our power to give them. HOW A SOLDIER TRAVELS IN FRANCE

September 28, 1918, Somewhere in France.

Dear Mother: At last I have found time to write you a few lines to let you know that I am still well and happy. I have at last gone into real army life and will have little time to write, but will see that you get a letter as often as possible. The last letter I wrote you about two weeks ago was written just the day before we moved. Since then we have traveled three hundred and fifty miles and have moved camp five times. And when we move we carry everything we own. You ought to see me with my pack, I look like a real peddler. I never knew there were so many places on a man to hang things. When I come home I can do all the shopping for the neighborhood and carry it all at once. Traveling over here is very interesting but not very comfortable. We always travel in horse cars. Imagine my surprise when we took our first trip on the French railroads. When we came down to entrain there was a train of cars marked 8 cheveaux or 36 hommes, meaning eight horses or thirty-six men. Well, we all piled in, thirty-six men to a car, although they are only half as large as an American box car, so some of us had to sit up while the rest lay down to sleep. It took about 48 hours to make a trip that would take about 10 or 12 hours in the states.

I have seen some wonderful sights. I took a look at what was once No Man's Land, and I don't doubt it was for I don't see what anyone would want with it, the way it is cut up. I saw a large body of German prisoners the other day. They were a peculiar looking lot, large and small, old and young, but all apparently well dressed and healthy. The officers are very stiff and proud, but the soldiers stand around and grin and seem to be well pleased with their lot.

From our camp we can see lots of airplanes on nice days. And there are always battles going on in the air, which makes a very pretty sight, for there is lots of fancy flying done then.

Received five letters from you when I came back from the hospital and I sure was glad to get them. I was in the hospital for nearly five weeks. You see in the dark one night my motoreyele and myself got tangled up with one of those three ton trucks and a shell from Jerry, and we came out a little the worse for it.

The machine was a total wreck but I got away with only a dislocated shoulder and a strained arm, so you see my luck still holds. I have not been driving since I came back and don't know as I will any more, either. But if they will only let me, I am ready to go back to the job again.

I just got back from the hospital in time for the big show the allies pulled off on September 12. We sure gave Jerry hell. I saw a complete German

band that had been captured by our Americans and they played while the rest of the prisoners danced in the prison pen. The Jerries sure seemed happy to be taken prisoners. I guess that they know now that the American army is no myth. It is reported that a German officer said that "our submarines are supreme. What ship brought these Americans over?" And the reply was, "The Lusitania."

My arm is a trifle stiff as yet and I have to operate it gingerly, so I shall say "so long" for this time. I will write you again when we give Jerry another good crack in the eye.

LIEUTENANT MILLER WOUNDED

Mr. and Mrs. George Miller are in receipt of a letter from their son, Lieut. Francis Miller, stating that he is in a hospital in France, having been wounded in the hip.

The letter stated that he had been in three of the heaviest battles in which the Americans had participated and came through without injury; that he and several others were out in front making a survey of the territory when a German sniper up in a tree shot him in the hip. The bullet fractured the bone and he was taken to the hospital where he was at the time of writing. One of his companions "got" the sniper.

AMERICAN PLANE BRINGS DOWN GERMAN BOMBING PLANE

Somewhere in France, October 13, 1918.

Dear Folks: Just a few lines to let you know that I am well. I am feeling good now compared to the way I felt when I came out of the hospital. I write at least one letter a week home but haven't received any mail for about a week. It sure makes one feel good to hear from home. This is a nice country only they have too much rain to suit me.

At times the large guns sure do roar and it keeps up for many days without stopping, but we haven't heard many for the past few days. I hear today that Germany has agreed to take her troops off allied soil and will accept peace terms. If this is so I don't think the war will last much longer. The sooner it is over the better it will suit the boys, but they all say they are willing to keep on fighting till Germany agrees to our peace terms.

The Hun planes fly over some nights and a couple of days ago one came over in the day time. I was working out on the flying field and it went almost straight over me, but he was up so high I could hardly see him. He was no sooner spied than five of our machines went up after him. He flew over a town about three kilometers away from our camp and unloaded his bombs, but he didn't go far before our planes got him. He could only travel about half as fast as our planes as a bombing plane is a slow moving machine, and it was

a regular gunner's machine which went after him. He was probably looking for our camp, but we were concealed in a woods and the camp could not be seen from an aeroplane flying over. Last week an English bombing plane lit here, one of its motors being on the bum. It had just returned from dropping some bombs on Metz. It was about 110 feet from tip to tip of the wings and about seven feet from the ground to the bottom part of the lower wing. Its fusilage was about 75 feet long and there were two large motors in it. This machine could carry fourteen men when there were no bombs in it. At the place we were at before coming here I helped unload some bombs and they were all sizes, some being so heavy that it took two men to lift them. We sure handled them with care.

This is one of the days I had off, (Sunday), and this was due to the fact that I had been working steadily all week. Sunday seems like any other day in the army as there is always work to be done. I walked to a little town about three miles from here this afternoon and went to church. Most of the people over here seem to be Catholic as all the churches I have seen have been Catholic. These churches are certainly great pieces of workmanship as the woodwork and stonework are all hand carved and are simply beautiful. Some of the hand carved flowers look like real flowers from a distance.

I hope that the corn crop is good this year as Uncle Sam can make good use of it. We are getting good eats here, the same as we had in the states. It is surprising to note all the good old U. S. A. is doing in sending over things to this country. Not only food, but almost everything you can think of, even trains with locomotives. We have American railroads and telephone lines, and not only Red Cross trains but freight trains. You would be surprised to see all the U. S. trucks that are over here.

I am learning to shoot right-handed as I can not go through the manual of arms left-handed. It seems a little unhandy, but I will get used to it in time. Well, I must close, so please answer soon.

PRIVATE McCLELLAN AT MONS

Mr. and Mrs. Charles McClellan received a letter this morning from their son, C. Warren McClellan, with the Canadian army of occupation marching through Belgium. It was written from Mons under date of November 15. Private McClellan stated that he was at Mons at the time of the celebration in honor of the return of King Albert and Queen Elizabeth to Belgium, and that it was the greatest demonstration he ever expected to witness. "Streams of allied prisoners of war are passing us on the road every day while we are marching on our way to the Rhine," says Private McClellan. He was severely gassed in action several months ago and was sent back to Blighty to recuperate. McClellan enlisted at Chicago last winter.

CHAPLAIN REED IN FOUR BATTLES

(Pontiac Daily Leader, Feb. 6, 1919)

Ernest H. Reed, Senior Chaplain of the Fourth Division, writes from Bad Bertrich, Germany, to the members of the Christian Church describing some of his experiences during the past months. The letter follows:

"I can imagine something of the rejoicing in the states when news was received that the armistice had been signed. I wish I could have been there, but, after all, it is a great privilege to have been over here during the decisive days of the summer and autumn and to have had a little part in the smashing of the Hun machine.

"The censorship has been lifted to a large extent and we are now at liberty to tell something of our experiences at the front. I have been in four battles—the second battle of the Marne, July 18-20; the Vesle fight, August 4-5; the St. Mihiel Drive, September 13-17; and the Meuse-Argonne campaign, September 26-October 23. The first two were really parts of the same drive, but after July 20 my division was withdrawn from the lines, moved to another position and sent in again on Sunday, August 4. The St. Mihiel scrap was a walk-away and our part in it lasted only a few days, but the Meuse-Argonne campaign was stubborn and hard fought. My division was in the front line of the drive for twenty-three days and I remained four days after the division had been withdrawn to complete the task of burying the dead.

"I was under fire for twenty-seven consecutive days and I want to assure you it was some fire. I count myself fortunate to be alive. There were many Americans who went 'west' in those awful days. I used to think I would like to be chaplain in the division to which Company F belongs, but I am glad now that I am not, especially if the 33d division suffered like the old fighting 4th. It is sad enough to have to witness the slaughter of comparative strangers, without having the added pain of seeing your own fellow townsmen and personal friends killed or wounded, as so many were in this unspeakable tragedy. Thank God it is over now.

"I am as firm in my conviction that we had to fight to defend the sacred rights of humanity and to protect ourselves, but I feel a heaviness in my heart as I think of the thousands of homes in America now 'longing for the touch of a vanished hand and for the sound of a voice that is still.' I shall continue to pray, as I have prayed, that these brave lads shall not have died in vain and that, somehow, in the final working out of the eternal destinies of men each one of them may find the way home."

WITH ARMY OF OCCUPATION IN GERMANY

(From Pontiac Daily Leader, January 30, 1920)

Kausen, Germany.

I have crossed the Rhine and am billeted at the home of a German burgo-master of a small town about 15 kilometers from Coblenz.

The country through which we have passed since I last wrote you has been very hilly and covered with pine forests like those in northern Michigan. Many

Christmas trees are being cut here now. The people of Luxembourg treated us fine and gave us a good welcome, and we have experienced no trouble with the people of Germany. They come forward with anything we want, if they have it. They have plenty of potatoes and apples here, but very little meat. They eat heavy black bread, while we have white bread, and the inhabitants surely take notice of that fact, too.

Many of the people here claim they hate the ex-kaiser, but of course we take those statements with a grain of salt. The burgomeister here says that President Wilson is a good man, but that Ludendorf and Wilhelm were money grabbers, while Hindenburg is a soldier who had to obey the ex-kaiser's commands.

We may be released shortly and I believe I shall be in the United States before an answer to this letter would reach me. The letter censorship rules are a trifle more lenient now than before the armistice was signed. While at the front we were first on the Argonne sector, then the sector northwest of Verdun, and finally back to the Argonne sector. Of course the Yankees had pushed the Germans well beyond the Argonne forest before hostilities ceased and had crossed the Meuse in a number of places. At many points we have been less than a day's march behind the Germans.

Some of the German cities we have passed through on our march are Bitburg, Mayen, Manderscheid, Mulheim and Ochtendung. I found a copy of the Pontiac Daily Leader on a hill near Bantheville, France. At this same place many unburied dead Germans were stacked. A German aviator bombed us on this hill on the night of November 9th about 9:30, but his aim was bad and he only made some holes in the ground. The night of November 11 I was not far from Ecurey, France.

During their withdrawal from France the German army ditched many of their tractors and trucks after first damaging them so that they could not be used. At Villers-le-Chevre many large German airplanes were left. At Longwy, France, the old town inside the citadel is shot up but the modern city is undamaged by shell fire.

RESUMÉ OF AN AMBULANCIER'S EXPERIENCES

Hohr, Germany.

It has been a long time since I have written to you, but in that time I have traveled a long distance as well as being very busy, for although the war is over, I still have a lot to do. To give you some idea of where I have been in France I will name the principal cities only, for if I named them all it would take more paper than I have at present. I landed at St. Nazaire, France, on December 26, 1917; disembarked and loaded on a train and traveled for three days and four nights, arriving at the end of that time in Goudecourt, France, where we remained until March. From there we went into battle, or

in other words "took over a sector," which was known as the Toul sector. After staying there very near a month we were transferred to the Cantigny sector. Several days after our arrival in that sector our division (the First) made a successful attack and gained the town of Cantigny. I was in the advanced dressing station during the battle, and that was my first taste of gunpowder. It sure makes a man sit up and take notice when a shell, or rather a dozen shells explode at your back door.

From there we were ordered to the Soissons sector, and that was far worse than Cantigny. I could tell some terrible tales, but then what good would that do. It would not modify the awfulness of the thing. From there we were sent to Charpentery, Argonne, St. Mihiel and other places of struggle too numerous to mention. Then the armistice was signed while we were at Verdun. From Verdun we followed the German army through Alsace-Lorraine, Luxemburg and across the Rhine.

I have found the people of Luxemburg and Germany far better educated than the French, cleaner morally and physically, and the towns and cities are far more advanced. I have been in many French towns and cities, among them being Paris, Toul, Nancy, Lyons, and Beauvais, none of which can hold a candle to a German city of 25,000. You will have to hand it to the Huns; they are surely progressive. I am as far into Germany as the armistice allows, 20 kilos east of the Rhine (some river), and when we crossed it the Huns did not sing the "Watch on the Rhine," either.

PONTIAC BOY WINS MEDAL OF HONOR

An Atlantic Port on Board U. S. S. C. No. 178.

Well here I am again all sea-going and salty.

Do you know that this is a real, and not a reel, hero writing this. You see that since I have been decorated with a medal of honor I do not care who knows it. But we had some experience.

We were out on high seas on a trip which no one but the French ever attempt (and it took them thirty-nine days to reach port), when we found that somehow we had lost 400 gallons of gasoline to start with and a ninety-one mile an hour gale came up. The waves became small mountains with water going over the deck. We got the good news to return to port about sundown. About 8 o'clock that night half of the crew had passed out, due to seasickness and did not care whether they ever saw port again. But with some of us it was a serious bit. There were three ships in the fleet and we became separated.

The wireless of each ship was out of commission and it became a question of everyone for himself. It did not look as if our gas was going to hold out. When it came time for the chief and his watch to come on duty he came with but one man. I had not yet left the engine room when that one man passed out. The chief was standing in the hatchway when a white cap burst on the hatch carrying it away. The chief went with the big wave and all that saved him was the railing, he being thrown against it with great force. He did not know what hit him.

This left me the only engineer on board. It did not seem as though I was good for more than a couple of hours more but someone had to stick it out. I was the only one left and that is the reason I did it. There I was until noon the next day and we did not make port any too soon. I had no more than shut off the motors than I too passed where the remainder of the crew had been for hours. I stayed out a day so you can see that even the Navy is not an easy job when you get into real service. But they say that it takes a real war to tell what a man is made of. You can see that people are beginning to find out what I have known about myself for some time.

DWIGHT BOY INJURED

Lee Ely, of Dwight, was on board the U. S. S. Orizaba when a depth charge exploded recently killing the commander and three enlisted men. In a letter to his parents at Dwight young Ely has the following to say of the accident and his injuries:

"I don't know if you heard of the explosion we had on ship board or not, or if it was in the papers out there, but will send the piece along with this letter. They did not tell very much about it. I told them to keep my name out of the paper as I would get all right again. My legs are in bad shape. I think I will have two scars on one and two small ones on my face—one on my chin and the other on my forehead. I stood just back of the commander when the depth charge exploded; if he had not been in front of me I don't know what would have happened to me, but I think I am lucky to come out as good as I did.

"This was some trip. We were attacked the eleventh of August by six submarines. We got four of them and on the way back one showed up just after the explosion. It had us going but it did not take long as our ship's sister ship, the Sidney, came to the rescue. They started firing on the submarine as we could not use our guns as they were all torn to pieces by the explosion.

"Four men from the engine room also got hurt, but not badly. They are now working again. I made application for a sick-leave and if I get it will be home for thirty days at least."

CAPTAIN PEPPERDINE RETURNS

(From the Freeport [Illinois] Journal)

The hoodoo 13 followed Captain Fred F. Pepperdine in his entire career with the Signal Department of the United States Army, both in the states and while over seas, but it carried good luck rather than misfortunes for the Freeport captain who returned home last evening and although he stated that he is not superstitious, he was thankful for the "13" as that was what enabled him to return safely. During his 13 months of service, Captain Pepperdine wore a bracelet identification medal which bore the number 13; he was 13 months in service; arrived overseas on October 13, and returned home in 1919, the 13th year of his married life.

Captain Pepperdine arrived home unheralded last evening wearing two wound chevrons and the Croix de Guerre, he having been personally decorated by General Petain of the French Army for aiding the French artillery which was supporting a company during the fierce fighting in the Argonne. He also received a special citation for his work there. Like all other returned soldiers and officers, Captain Pepperdine spoke modestly and reticently regarding his decorations. "Give the doughboys and the other real heroes the credit," he said. "I'm satisfied to be back home, to have returned to God's country," he continued.

He was in service overseas six months and during that time saw service on the most active sectors of the great war area. He was attached to the 314th Field Artillery Battalion, and as an officer of Company C he saw service on the Saint Mihiel sector, in the Argonne and in the Verdun-Meuse sector.

It was in October, while serving in the Argonne, that Captain Pepperdine was gassed and sent back to a hospital to recover. After rejoining his company,

he served until November 8, three days before the armistice, when he was wounded in the left side by a high explosive while doing duty at a point about one-half mile from the Meuse River. His wounds were very serious and he was sent back to a base hospital for treatment. In speaking of the treatment accorded the sick and wounded, Captain Pepperdine stated that all received wonderful care and attention and he spoke many words of praise for nurses and surgeons serving overseas. The captain also took occasion to praise the Knights of Columbus for their overseas work. "They have done wonderful things over there and the organization deserves a world of credit," he said. "The K. of C. men were a fine gentlemanly, and educated group of men who had entered the work for the sole purpose of aiding the fighters and they certainly attained their objective." The chaplains of all creeds also came in for words of praise, as did the Red Cross and Salvation Army.

Mr. Pepperdine left Freeport one year ago last November as a lieutenant. He was made assistant to the Central Department Signal Officer at Chicago, and on July 8 went to Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, where he organized a battalion to be taken overseas as a replacement battalion. For a time he was aide to General Russell, Chief of the Signal Department of the U. S. Army overseas, but asked to be transferred for duty and was sent to the 314th as captain. He is also a Spanish-American War veteran, having served in that conflict. He has not entirely recovered from the effects of the gassing and will return to a hospital at Ft. Sheridan Monday morning. He will remain there until discharged.

CAPTAIN CHARLES UPHAM WRITES OF CAMP GRANT

I have been assigned to Company E, 344 Infantry, 172 Brigade, 86 Division. I received my first lot of men September 6 from the 43d Board of Chicago. They are mostly Italians and a fine lot of men and well educated. Most of them are machinists.

I think most people have a mistaken idea that the selective men are going to be hard to handle in this war. That is not the case with my men. The cars that the men arrived in bore banners, as "Berlin or Bust," "Kaiser Bill or Die," "On Our Way to Berlin," etc.

My men are all in good spirits and are anxious to learn. They started training just as soon as they arrived. The training is going to be hard, but they will have good quarters and Uncle Sam has the reputation of having the best paid army in the world, and the National Army will be the best without a doubt.

I have five lieutenants, mighty fine men, with lots of pep. My first lieutenant is from the "Ould Sod," and is full of fight. I am equipping my men with clothes today and they are very proud of the uniforms and have all agreed that they are going to *wear* them, not simply walk around in them.

Camp Grant is a beautiful place and going to be one of the best camps we have.

The first I heard my first sergeant calling roll I thought he was cussing somebody in a foreign language, but found later that he was just calling the men's names. It makes no difference whether his name is Jones, Smith, Georgeopolis, or Martuccio, they are all Americans now and all fighting for the same cause and will make good soldiers. We are in this war to win and in the quickest way possible.

The men in the United States army will be cared for; it is those that are left behind that need to be cheered and shown the bright side and not the dark, and that is the duty of those at home.

"TREAT 'EM ROUGH." A CHATSWORTH BOY GIVES EXPRESSION TO HIS SENTIMENTS REGARDING PRO-GERMANS

Camp Lewis, American Lake, Washington, November 24, 1917.

I received the package which the Chatsworth Red Cross sent and was very much pleased with its receipt, and give many thanks for what they have done for me and other boys, and hope that those who assisted us will receive their just reward for the good work they are doing.

I have been assigned to the 348th M. G. Batt., Co. C, and believe me, we are rapidly mastering the use of our guns and will in the near future give the German government and its allies some of their own medicine which will crush them to their knees, and make them realize the horrors of murdered women and children whom they have slaughtered during the past four years. The cause we are fighting for is a just one. It is a big thing we are in, but the United States armies are not to be laughed at and those who do laugh at "our boys" will soon learn their mistake. But this country has plenty of males, skunks, or snakes-in-the-grass, who are constantly trying to cause revolution, or talking about the "Fatherland." In my estimation these people who stick up for Germany and cause disturbances in our nation's work should be shot—not at sunrise—but on sight. When "our boys" are "over there" in the trenches, are sleeping in mud and rain, and suffering the horrors of war and these pro-Germans here are the cause of food supplies not reaching them, are causing disturbances throughout this nation, I think it is the most low-down, snake-like thing I have ever heard of, and for me it is—to h—l with the German nation, with its horrors in the slaughter of women and children and the destruction of property, such as churches and the like. It seems to me that the Germans of today have no humanity in them, but are like a pack of beasts or wild animals. But the future will bring a great change to Europe and the whole world, and that change will be democracy. I don't know what the readers of this letter will think but I do not care as I shall always stand up and support the flag and the nation—the good old United States. As I said before this is a big problem we are going to solve and I wish to tell all good American people not to distrust

our mission which we boys are going over there for, but to keep in mind the grand and glorious story our boys will bring back and the high station the United States will hold in the world forever afterwards.

As for myself, I am in fine health and getting along fine in my work. I am now attending commissioned officers' school and I am doing the best I can in the line of getting a commissioned officers' standing. We are working daily on our machine guns and can now take them down and put them together again blindfolded, for when we get in the trenches and during the night if some pieces of the gun should happen to break we can repair it without lights, as we would not be allowed any lights on account of the enemy attacking us and gently raising us to Kingdom Come, or something to that effect. We machine gunners are known as the "Suicide Club," as we must find new positions after each belt is run through, for if we stayed in the same position the whole artillery of the enemy would be dropping shells in our vicinity and this would cause us considerable inconvenience. It is estimated that a machine gunner's life on the front is of one-half hour's duration if he doesn't move right after firing a charge. Our guns shoot around four hundred shots a minute so you can see what damage one of them can do, and so far as I am concerned I wish they could shoot more per minute, but I guess I have to be satisfied as it is for I cannot make it any different.

Well, I must close and I again return thanks to the Red Cross, the people of Chatsworth, and to yourself for the thoughtfulness of you all in sending comforts to a soldier boy now in training.

SIDE LIGHTS ON AN AVIATOR'S TRAINING

Call Field, Wichita Falls, Texas, March 11, 1918.

Dear Friends: Everything in Texas seems to run in extremes, the hottest days, the chilliest nights, and the strongest winds. This week there was practically no afternoon flying because of the wind which blew incessantly. Today the thermometer was around 100 all afternoon.

Reveille is at 5 p. m. though, so we get on the field before sunrise and get lots of time anyway. It seems like getting up in the middle of the night and someone has suggested exchanging our bunks for lanterns. This noise about aviators getting ten hours sleep is all "rot"; don't believe it. The best flying is early in the morning. Last week was fine and we were up every morning. Nearly everyone of us got in an hour a day, which is the most one can have while on dual flying.

Considerable time was spent on practice landings as they seem to be unquestionably the hardest part of the primary work. We spent several days on them and toward the last made them alone. You should have seen some of them, they hit most awful hard. Last Friday we went up about twenty-five hundred

feet and were given some demonstrations of side slips and tail spins to show how they are remedied if we ever get into one alone, which I hope we won't yet for a while.

The side slip is quite a thriller, to say the least. The Standard, the plane we are using, has so much wing space, though, that it will come out of most anything practically alone and is more or less "fool proof."

We were finally turned loose, or put on solo work, Tuesday. Needless to say, it was a regular gala day for us. I think I shall always remember that lonesome feeling I had up there on that first flight, how I had to nose her down, how I went round again to think it over, and last but not least, how thankful I felt when the machine finally did touch ground again with nothing more than a few bumps. We have been up alone now every day since but somehow that first thrill is gone. In solo work we advance individually and have as much time as we want. Some men get as much as three hours in a half day. Our course takes up dual, first solo, second solo, acrobatics, and radio. After securing our commissions we will either be sent over or assigned here. Most of the men so far have been assigned as instructors on the different flying fields.

I sure enjoy the work, for it is far from monotonous. We have a few classes, a very few. We also have a splendid barracks, good food, a Y. M. C. A. with movies, and a fine crowd of fellows, so everything is quite complete. There is a ten-day furlough when we finish, so the only trouble is we are not finishing soon enough. Well, write real soon. I am, as ever,

DWIGHT BOY KILLED

MET HIS DEATH ON BATTLE LINE IN FRANCE LAST FALL

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Tunberg, of Dwight, have definitely learned of the death of their son, Albert, who was killed in action in France, October 12, 1918.

The name of Albert T. Walton with address given as Dwight, Ill., appeared in the Leader's casualty list on November 20. The Leader asked the Dwight Star and Herald to investigate, with the result that no one knew of an Albert Walton ever having lived in that community, so it was conceived that he must have at some time or another been employed upon a farm in this vicinity and for that reason gave his address as Dwight. Many, however, were under the impression that an error had been made in the name and that it should have been Albert Tunberg. A reporter from the Star and Herald called upon Mr. Tunberg to learn whether he had been informed of his son's death by the government, and his reply was that he had not. He also stated that as far as he knew the stories current about town that his son was dead were false.

Last Saturday word was received in Dwight from Washington and Mr. and Mrs. Tunberg learned definitely that their son, Albert, had been killed. Albert Tunberg enlisted at Des Moines, Iowa, and Mr. Tunberg states that he is satisfied that his son must have enlisted under the name of Walton.

PONTIAC MAN IN THE DARDENELLES AND MESOPOTAMIA

Alan Anderson, formerly of Pontiac, was in service almost from the beginning of the war until its close. He enlisted in London, England, in October of 1914, had both legs and an arm frozen in the Dardenelles campaign, and has the following to say in regard to his remarkable experiences:

Hazeldean, May Pen, Jamaica, West Indies, March 21, 1922.

I have to thank you for your kind letter of Feb. 21, and greatly appreciate your kind interest with respect to my war service. I should like very much to be of any service, and with pleasure will give you the information you ask for to the best of my ability. I have therefore completed the form as nearly correct as I am able, but I am very sorry I cannot remember all the dates.

The Dardenelles Campaign was rather a trying one, and I have a very poor recollection of the actual dates in connection with even the small part of it that I shared in. While I was there we were able to make only one general attack, due to the shortage of men and materials, and the weakened condition of the troops themselves. It was very difficult to land stores and men at Suvla Bay, the Turks commanding all the beaches, so it was only under cover of darkness that they could be landed, and then only when the sea was calm.

The other engagements, apart from resisting an occasional Turkish demonstration, consisted of the usual periodical night raids on certain small sections of the enemy trenches. The Turks also, while I was there, made only one general attack, but made up for this by organizing local attacks at different points of our line. Their attack on our sector was followed the same night by a terrific rain storm which in half an hour completely filled our trenches on the level land, and developed during the next day into a blizzard, which by night froze everything solid. The troops were not prepared for anything of the sort, with the result that before morning of the next day, November 28, when the few survivors of my division, the 29th, were relieved by fresh troops brought from Lemnos, many thousands had frozen to death. The Turks were far better off because they were able to get fresh troops from the Hills immediately behind them. I was one of the few lucky ones, and got away with it without even losing a limb, but had to spend about sixteen months in hospital and convalescent, was no longer fit for the Infantry and got a transfer in May, 1917, into the Flying Corps. The evacuation of all the troops on the Peninsula, (which is now history), was successfully completed two or three weeks after I left there.

With reference to Mesopotamia, while my service there actually covered the period of July, 1917, to December, 1918, operations could only be carried on during the cooler months of the year, so my actual flying active service did not amount to a great deal, although I was in the air for two or three hours almost every day that operations were possible.

The Turks at that time were beginning to realize, I think, that they were playing a losing game. The flower of their army had gone. He made one or two good stands and showed some of his old time bravery we knew in the

Dardenelles, but to no purpose. The fighting on the Tigris Front, (the most important one), while I was there was from a point ninety miles north of Bagdad to within one hundred miles of Mosel, where the last decisive action of the war in that part of the East was fought. My unit was withdrawn almost immediately after that, and landed in England on December 9, 1918.

I must here apologize for taking up so much of your time in reading this long letter. If any of the data is of the slightest use to you, even a very little of it, I shall be happy. In conclusion, I may mention that I cannot live in a cold climate now on account of my experiences in the Dardenelles, that is the reason I could not remain in Pontiac but had to hunt a warmer climate.

May I ask you if you would be so kind as to send me a copy of the book when it is completed. I should prize it very much, because I have some good friends in Livingston County who did their share in the war.

MERTON OLIVER WRITES OF THE WORK OF THE BIG GUNS

Camp Eustis, Virginia, March 18, 1919.

I will tell you something about the guns we worked on and what battles we were in. Our gun was called a 400, and shot a shell weighing 1980 pounds, almost a ton. Battery A and Battery C of the 53d Artillery were the two batteries that used the largest guns the Americans used in France. The shell was about five and one-half feet tall and sixteen inches through. It sure was some shell. Tomorrow I will send you a picture of the gun.

When we were in the front we had one spell where we worked seventy-two hours without any sleep and only hard tack and salmon to eat, and the mud was knee deep. We worked awfully hard and I threw my barber tools to one side and worked getting the gun ready. I wanted to go along with the boys. I worked on the break and shoved powder. For one shot it takes a sack of powder sixteen inches through and three feet long. Every shot makes the ground shake. There was a building over two hundred yards away which had over a hundred windows in it and when the first shot was fired from our gun it broke every window in the building. We were in the Saint Mihiel drive and fired on one of the largest forts the Boche had and we destroyed it in twenty-nine shots. The next day our major told us that one shot of ours killed three hundred Germans. When the shell hit it exploded and the explosion broke every bone in their bodies, so we certainly did our bit.

If another war breaks out I will be among the first to enlist. We had lots of air raids last summer. About the time we would get to sleep we would hear a Boche flying. The bugle would blow and we would have to run for a trench with our helmets on. We cursed the Germans more than once for waking us up and getting us out of bed. We went through lots of hardships, but the war

is over and I am satisfied. There is so much to tell of my experiences that if I were to write it all I would have to send the letter home by express so will tell it when I get home. When I get home we will sit down right after breakfast and we will spend the rest of the day going over it all.

PONTIAC BIRDMAN ON FLYING VISIT

(Pontiac Daily Leader, October 1, 1918)

Lieut. Thomas E. Cavanagh, one of Pontiac's airmen and an instructor at Scott Field, Belleville, accompanied by Lieut. A. R. Towner, flew to this city today. In a drizzling rain which fell all during the day the aviators appeared about 11:45 o'clock, having come a distance of two hundred miles in exactly two hours and making one stop for gasoline and oil. Lieut. Cavanagh piloted the machine which is a Curtiss biplane of the military type, and gave the natives a view of what some of our boys are doing at the training camps.

LIVINGSTON SENDS 129 MORE OFF TO WAR

Livingston County sent 129 of the cream of her young men away to war today. The men left here at 11:48 for Atlanta, Georgia, over the Chicago and Alton.

The men assembled in this city Sunday afternoon, when they reported to the offices of the local examining board, and were given instructions by Chairman Torrance.

Following their instruction Sunday afternoon, the men were dismissed for the remainder of the day with the information that their suppers would be served them free of charge. The supper was served them by the Saratoga Cafe. Early this forenoon all reported at the Y. M. C. A. building for roll call and final instructions. Leaving the Association building at 10:30 o'clock the men marched to the west front of the Court House where Hon. C. F. H. Carrithers of Fairbury delivered the address of farewell.

At the close of the formal farewell they were marched to the Red Cross headquarters where each young man who had not previously received a comfort kit was furnished with one.

Camp Gordon, Georgia, June 16, 1918.

Dear Miss Power: I promised to write to you after I became a fullfledged soldier and now I am going to make good my promise.

May I say, to begin with, that the branch of service that you and most of the women of America are working in is the most worthy of all. From the time

we left Pontiac until we reached camp the members of the Red Cross, those good angels of mercy, met us at nearly every city, giving us coffee, candy, cigarettes, and cheering words. At Nashville they served us with dinner. Every time we shave, wash, or hurt a finger, we are reminded of the wonderful women of Livingston County, because we use the comfort kits they gave us.

As for myself, I have a nice place. The day after I arrived here I was asked to help run the mess hall; about a week afterward the man with whom I was working received his commission as a lieutenant and I had the good fortune to be made a sergeant.

We have a fine group of officers; all are good men. One in particular, Lieutenant O'Leary, is the idol of the company. There isn't a man in the company who wouldn't follow him through hell-fire, if necessary. He has a fine Irish smile that carries all before it. You may tell the folks at home that with O'Leary commanding them and Dougherty feeding them the boys from Livingston County are being well taken care of.

WILMER FROBISH WOUNDED

Somewhere in France, October 12, 1918.

Dear Mother: Will write you a few lines today as I am feeling pretty well. It will be one week tonight that I have been at the hospital. I am still at the field hospital, but I think they will send me to a base hospital in a few days. I was wounded by six machine gun bullets, but only two of them hit me very bad. One went through my right arm about two inches below the shoulder and it made a nasty hole, but it hasn't pained me any as yet, and luckily it missed the bone so the arm will be all right in a few months. My worst hit was in the back, but don't get the impression that I had my back turned towards the Germans and was running, but was lying on my stomach, the bullet entered my back near my right shoulder blade and lodged near my right lung. The doctor removed it the same day and I sure suffered from it for four or five days. Another bullet went through the index finger of my left hand; one grazed the bottom part of my right hand and two grazed the left side of my face, near the cheek bone, and I think one of these will leave a small scar. I am beginning to feel natural again, eat three meals a day, but find it hard to sleep. I must close but don't worry as I am feeling fine and will be as good as new in a few months.

RUSSELL SPEICHER KILLED IN ACTION

Somewhere in France, October 13, 1918.

Mrs. Sara Speicher, Chatsworth, Illinois.

My dear Mrs. Speicher: This is just a brief note of sympathy from your son's platoon commander. He had only been with us for three or four weeks but I think his loss is felt more by myself and the men of the platoon than that of any of the other men. He was always so cheerful and so ready and willing to do everything that was asked of him. It was on the third day of our last battle in Champagne, October 6, while we were lying in a line of shallow pits, waiting to "go over" and make a further advance that a shell struck right beside the hole your son was in, wounding another man and killing your son. For two days before that he had been in the thick of a very fierce battle with us, always cheerful and always cool and ready to push on.

I know what a terrible loss it must be to you and how helpless any words of mine can be to console you, but I do want you to know that your son died a brave man and one whom all of us had grown fond of. With the very deepest sympathy from myself and all of your son's comrades.

COUNTY'S LARGEST UNIT ENTRAINS FOR WAR CAMP

Livingston County sent away 275 of her young men today to aid the government in its prosecution of its share of the great war.

The young men and their relatives began arriving in the city before 7 o'clock and by 8 o'clock, when they reported to the local examining board, the streets were filled with automobiles and fully 3000 people were present to bid them farewell.

The leaving of such a large contingent of young men brings home more clearly to each individual the seriousness of the conflict in which the United States is now engaged. The departure was clothed in sadness. There was scarcely a dry eye as the special train pulled out of the Alton station at 1 o'clock, carrying the young men to Camp Wheeler.

At the conclusion of a farewell program at the west front of the Court House the men were presented with comfort kits and smileage books. The young men then marched to the opera house where dinner was served them by the Chamber of Commerce, the ladies of the Christian Church doing the serving.

PONTIAC VETERAN TELLS PLIGHT OF WAR TORN POLAND

Mechanic John Caviezel has returned to his home here from three years of service with the United States Army overseas. He enlisted with the Sixth Division of regulars.

John left this country in 1917 with his division and stopped at Glasgow, Scotland, for a few days. The landing of the transport at Glasgow marked the

first landing of American troops on Scottish soil. From there they went on down to Southampton, England, where they stopped. A short time later they re-embarked for France.

After training in France his division was sent to the battle front. John was a member of a regiment of engineers and saw duty with them until the end of the war. He was with his regiment at Chateau Thierry, one of the hottest engagements that American troops were in. Another of the larger pushes he was in was the Argonne, where American troops cleared the woods of Germans and covered themselves with glory.

Following the signing of the armistice his division was ordered to Engers, Germany. After hiking to that city he was stationed there for nine months doing guard duty. At that time he had been in France from 1917 until the 18th day of November, 1918.

He was transferred to the second division of regulars while at Engers and proceeded on to Poland, where the government had sent men to assist the Poles in fighting the typhus that was raging there. He worked in Germany, Austria and Poland. Until several weeks ago, when he was ordered home, John was at Warsaw, Poland.

When asked how the Americans in Poland were treated he stated that they were given the best of treatment and that the Poles assisted them all they could. They realized that the Yanks were there to help them and gave them their loyal support. He said that prices were very high there for the natives, but the rate of exchange making American money worth so much, made things much lower for the Americans.

In Germany the Americans were not treated so well. In the areas held by American troops the people were as civil as could be expected, but in the unoccupied areas they were still regarded as enemies. While in Germany the United States consul was able to give the boys much assistance, there was no need for it in Poland.

John went on a nine-day trip through Germany. The district he passed through was well kept and intensively cultivated. This was the region in which the people were still hostile. Only potatoes were planted there but the crop gave appearance of being a very large one. Men and women, alike, were working in the fields.

While it was impossible for him to pass through the district in which the factories are located, it was his opinion that the factories were running over time and that everyone was trying to put Germany on a pre-war basis as quickly as possible.

The Germans, as he found them, are very industrious, thrifty and shrewd. It was his opinion that Germany would be the first European country, with the exception of Belgium, to get back to pre-war conditions. The country was not devastated by armies as was France and is in the best condition now of any that he was in, outside of England. The French are slower at reconstruction but much work has been done around the devastated areas.

While in Poland John was in touch with relief work of every kind. In his talk he could not praise the American Red Cross enough. The work the organization is doing over there is wonderful. The Poles regard them as true friends and think that the Red Cross of America is about as fine an organization as there is. Some even treat the members in a half worshipful way. During the evacuation of cities and towns the Red Cross was on hand at all times, assisting in the evacuation, caring for the sick and wounded and feeding all.

Since the bolsheviks went to war with the Poles, the Red Cross organization has kept bread lines for the people. Those people who have not money to buy the necessities of life are given food. Not only are there bread lines but also there are tobacco lines, meat lines and lines for nearly everything that the people find necessary to have to exist.

Poland is in a starving condition. Only a small portion of bread, "the staff of life," is given to each person, and this must be paid for. This is separate from the lines of the Red Cross and the prices are exorbitant. In speaking of the government food lines, John made the statement that many times he has seen people form in line at three o'clock in the morning and wait until ten before they could reach the place where food was sold.

He gave as the reason for the starving condition in Poland that the people, both men and women, were in the army and that they were so busy keeping the invading reds from their soil that there was no one to cultivate the crops.

Transferred to 2d Engineers before leaving the United States General Maxime Weygand, of the French Army, commanded Polish troops whom he saw routed.

All of the male sex, from boys of twelve years of age to the oldest men who can hardly walk, were in the army. The women, while they did not do any actual fighting, formed large armies and did guard duty in the cities and other work that could be done so that every available man could go to the front.

Another reason John gave for the starving condition there was that for the past several years the country has been under the rule of first one army and then another. When the Germans invaded Russia they devastated Poland. Then the Russians gained it. After the war and when crops were coming on good, they again invaded Poland and tore up the country. He stated that if there is no help given much added suffering will be the Poles' lot this winter.

At the time of the evacuation of Warsaw, John was in that city. "Warsaw," he said, "is a city of a million inhabitants. As the reds approached the city the people started fleeing. The city was jammed. The trains could not begin to take all the people out of the town and they were forced to go in wagons, wheel barrows and on foot. Every road leading from the city was packed with every kind of vehicle. Traffic could go but one way and that with much difficulty."

Here again the American Red Cross came in with much assistance. During the rush to get out, families were scattered. Eight hundred babies, from six

months to two years old, were found by the Red Cross workers. They had been lost from their parents. The organization gathered them up, fed and clothed them and kept them until their parents could be found.

The Polish army was willing to fight for the country, but had nothing to fight with. Only a few had guns and there was no ammunition for those that had them. The only way that the bolsheviki advance could be slowed was by felling trees across roads, burning bridges and doing everything possible to retard the enemy.

By the time Warsaw was reached the French government succeeded in getting supplies and munitions to the city. General Baron Wrangel was given command of the army. He found a hole in the enemy's line. The reds were closing in on Warsaw from all sides. At one point there was a weak spot. Wrangel threw his entire army at that point broke through and spread the wings of his army out. This enveloped a large part of the red army and they were annihilated.

As the bolsheviki army is not like the English, French or German, but just a mob bent on plunder, blood and massacre, it was not hard to rout them after part had been captured. This piece of strategy by General Wrangel alone saved the city of Warsaw, the capital of Poland.

John was in eleven countries while in Europe. They were Scotland, England, France, Belgium, Luxemburg, Germany, Austria, Poland, Russia, Lithuania and Silesia.

In commenting on the different countries' conditions he said that Austria was in a very unrestful state and not going on with reconstruction like many of the other countries. Bolshevism has a large number of followers. Russia is the worst and is in a constant uproar. The people are fighting and seem to want to fight on. There is no production there and no one is working.

"Never did I realize what the Statue of Liberty meant. It was the wonderful symbol that meant home to me," said this bronzed veteran from overseas. "All that I saw while there—from the veiled hostility of the Germans in their prosperous territory, the red army, the gaunt hunger of the Poles, the extremes in scenery from the exquisite Alps to the bleak Russian steppes, were forgotten in that moment when I saw the torch in the harbor at New York after an absence of three years."

TRUCE SIGNED—EX-KAISER FLEES

Washington, November 11, 1918. (By United Press). The State Department this morning announced that the German armistice had been signed at five a. m., (French time), November 11. Hostilities are to cease at eleven a. m., (French time), November 11. The announcement was made at 2:46 this morning. Terms have not yet been announced but are expected to be made public at any hour.

PONTIAC BUGHOUSE OVER TRUCE NEWS

To state that Pontiac citizens went "bughouse" this morning when word of the signing of the armistice was received here would be stating the fact too mildly.

Word of the signing was received by the Daily Leader over the United Press wire at 2:15 o'clock and shortly afterwards the celebration started. A short while after the receipt of the news by the Leader, the local office of the Public Service Company received word of the signing from the main offices of the company in Chicago and the big siren at the power plant announced the glad tidings. From then on bedlam reigned. By three o'clock a nucleus of a celebrating crowd had gathered in the business section, took control of the big bell on the city hall and kept it going until six o'clock, the men working in relays to relieve each other. The big bell on the court house joined in and soon the church bells took up the chorus.

The crowd down town rapidly grew and each brought some sort of noise producing instrument. A parade was formed, marched to the Alton station and went through two passenger trains which had just arrived. Passengers who were sleeping were awakened and told the good news. Members of the Pontiac Military Band were summoned and, headed by the national colors, the crowd marched all through the residence districts.

Returning to the square a huge bonfire was started at the corner of Mill and Madison streets. Into this bonfire went the big sign board that had done service in the court house square during the Liberty Loan and war work campaigns.

One citizen was seen pushing a baby carriage in which was an effigy of the kaiser and later he, too, went into the fire.

Schools were dismissed for the day. The pupils formed in line and pulled off a parade of their own. Employees of the Pontiac Shoe Company assembled at the plant, sang patriotic songs and were excused for the day. At the A. M. Legg Shoe Company some early rising wag had posted a sign, "No work here today." Another sign read, "Anyone who works today is a Hun."

Crowds stood constantly before the bulletins which were posted in the windows of the Leader and kept asking, "When are you going to get any more news?" It sure was some day.

It was one great sale, the auction sale held last Saturday for the Red Cross, and the total receipts were \$2610.55. This will help the local auxiliary to supply the boys with many things that they would have had to go without while fighting for us "over there."

There were many comical and pleasing things connected with the sale. The squeal of one of the pigs donated by Dick Netherton sold for \$3.00, and another for \$2.50. A few articles sold for less than their actual value, but as a general rule everything sold for much more than it was worth, as an instance, one dozen eggs brought \$36.00.

The Hereford heifer donated by P. J. Lawless sold for \$101. Many things sold over and over again, for the buyers would pay for them and have them sold again.

Among the list of articles put up toward the last was a rooster donated by Will Felt, and here is where things began to get lively. Before supper this rooster had brought nearly \$200, and after supper he was again placed on sale and nearly everyone in the city and surrounding country owned him for a short time, and as a result he brought the handsome sum of \$825, and is still the property of the local auxiliary of the Red Cross. He will be taken to Fairbury for the Red Cross sale to be held there next Saturday, and the understanding is that if he does not bring as much in that city as he did here he will be returned to us, but the Fairbury boosters for the sale are certain that he will never come back to Chatsworth.

REFORMATORY BOYS HELP RED CROSS ON RUSH ORDER

Patriotism within four walls! Perhaps you have never happened to think that the boys within the Reformatory are just as patriotic as other people. On various occasions the boys of the Illinois State Reformatory have demonstrated their patriotism by their generous donations to the Red Cross, in many cases giving all their small earnings. Today another example of their patriotism was noted in the local Red Cross rooms.

When Superintendent J. F. Scouler heard that the hospital garment department was experiencing difficulty in getting workers to carry on the August quota, two cutters from the tailoring department generously offered their services. All this long sweltering afternoon when the thoughts of everyone turned to visions of the "ole swimmin' hole" and cold things to drink, the two boys from the Reformatory stood at the work tables in the Red Cross rooms cutting out interminable suits of pajamas and other garments. They did not complain of the heat; rather they expressed joy at being able to help the boys over there who are also having a warm time of it.

SHOULD BE LOYAL TO U. S.

Carl Ballweg, lumber and coal dealer at Emporia, Kansas, a native of Germany, resident in the United States thirty years, sent out Christmas cards to his friends and customers on which was printed:

"I speak from the viewpoint of the foreign born. I, and millions of others like me, came to this country alone and without friends. We sponged on all

America had, her free lands, her free schools, and above all, her spirit of open hearted comradeship. She owed us nothing, but she gave us all. We swore allegiance to her flag, her constitution and her laws. We would be recreants, ingrates, perjurers, and curs if, in the hour of her need, we counselled with her enemies and were disloyal to her cause."—*American Lumberman*.

A BELLIGERENT MINISTER

Henry F. Selcer, who will be in charge of the contingent of drafted men transferred from other local boards who leave here tomorrow, has shown an extremely patriotic spirit. He only recently completed his course in a divinity school and was ordained in the Episcopal church and was assigned to a charge in the West. He registered in the draft in his home city of Fairbault, Minn. He received a deferred classification because of the fact that he was a minister of the gospel. He requested re-classification from his local board, waiving all claims he might have because of his ministerial calling that he might enter the tank corps of the United States. His request was granted by his local board but his application was turned down by the Provost Marshal General's office because of the fact that Mr. Selcer was a minister of the gospel. Mr. Selcer was not to be deterred and on coming to this city to visit his brother he applied to the local board for immediate induction, and after explaining his effort to the local board they have now placed him in the contingent to leave for Camp Grant.

Chairman Torrance today received a letter from the local board at Fairbault concerning Mr. Selcer. Among other things the letter said, "We are proud of his patriotism and we think that the rules should be suspended and induction thereafter completed."

PONTIAC SAILOR KILLED IN CAMP

(Pontiac Daily Leader, July 18, 1918)

Joseph Campbell, a jackie at Great Lakes Training Station, was killed by electrocution last night while cleaning an engine boiler.

MILITARY HONORS FOR DEAD JACKIE

Never more can Pontiac be unconscious of the sorrows of war, for today came Pontiac's first military funeral. Business houses and factory closed and all Pontiac united in mourning for the dead hero, Seaman Joseph Campbell.

As the bell of the Catholic church tolled at 9 o'clock the funeral cortege moved down the street, lined with throngs of people who had assembled to honor the dead hero. Headed by the Military Band, the color guard swung into view, then followed the escort of soldiers and sailors, their bronzed faces strangely stern and solemn as the sailors carried the remains of their dead comrade into the church.

The services were held at St. Mary's Church, Rev. Father Cannon celebrated the impressive service of Solemn High Requiem Mass, assisted by Father Kendrick and Father Berry of Odell.

In an impressive sermon Father Cannon extolled the virtues and courage of the dead hero, a lad just past twenty-one who had done his all to make his country free, using as the text the words "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

The funeral cortege moved to the Odell cemetery, where interment was made.

FORREST MOURNS FIRST DEAD HERO

(Pontiac Daily Leader, August 21, 1918)

Another of Livingston County's soldier boys has given his life for his country, and Forrest now mourns her first soldier dead on a European battlefield.

Sergeant Archie Folwell of Forrest is the most recent of the young men from this county who has met his death "over there." A letter was received in Forrest yesterday written by a comrade of Sergeant Folwell's stating that Archie met his death while "going over the top," in the drive along the Marne and that he fell beside his comrade while they were in action. The letter stated that the drive started July 15 and the letter bore the date of July 28, but it did not state the date of the death of the sergeant.

Young Folwell was 27 years of age and had served three years in the National Guard of Illinois. He served time on the Mexican Border several years ago and on his return north was honorably discharged. When war was declared he re-enlisted. He has been in France since last spring and was a member of the 38th Division.

RECEIVE SON'S EFFECTS

William Surface, of Cornell, has received from France the personal belongings of his son, Harry, which he had on his person at the time he fell bravely fighting the foe.

Among them was a letter dated August 1, to his father and mother, which was never finished. It shows all evidence of having been written in the trenches and in it he speaks of a desire to see the boys of Co. F, whom he knew were somewhere in France. He said France was a fine country and that he was feeling fine. This letter has stains upon it which are undoubtedly spots of the young hero's blood.

His wrist watch and a large pocket knife, besides a few pictures of Cornell friends, his registration card, etc., were received. The watch had stopped at 10 o'clock and as near as can be learned, it was about that time when he fell, and as the watch is bent so that it will not run it is very likely it stopped when its owner fell.

He was buried in the American cemetery, Chateau de la Foret, Fere-en-Tardenois, Aisne.

CITED FOR BRAVERY

(Pontiac Daily Leader)

Word has just been received in this city that Miss Margaret Cummings, a former young lady of this city, has been cited for bravery by General John J. Pershing, Commander-in-Chief of the American Expeditionary Forces.

Miss Cummings is a member of Base Hospital Unit No. 15. This unit left New York on January 8, 1918, and landed at Liverpool on the 23rd. After a week in a rest camp at Southampton, they sailed for Le Havre, France, and went straight for Chaumont, where they remained all through the war. That city was also general headquarters for General Pershing.

At odd intervals members of the unit were teamed up and sent to the first aid stations close to the front line trenches. Miss Cummings and her chum, Miss Hope, both of Memphis, Tenn., made up one of these teams and because they refused to leave their first aid station, which was under heavy shell fire, and remained to dress the wounds of the boys from home, were cited for bravery by General Pershing.

Miss Cummings spent a number of years in this city. She graduated from the township high school here, and later attended Northwestern University at Evanston, where she completed her course, and later specialized as a surgical nurse. She then went to Memphis, Tenn., which has since been her home. It was in that city that she enlisted as a Red Cross nurse, and was sent abroad. It is stated that the hospital unit to which she is attached is now on the seas enroute home.

SINKING OF THE U. S. S. COVINGTON

H. L. JONES AND D. H. GARRISON, LIEUTENANTS (j.g.) U. S. N. R. F.

(From the Deck School Log of the Naval Auxiliary Reserve)

The U. S. S. Covington, formerly the Hamburg-American liner Cincinnati, was seized by the United States Government the day war was declared against Germany. The engines and other working parts of the ship, which had been greatly damaged by the Germans, were rapidly repaired and the vessel was quickly fitted out for use in the transport service. Its first trip to France was made in October, 1917, and from that time on until sunk by a Hun torpedo, she was continuously engaged in carrying troops between Boston and Brest.

On the morning of July 1, 1918, the Covington, accompanied by the transports George Washington, De Kalb, Ryndam, Dante Allegheri, Princess Matoika, Wilhelmina and Lenape, together with a convoy of destroyers, left Brest on their homeward voyage to the United States. About 9:15 o'clock on the first night out, while approximately one hundred and fifty miles off the French coast, the men in the lookout stations on the Covington observed a telltale white wake rapidly approaching the ship on the port side. The officer of the bridge was immediately notified and an effort was made to avoid the oncoming torpedo by

changing the course of the vessel, but without success. A few seconds after first sighted it struck the side of the Covington amidships just opposite the boiler rooms.

The force of the explosion that resulted was terrific. It threw up a column of water that reached the upper crow's nest on the foremast, and at the same time tore from its lashing a life-boat which hung on its davits more than fifty feet above the sea and hurled it inboard against the smoke stacks. The hole in the side of the ship extended almost sixty feet in length and I can still remember the roar of the sea as it rushed through it and flooded the engine and boiler rooms. The wireless and lighting systems were instantly destroyed and everything was shrouded in darkness. By this time the vessel had lost headway and had a list of more than thirty degrees to port. It was obvious that it would be extremely hazardous to remain on board much longer and so the order was given to abandon ship.

The life-boats and rafts were quickly lowered and the men sliding down the falls or descending by means of rope ladders were taken aboard the boats or remained in the water clinging to the ropes circling the rafts, which were huge doughnut-like affairs with a hole in the middle and very bouyant. The work of abandoning the Covington was carried on with practically no confusion, which reflects the highest praise for the efficiency and discipline of the officers and crew. The life-boat I commanded picked up forty men who were floating in the water nearby and then succeeded in getting five of the rafts in tow, so as to prevent them from becoming separated in the dark. Nearly all of the men in the boats were wet to the skin and were shivering in the wind. Those hanging to the rafts in the water suffered intensely from the cold and were chilled to the bone. The courage they displayed, however, was magnificent. They started to sing, "Where Do We Go From Here, Boys," and "Hail, Hail the Gang's All Here," keeping this up until they were rescued two hours later by the destroyer Smith. One of these men clinging to a half-submerged raft had picked up the ship's puppy before leaving the vessel. As I rowed past him, he asked me to please take the poor frightened animal into my boat, which I readily did, and he thanked me through chattering teeth. Although he was himself suffering greatly from the cold, his first concern was about the comforts of the small puppy. What chances had the Huns of terrifying or defeating men of this character with their stupid and inhuman campaign of frightfulness?

Captain Hasbrouck and the crews of the four six-inch guns were the last people to leave the ship. The men stationed at the after port gun, just before going over the side, fired three times at an object thought to be a submarine, but at the time it was too dark to determine whether or not any damage was done or to ascertain for certain if it was a U-boat.

In compliance with standing orders, the other vessels in the convoy, with the exception of the destroyer Smith, immediately after the Covington was

attacked, put on full steam and hastened to get out of the vicinity as quickly as possible to avoid the possibilities of a similar fate. The single destroyer, however, promptly came to our assistance and began dropping depth charges as she circled around our disabled ship. Finally the Smith began to take the men off the boats and rafts, never actually stopping for this purpose, but taking them on board while still under way and then casting the boats or rafts adrift again. During the night she succeeded in picking up almost 800 of the officers and men.

At daybreak on the following morning, the destroyers Nicholson and Reed arrived from Brest. The Covington was still afloat, and as two British salvage tugs and American craft had also reached the scene, preparations were made to try to tow the disabled ship back to Brest. Shortly after 6 A. M. the three tugs had the vessel in tow and were making fair headway of about five knots per hour. About this time the Smith steamed away for Brest, leaving Captain Hasbrouck, six officers and a selected life-boat crew to remain upon the scene and return to the ship as a salvage party. No time was lost in rowing over and boarding the disabled vessel. She was found to be in a hopeless condition and it was the unanimous opinion that she would remain above the water for only a short time. While on board, the party removed the money from the pay department safes and obtained all the documents and important records. This work was performed as expeditiously as possible, as no one knew when the ship might suddenly slip between the waves.

During the next few hours the ship settled lower in the water and began to list at an angle of forty-five degrees and was perceptibly sinking slowly by the stern. At 2:30 P. M. the stern suddenly submerged, the bow rose majestically in the air and the Covington assumed a vertical position, with the smoke stack clear of the water and the bow of the vessel at least 450 feet above the surface of the sea. Then the final plunge occurred and the Covington was no more. It was an awe-inspiring sight and never to be forgotten by those present. Something caught in our throats and stirred us to the innermost depths of our souls as the magnificent ship rose high out of the water and then slid beneath the waves with a horrible roar. Perhaps not more than thirty seconds elapsed from the time the bow began to rise in the air until it disappeared below the waves, yet in that short space of time the two smoke stacks fell, the fore-castle deck with the foremast was blown from its place and about 7,000 tons of ballast in the form of steel rails, together with the engines, crashed sternward through the bulkheads and stanchions, as the ship assumed the vertical position. The noise and roar accompanying that final plunge was something beyond my limited powers of description and exceeds the imagination of anyone who was not a witness of the tragic event. It was extremely fortunate that the ship did not sink immediately after it was struck, as she would have undoubtedly gone down in the manner just described and the loss of life would have been appalling.

Of the forty-six officers and 750 enlisted men who were aboard at the time

she was torpedoed, only six were missing when we returned to Brest. Three of these were in the fire room when the torpedo struck and were without doubt killed instantly, while the other three were probably drowned during the night. This was a very small percentage lost, considering the harrowing experience passed through. We had met the enemy and they had succeeded in sinking our vessel, but the conduct of every officer and enlisted man aboard the U. S. S. Covington during the entire engagement was gallant and courageous in every respect and upheld the best tradition of the United States Navy.

TWO YEARS OF AMERICAN ACCOMPLISHMENT SINCE WAR WAS DECLARED

(Reprinted from the New York Times Current History)

THE MEN WHO FOUGHT

There have been some estimates published of the number of Americans who fought in battle in France, and guesses have varied by very large numbers. We have an estimate now prepared in France which gives us, perhaps, as near as can be determined the number of United States troops that took part in actual fighting.

“Division troops, including replacements, 1,100,000; corps and army troops, 240,000; service of supply, 50,000; total United States troops taking part in action against the enemy, 1,390,000.”

CRIPPLED AND BLINDED

Artificial limbs needed by disabled men who were in military service during the war are being provided by the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, in accordance with the provisions of the War Risk Insurance Act. There have been more than 500 artificial arms and legs furnished to disabled men to date by the bureau. The total number of amputations in the American forces was less than 4,000.

There were no cases in which men lost both of their arms and both legs. Surgeon General Ireland of the Medical Corps of the Army and Colonel Charles E. Banks, Chief Medical Officer of War Risk Insurance, were cited by the bureau as authority for this statement.

There were but 125 cases of total blindness as the result of the war, and not all these cases have yet been declared as permanent by the medical officers in charge, according to reports to the bureau.

The War Department, on March 25th, announced that reports on prisoners from all sources showed a total loss by the American Army of 4,765 military prisoners and 281 civilians. Of the military prisoners, 4,376 have been reported

officially as released and 233 died in German prison camps. Only one American officer of as high rank as Lieutenant Colonel was captured during the war. Four Majors, 27 Captains, and 363 Lieutenants were taken prisoner.

CASUALTIES BY DIVISIONS

Revised figures made public by the Chief of Staff since April 6th showed that the total battle casualties—that is, men killed in action, wounded, missing in action and prisoners—for the American Expeditionary Forces was 240,197.

“I have just received a chart,” said General March, “from General Pershing’s headquarters giving the total figures by divisions of the killed in action, wounded, missing in action, and prisoners, according to the division reports received at his headquarters. Possibly these figures will have to be modified in some slight way, but it is as nearly accurate as he could get. The total battle casualties, as we will call them, follow:

The totals for all divisions, exclusive of the two regiments of marines in the Second division, are: Killed in action, 27,762; died of wounds, 11,396; missing in action, 14,649; prisoners, 2,785; grand total of major casualties, 56,592.

LOCAL BOARD FOR LIVINGSTON COUNTY

HOW THE SELECTIVE SERVICE LAW OPERATED IN LIVINGSTON COUNTY

The Local (Exemption) Board of Livingston County was organized on June 29, 1917, with H. E. Torrance as Chairman and John S. Murphy as Secretary. The third appointee of the President was Dr. James A. Marshall, who was in direct charge of all physical examinations. The personnel of the board and its officers continued as organized during the whole of its existence. Its work terminated and the members were discharged by the President on March 31, 1919. Miss Winnie Sparks was its first clerk, serving until September of 1917, when she resumed her duties as a teacher in the local high school. She was succeeded by Miss Agnes M. Whalen who continued as its clerk until the work was completed. After September 7, 1918, Miss Whalen was assisted by John McLeod Wyllie, a Livingston County registrant, who was assigned by the Adjutant General to this board. The board was fortunate in its selection of clerks as the clerical work was invariably promptly and efficiently performed.

The citizens of Pontiac and of the County never failed to respond to calls for aid when the requirements of the work were beyond the capacity of its members and its clerks. Recognition of individuals, because of their number and the lack of definite data, would be difficult; but the teachers in the public schools, the boys of the Pontiac Township High School, and the Boy Scouts of Pontiac are particularly to be commended for their frequent and valuable service; the teachers in assisting in the clerical work and the boys in their aid at physical examinations. The members of the Livingston County Bar Association gave much and valuable time in assisting registrants in the preparation of their question-

naires. The spirit of patriotic endeavor to win the war, common to our people, could always be counted on to furnish the aid required, tiresome and monotonous as much of it was.

The board had jurisdiction over 8,395 registrants; 3,435 having registered at the initial registration, 324 at the June and August 1918 registration, and 4,636 registering on September 12, 1918. The first registration, prior to the appointment of the local board, was conducted by sheriff J. R. Ives, County Clerk W. W. Kenney and Dr. C. C. Meeks; subsequent registrations were under the jurisdiction and direction of the local board. The number failing to register, in deliberate defiance of law, could be counted on the fingers of one hand. One man was found as late as the early fall of 1918 who had not heard of the necessity for registration, and but one was found to have used a fictitious name for the purpose of escaping military service. These were more than equaled by those who overstated or understated their age. Illiteracy among actual residents of the county was almost wholly absent and registrants generally could be depended upon to give intelligent aid in the operation of the selective service system. Cowardice among the registrants was rare, if, in fact, it existed at all; deliberate, conscious fraud was not found, and attempted evasion of service was surprisingly infrequent when the propaganda from official sources stressing the right and duty to claim exemption is taken into consideration. Generally speaking the registrants of Livingston County were earnest, patriotic men, who had a serious and solemn conception of their duty as citizens, and who were ready to serve their country wherever and in whatever capacity they were found to be of the greatest value.

Approximately 2500 physical examinations of registrants were made. The doctors and dentists of the county generally volunteered to assist in these examinations, and, though entitled to compensation, all served without cost to the government. Doctors Scouller, Ross, Beatty, Bawden, Crocker, Pearson, Bach, Daley, Middleton, Lockie, Mitchell, Hamilton, Zinn, Lewis, Langstaff, Kestinger, Otis, Barr, Wilcox, Tombaugh, Law, Blough, Dondonville, Barnheizer, Shaffer, Alcorn, Oughton and Robinson assisted Dr. Marshall in this work. Too much credit cannot be given them for their willingness and for the efficiency of their service. The work was thoroughly systematized and as many as 78 men per hour were examined. Calls for examination were ordinarily at an average of 250 per day and the work usually was concluded by noon. At one examination a medical curiosity appeared. For several moments he had the physicians guessing as to the location of his heart, or whether he had one at all. It was finally located on his right side, and, in common with it, his other internal organs were the reverse of those of normal persons. Appeals from examinations were comparatively few, and many were withdrawn like that of the young man whose complaint of weak knees was cured by the laughter of those that heard it.

An examination day brought with it a good natured crowd, and carried with it but little of the earnestness of registration day or the solemnity of entrain-

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ment for camp. A line of 250 virile, red blooded youths in the garb of their first progenitor, brings smiles not tears, and is conducive to practical jokes and amusing and often witty remarks. Anxiety, if it existed, was kept in the background, and jollity was the order of the day.

Classification, selection, induction, and entrainment, but for two problems exceptional to this county, brought no unusual or unexpected difficulties. They entailed an enormity of labor, of a detailed and vexatious character, an insistent demand for interviews at all hours of day and night that could not be denied, and many heart-rending appeals from mothers and fathers and wives. All in a degree beyond the conception of one who has not the experience of 8000 similar problems. Indifference to unjust criticism was essential; and many questions arose which necessitated frequent and timely self administered admonitions of the necessity for close adherence to the law and the rules for its enforcement.

Exemptions from service because of the needs of agriculture presented a serious problem. The county being so preponderantly agricultural and the necessity for farm labor being so urgent, it was difficult to adjust the balance between the calls for service and the demands for an increase in farm products. More dissatisfaction was caused and criticism resulted from the exemption of farmers and farm laborers than from all other of the operations of the selective service system. Necessarily this resulted, for a farm laborer is generally like his fellows, and some were taken and others remained. The selection was largely arbitrary in its results and difficult to justify in its comparisons. Glad, indeed, were the local boards in agricultural counties that the burden of this choice was not primarily theirs, but experience has demonstrated that it should have been and that the district boards should have been limited to the consideration of appeals. By the first of June, 1918, those available and classified for service, excluding agricultural laborers previously exempted or whose call had been deferred, were almost completely exhausted. From thence on the burden of the calls was on the agriculturist. The contingent of June 24 of 275 men was composed almost exclusively of farmers or farm laborers. It made difficult a real response in the season of 1918 to the cry for more food. Because of the necessity for farm labor and the insistence of the Provost Marshal General that food was of prime importance, much injustice was done by over zealous patriots to individuals who were exempted and in some instances even refused induction into service.

The conscientious objector was a disturbing factor in Livingston County. The Amish and Mennonites, believers in the non-resistance, maintained several churches in the county, and in one township comprised a goodly percentage of the population. Unfortunately the members generally were of German birth or descent, and in some of the churches all or part of the service was conducted in the German language. It was a natural consequence that their neighbors were apt to attribute their conscientious objections to military service to their nationality rather than to the tenets of their church. The few who were inducted into

service in 1917 and the early months of 1918, with one exception, accepted non-combatant service and reconciled their conscience to the use of the army uniform. One registrant sent to Camp Grant refused to wear the uniform. He was court martialed and sentenced to twenty years confinement at Fort Leavenworth. In June, 1918, sixteen conscientious objectors, supplied with the usual non-combatant certificates, were sent to Camp Wheeler, Georgia, and there refused to wear the uniform. Their principle of non-resistance now having become one of active resistance to the laws of the country the inevitable results followed. Their mistaken, but equally conscientious, neighbors joined in considerable numbers and desecrated their churches by painting them yellow and lettering the outside and inside with inscriptions alluding to their nationality rather than their peculiar religious beliefs. For a time the situation was a tense and dangerous one, but wiser counsel and thoughts in the end prevailed and no further overt acts were committed. Thus the doctrine of non-resistance was in reality resistance to law, and this lawlessness bred, as is often the case, the mob spirit in an otherwise peaceful community. In contrast to the action of the authorities at Camp Grant, the sixteen at Camp Wheeler were dealt with leniently and paroled during the war to engage in farm labor. The results remain, and yet affect the political, social and economic life of their home community.

Twelve hundred ninety-one registrants were called, inducted and entrained for camp. The record of this county is a clean one. No man reporting failed to reach camp on the allotted time, and none who received timely notice failed to respond for induction into service when called, save the unfortunate one who, in a mistaken idea of bidding good-bye to civilian life, mixed the fiery liquids and the cooling beverages of a neighboring city to the exhaustion of his capital, and wearied and footsore and lost in the mazes of returning reason and the eccentricities of a railroad track as a foot path entrained in a box car, where, to his subsequent discomfiture, he was peacefully sleeping as his fellows passed on their journey to camp. In the original allotment of territory to the training cantonments this county was designated as within the territory of Camp Dodge at Des Moines, Iowa. In all, in larger parties, 332 men were entrained for Camp Dodge, 159 were sent to Ft. Wright, Conn., 68 to Jefferson Barracks, Mo., 127 to Camp Gordon, Georgia, 30 to Ft. Thomas, Ky., 275 to Camp Wheeler, Ga., 49 to Camp Grant, Illinois, 20 to Camp Forrest, Ga., and the remainder to various camps and training stations. The first entrainment was sixteen men to Camp Dodge on September 4, 1917, and the last, ten men to Jefferson Barracks on October 1, 1918.

The days of induction into service and entrainment, especially of the larger parties, and as many as 275 were cared for in one contingent, brought a multitude of people and a burden of anxiety and labor to the board. To each registrant it was a crisis in his life; this change from civilian freedom to military discipline. It carried its menace of pain and suffering, of hardship and privation, of life long deformity, of death itself, possibly in its cruelest and most agonizing forms, alone, perhaps, in a strange land far from the ministrations and comforting presence of loved ones. These thoughts, no doubt, were more real-

istic to their families and friends who came with them to give those final words of parting, than to the men themselves, busy as they were with the details of preparation and organization of their party. The very souls of the men were bared in those last hours. The world was no longer a stage upon which one played a part, but the masks were thrown aside and each man showed himself as nature and training had made him. This was more noticeable the larger the party, the more elaborate the ceremonies and the greater the crowd congregated to speed their departure. Solemnity, resignation, dread, exhaltation, enjoyment of a passing show or of a fleeting prominence, determination, sorrow or indifference was easily read in the faces and actions of each of them.

The anxieties of the members of the board and their willing helpers were many. Would all called report? Who were best qualified to have charge of the party on its journey? Was the baggage within the requirements and was it properly tagged, and there the loving mothers caused much trouble in their desire to provide for the comforts of their sons. Rolls must be called and the party organized and instructed. Vouchers for transportation were to be prepared and arrangements made for sustenance on the way. The fear of failure of all to report was ever present until the last roll call. As the final march to the railroad station began, the spirit of tenseness apparent all the day reached its height, and as the parade progressed with its inspiring music and escort of patriotic organization and sympathetic and loyal men and women, the tears became tears of exhaltation and not of pain and sorrow. Patriotism, like youth, will have its way.

The citizens of Pontiac and Livingston County vied one with another to pay honor to the departing men. The Chamber of Commerce of Pontiac took active charge of their entertainment on the eve of their departure, the Board of Supervisors presented each man with a Smileage Book and the Livingston County Chapter of the Red Cross provided each with a substantial and valuable service kit. Complimentary dinners were served them, parades were had, patriotic and instructive addresses were given. In fact, everything was done within the thought of man to lighten the pain of the breaking of their home ties, and to assure them of the good will and sympathy of their neighbors. The selected men responded to wishes and hopes of their neighbors and friends. They did their part and Livingston County suffered no shame from the conduct of those chosen under the selective service system. All honor is due them and they have written one of the bright pages in the history of this county.

LIVINGSTON COUNTY, ILLINOIS, LIBERTY LOAN CAMPAIGN

When the appeal for subscriptions to the First Liberty Loan was made O. P. Bourland, President of the National Bank of Pontiac, at the request of the Illinois Liberty Loan Committee of the Seventh Federal Reserve District called a meeting of the bankers of the County to discuss the situation.

This meeting was held in Pontiac and was attended by a goodly number of the representatives of the banks.

At this time C. R. Tombaugh was elected County Chairman and an Executive Committee was appointed consisting of—J. M. Lyon, A. M. Legg, W. J. Butler, M. H. Greenebaum and C. A. Rollins, all of Pontiac, it being deemed best at that time to centralize the Committee so that they could get together conveniently.

This practice however was not followed in later campaigns. Mr. Tombaugh served as County Chairman in all the canvasses. Mr. A. M. Legg was Vice-President of the Third, Fourth and Fifth campaigns and Mrs. Carrie S. Bruner, Chairman of the women's organization, also served as Vice-President in the Third Loan.

The plan of organization was similar in connection with each loan. Among those serving on the Executive Committee in the various campaigns in addition to those named above were: J. C. Corbett and F. H. Herr of Chatsworth; W. H. Opie of Forrest; Herbert Powell, Mrs. George Thayer, E. A. Agard of Fairbury; I. M. Lish of Saunemin; J. C. Greenebaum and Mrs. Carrie S. Bruner of Pontiac; M. H. Craven of Odell; Frank Johnson and J. E. Shackelton of Cornell, and J. J. Doherty and Louis Weicher of Dwight.

R. C. Freitag, Secretary of the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce, was Publicity Director and Secretary of the Committee in the Second, Third and Fourth Loans, and his successor, F. W. Mozart, acted in the same capacity during the Fifth Loan.

P. A. Gibbons of Pontiac was Chairman of the Speakers' Bureau in the Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth drives and did effective work. It is impossible to give an even approximately complete list of the speakers who rendered efficient service but among them were: Mr. Gibbons, the Chairman, W. C. Graves, Wm. Wilson, E. M. Johnson, J. There was no Township organization in the First campaign, the banks making most of the subscriptions and afterwards selling the bonds to their patrons. In the Second loan most of the townships had some form of organization although the banks continued largely as the centers of the campaign and did most in the way of soliciting subscriptions, being themselves heavy subscribers. In the Third, Fourth and Fifth loans each Township was organized and the men and the women co-operated in the work, the women doing most of the educational and publicity work while the men did most of soliciting. In the Third, Fourth and Fifth campaigns quotas were assigned to each township. In the Third each township over-subscribed its quota. In the Fourth 26 of the 30 townships reached their allotment. In the Fifth the county quota was easily reached by large over-subscriptions in some towns and no complete record by townships was made after 20 had reached their allotment.

The task of securing the subscriptions during the Fourth campaign was particularly difficult. The amount allotted to the county was much larger than the allotment in the preceding campaigns and in addition there was an epidemic of influenza that resulted in many deaths, that made public meetings impossible, incapacitated many workers and prevented the solicitation of many who would have subscribed if urged. This largely accounted for the failure of some of the townships to secure the volume of subscriptions allotted to them.

Quotas asked from the several townships in the various loans were based in a general way on population and assessed valuation of property modified by a general knowledge of the outside holdings of the residents of those towns. The percentages asked of each were practically the same in the different campaigns. As a basis of comparison the quotas for the Fourth Loan are herewith given :

The people in about one-fifth of the area of Livingston County do their banking in towns outside of the county and as the Federal Reserve Loan Committee give credit for subscriptions to the county in which the banks reporting the subscriptions were located, this county received no credit in the First, Second, and Third Campaigns for subscriptions made by Livingston County residents doing their banking and making their subscriptions through Streator, Chenoa, Gridley, Meadows, El Paso, Minonk, Kempton, Cabery, Reddick, and other towns in adjoining counties.

In the Fourth and Fifth campaigns, however, by agreements with the banks in the various towns arrangements were made whereby the subscriptions taken by outside banks from residents of Livingston County were divided equally between this county and the counties in which the banks receiving the subscriptions were located. The records of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago show that Livingston County received credit as follows :

The press of the county gave wide publicity to the general features of the campaigns and the special plans of the local committee during the campaign, the county organization sent out thousands of circular letters giving facts concerning the loans and appealing to the people for support.

In each of the campaigns hundreds of posters and booklets were distributed and thousands of window stickers, automobile windshield stickers and Liberty Loan buttons were distributed so that each individual had direct appeal made to him through the printed page, the eye, and personal appeals by workers.

The expenses of the County Liberty Loan Committee were borne by the banks of the county in the first three campaigns and were defrayed by the county in the fourth and fifth loans by resolution of the Board of Supervisors. Record should be made of the enthusiastic work done by all classes of citizens in pushing the campaign to a successful issue. Boy Scouts sold bonds and put up posters. School children drew on their savings to make initial payments on bonds and proudly wore the button furnished to subscribers. Churches and other religious organizations gave hearty co-operation. Civic and benevolent societies invested their funds to swell the totals.

The press curtailed their advertising space to feature the loans and hundreds of men and women put aside pressing duties and gave freely of their time and energy to help the Government, in time of need. To name those who rendered signal service is impossible. Let it be noted that the indifferent were few and opponents rare.

The activities of the women who took no mean part in the First and Second loans but who were thoroughly organized in the Third, Fourth and Fifth loans and who shared equally with the men in the division of labor and in credit for subscriptions taken deserve especial mention.

It is fitting that the record of these activities should be presented by Mrs. Carrie Sims Bruner and Miss Ida Wilson Woodrow who efficiently served as County Chairmen for the Women's Liberty Loan Committee and their accounts are herewith presented.

To everyone who served, whether officially or in the ranks, a patriotic people will ever be grateful.

THE STORY OF THE WOMEN'S LIBERTY LOAN COMMITTEE OF LIVINGSTON COUNTY, ILLINOIS

When war comes to a nation the first essential for the prosecution of that war is money.

It is necessary for arming and equipping an army and navy; it is essential for food, for ships, for dependent families of soldiers, for everything that makes for efficient prosecution of war.

The total cost of the World War was so stupendous as to make any former outlay of the government of the United States seem trifling.

In a democratic government such as ours there are but two ways of obtaining money—by taxation on the property of the people or loans from the people through the sale of government bonds.

When the U. S. Congress authorized issues of government bonds to be known as Liberty Bonds to help finance the war, our government offered to the people of the U. S. the opportunity to put their money into the safest investment in the world. It was realized that to borrow billions of dollars in an undertaking so important and within so short a period, required the support of every loyal citizen—women as well as men.

It was in recognition of this fact that the Secretary of the Treasury created a National Women's Liberty Loan Committee.

To the women who were summoned to Washington, D. C., May 7, 1917, by Wm. G. McAdoo, Secretary of the Treasury, he stated that, while battles were won by men, wars were won by money, and that the money necessary to finance the war could not be raised without the aid and support of the women citizens.

Their response was an organization reaching into every state and county and city and town in the U. S. under the direction of an executive committee in Washington, D. C.

This was made possible and done quickly through the experienced women of the Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Wm. G. McAdoo was appointed National Chairman, Mrs. Antoinette Funk, formerly of Pontiac, Livingston County, served as an active vice-chairman throughout the campaigns.

The call for the organization of the Women's Committee in Livingston County was not received until a few days before the Second Liberty Loan Campaign was to begin. Mrs. Fred W. Longan of Lincoln, who had received appointment as chairman of the 17th Congressional District (Ill.) called a meeting at the Red Cross rooms in Pontiac and spoke to a small group of women urging the organization of the women of our county for work in the Liberty Loan drive.

Because of the few days remaining before the drive was to begin no one volunteered to take the responsibility of County Chairman, but all agreed to help with the Second Liberty Loan as much as possible. To Mrs. George Thayer of Fairbury, belongs the honor and credit for the most work done by any one woman in Livingston County for the Second Liberty Loan for she successfully

organized the women of Indian Grove Township and succeeded in selling a great share of the Bonds sold in their Township.

When the call came for the Third Liberty Loan, Mrs. Carrie Sims Bruner of Pontiac, accepted the appointment of County Chairman of the Women's Liberty Loan Committee, from the United States Treasurer through the State Chairman, Mrs. Howard T. Willson of Virden.

A State Conference for district and county chairmen of the Women's Liberty Loan Committee of Illinois, was held in the Senate chamber of the State House, Springfield, on March 5th and 6th, 1918. Men and women Directors of the Seventh Federal Reserve District and other prominent speakers addressed the sessions and plans preparatory for the Third Liberty Loan were discussed.

Co-operation, between the men and women's committees, was the keynote of this conference at which Livingston County was represented by Mrs. Bruner. Mrs. George Thayer of Fairbury was appointed County Vice-Chairman of the Livingston County Women's Liberty Loan Committee and the organization was completed by appointment of a township chairman in each of our thirty townships, these chairmen selecting their helpers for work during the campaigns.

Following this conference Mrs. Geo. Thayer of Fairbury was appointed County Vice-Chairman. Mrs. O. P. Bourland, Pontiac, and Miss Grace Torrance of Pontiac were appointed to serve as members of the Speakers Committee and the Livingston County Women's Liberty Loan Committee was completed by the appointment of a chairman in each of our thirty townships, these Townships Chairmen selecting women from each school district as their helpers during the campaigns.

Through the efforts of these women and their helpers in each township the Third Liberty Loan was thoroughly advertised by the distribution of thousands of leaflets and posters.

The educational part of the campaign was given over entirely to the Women's Committee by agreement between C. R. Tombaugh, County Chairman of the Men's Committee and Mrs. Bruner, Chairman of the Women's Committee. With the assistance of Mrs. M. L. Mudd as stenographer, the arduous work of sending literature to every school teacher in our county was accomplished. The literature advertised through the school children the offer of three prizes:

No. 1 offered by Governor Frank O. Lowden was one \$50.00 bond to the one room country school selling the largest number of bonds.

No. 2 offered by Mrs. Frank O. Lowden, wife of the Governor, one \$50 Liberty Bond to be given to the elementary city or country school selling the largest number of bonds.

No. 3 offered by Pullman Lowden, son of the Governor, who was then in U. S. service, to the High School selling the largest number of Liberty Bonds in proportion to their enrollment.

None of these prizes were won in Livingston County, though the official report states that bonds to the amount of \$15,600 were sold by the school children of our county.

Among the many Liberty Loan posters sent out through the National Committee to every county and thence through the county chairmen to all township chairmen for exhibition, two stand out with great vividness in the minds of the Women's Committee: Howard Chandler Christy's picture of a young woman holding aloft the torch of Liberty enlightening the world, prepared especially for the woman's committee. The other admired, yes, worshiped by both men and women, was a copy of a bronze bust of Abraham Lincoln. Below the picture were quoted his immortal words, "That the Government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth," with a facsimile of his signature, A. Lincoln.

The campaign for sale of Third Liberty Loan Bonds was carried on from April 16th to May 4th, 1918.

It was expected that the women of our county would purchase 25% of the county quota. The county quota was \$942,480.

The official report showing number of bonds bought by women was 1,696, amount \$260,550 thus proving that the women bought beyond the 25 per cent expected.

The bonds were issued May 9, 1918, at 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ %, maturity 1928.

When the call came for the Fourth Liberty Loan, Mrs. Carrie Bruner was appointed County Chairman. During Mrs. Bruner's absence from home to visit her son Crane, serving in the U. S. Aviation Dept., Mrs. Howard T. Willson, State Chairman, appointed Miss Ida Wilson Woodrow, Vice County Chairman, who took charge of the campaign as the active leader of the Woman's Committee for the Fourth Liberty Loan. The following patriotic women were appointed by Miss Woodrow to serve as Township Chairman for the Fourth Liberty Loan.

September 23, 1918, a county meeting was held in the Court House at Pontiac by the Men and Woman's Committee. Here it was decided for the Woman's Committee to do the publicity work, the Men's Committee to do the soliciting. A speaker was sent before every club and society, contests were held in the schools and seven thousand circulars were sent out through the county. Women worked with a will, ever ready to respond to the call, and it was with a feeling of pride on October nineteenth, that they knew the telegram had been sent for the quota of Livingston County. \$1,884,960.00 had been over-subscribed, the women receiving credit for one half of this amount, having worked on the fifty-fifty plan. These bonds were dated October 24, 1918 to October 15, 1938, bearing interest of 4¼ per cent, interest payable April 15th and October 15th.

To County Chairman, Women's Liberty Loan Committee:

Knowing that you will be interested in reading what the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States has said concerning the work of the National Woman's Liberty Loan organization, of which you and your county organization are an important unit, I have pleasure in submitting the following statement, which has just appeared in the report of the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States for 1918.

THE NATIONAL WOMAN'S LIBERTY LOAN COMMITTEE

"One of the notable factors in the success of the Liberty Loans has been the work of the women of the United States. It was with the belief that the women of the Nation would constitute a powerful moral force in war finance that the National Woman's Liberty Loan Committee was appointed by the Secretary of Treasury May, 1917. That they working through the organization effected by this agency, have not only accomplished this purpose, but have also become an essential element in the actual labors of promoting the loans, constitutes one of the most interesting chapters in the financing of the war. There is probably no war service in which so many women have taken more active part than in the raising of money to pay our war burden. To their energy, their enthusiasm, their zeal, and their vision is due a great part of the success of the Liberty loans.

"When the United States went into war with Germany the business of bond selling was a field so new to women that all work within it has been genuine pioneering. The organization of women for the task has been the work of the National Woman's Liberty Loan Committee, which has served in cooperation with the Treasury's war loan organization. The members of this committee, serving as volunteers, have performed the work of enlisting more than a half million women as sellers of Liberty bonds.

"The first labors of the members of the committee, after the closing of the first Liberty loan where their work had been general publicity of war finance among women, were concerned with the adjustment of established organizations of women throughout the country to the established machinery for the raising of

the loans. Where organization existed, the women of the Nation were organized by States, while the Treasury's loan organization was based upon the twelve fiscal divisions of the United States. It was the problem of the committee to correlate the two schemes of organization. They solved it by the appointment of both State and Federal reserve chairmen, the former responsible for actual organization of women in their respective States. The latter serving as the representatives of the women in dealing with the Liberty loan committees of the respective Federal reserve districts. Liberty loan committees elected the women Federal reserve chairmen, members of their executive committees.

"In this organization during the second Liberty loan 60,000 women became sellers of bonds. Reports of the women State chairmen, and of the executive committees of the Federal reserve districts, indicate that the women's organization obtained subscriptions for \$1,000,000,000 of the second loan. In the third Loan 500,000 women were enrolled as members of the organization, which had a woman chairman in almost every county of the United States and township officers in almost every township. In the third loan the women were again credited with having been the selling agents of more than a billion dollars in bonds. In the fourth loan between seven and eight hundred thousand women served, but it is not possible at this time to make an estimate of the amount of bond sales attributed to the woman's organization.

"No mere recital of results achieved can show the extent of the service which women have given to the Nation through their participation in war finance. That hundreds of thousands of women assumed the burden of a new kind of labor, not for themselves but for their country, is one of the most striking and characteristic facts in relation to the women of America that the war has developed. The Liberty loans have afforded a new proving ground where the women of the Nation have accepted the opportunity to demonstrate again their patriotism, their ability, their consciousness of the obligations of citizenship, and their steadfastness of soul in the great and terrible crisis which our country has met."

At this crisis of the Loan the Government of the United States again sounds the bugle of further advance in keen realization of what women have already done in this and other campaigns. The Treasury calls to them in these closing days of the loan for service in a final rush upon the field that will take the loan over the last trench."

THE VICTORY LIBERTY LOAN

In March, 1919, the Government sent out a call for a fifth loan to be raised, which was to be called the Victory Loan. The Woman's Committee held a state conference at the Congress Hotel, Chicago, March 22, 1919. Addresses and five minute talks were given by prominent state workers. County and District Chairmen were present. Livingston County was represented by Mrs. Carrie Bruner. In April Mrs. Bruner was appointed chairman of the 17th Congressional District and Miss Ida Wilson Woodrow was appointed to the position of chairman of Livingston County.

The Woman's Committee called a county meeting April 12, 1919. Miss Woodrow presided at the morning conference, speaking on the good results from methods used in the campaign of the Fourth Loan. A luncheon was served at the Christian Church. In the afternoon Mr. C. R. Tombaugh instructed the women how they could be helpful to the Men's Committee, Mrs. Bruner and Miss Grace Torrance speaking on why we must raise a fifth loan.

The clever little play, "Lest We Forget," was given April 18, 1919, by the Dramatic Club of the Pontiac Township High School, also by several other schools through the county.

April 21st, three German helmets were offered as prizes for the best essay written upon the Victory Fifth Liberty Loan by High School or Grammar Grade pupils. Mrs. Clara Sims, Pontiac, Mrs. Norton Porter, Pontiac, Mrs. Amanda Hubbard, Pontiac, Mrs. George Thayer, Fairbury, Mrs. Robert Mills, Dwight, acted as judges for this contest. Forty-nine essays were entered, the judges having much difficulty in choosing between them. Miss Vera Munson, Pontiac, received the first, Miss Gertrude Bartlett the second and Miss Rose Anderson, third.

Mrs. Mattie Greenebaum was untiring in her work of Publicity Chairman. She and her committee addressed and mailed 9,350 letters at one time.

On Easter morn, April 19, 1919, the County Chairman received an Easter telegram sent out by the State Chairman. Following is a copy :

"On this Easter morn let us give thanks that the country is freed from the menace of war, that because of the early cessation of hostilities the majority of our boys are returning to us, that we are now ready to open the Victory Fifth Liberty Loan which is an investment for the comfort, support and safe return of the American Army and not for protection against an enemy. By an early and volunteer subscription let us prove that we have not forgotten those who died for liberty. With firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive to finish the work we are in.

Three hundred and fifty medals made from a German cannon were given in recognition of services for the Victory Liberty Loan to the women workers of the county.

The Victory Bonds were short term government notes maturing in one to five years, bearing interest of $4\frac{3}{4}$ per cent.

While the work of preparing for a loan is difficult to look forward to, exacting in detail and entails many days of weariness, with the cooperation of the Men's and Women's Committee, our county quota of \$1,562,150.00 was soon raised.

In the first two loans, women were rather a zero or minus sign, but in the Third, Fourth and Fifth Loans we became a plus sign in every County and State of our Union. How fortunate we have been to live in times like these, so as to be an integral factor in this great financial organization. To be a part of this wonderful organization shows indeed the growth and power of womanhood and her status in the economic, industrial and financial world. It was a feeling of pride and pleasure to be closely identified with the people who have been the potential and vital force in moulding and framing public opinion to its duty of supporting the loans. Only those in close touch with our work realized our responsibilities, but through the co-partnership of District, County and Township Chairmen, our many perplexing problems were met and solved.

At the close of the Victory Liberty Loan campaign it is with a feeling of joy, still its memory is not without a feeling of sadness as we recall the many pleasant incidents that have attended the Men's and Woman's organizations as they have journeyed along together through the five campaigns.

HISTORY OF THE LIVINGSTON COUNTY FOOD ADMINISTRATION

The history of the Livingston County Food Administration during the period of the World War is such that it reflects great credit on those who were empowered to act in an official capacity, and further still, on the inhabitants of the county, who tried, almost as a solid unit, to carry out the wishes of those who promulgated the rulings. In this particular branch of the war activities Livingston County responded, as it always does, in full measure, that the requests of the Government might be accomplished with the least amount of friction.

On December 15, 1917, Harry A. Wheeler appointed Jacob Solma as Food Administrator for the county, and the first thing done was to get quarters in the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce where desk room and a meeting place could be had. The assistant secretary was available at all times to write letters and answer telephone calls.

The county was immediately organized by the appointment of Township Administrators. It was first planned to have one in every township in the county, but owing to the shortage of farm help, this plan was set aside, and the townships were grouped among men who had the time to give to the work and were divided as follows:

All of the above did not hold out for the year but most of them were faithful to the end and did splendid work.

OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

A retail merchants organization was effected, but this was not very successful, for it was hard to get the members out to meetings, due to the shortage of

help. We also had a Price Fixing Committee, whose prices were published once a week and the instructions from state headquarters were published, and lived up to as nearly as possible.

GENERAL POLICY AND METHODS

Advertising sent from Mr. Wheeler's office was distributed largely through the schools of the county. The Pontiac city teachers offered their services on several occasions to assist in mailing out important literature, so that there would be no delay. On one particular day three mail sacks of printed matter were sent out from the office. This could not have been accomplished without the teachers' help.

WHEAT AND FLOUR CONSERVATION

There was very little trouble in this section of the country, either with merchants or their customers, in complying with the Food Administration's rulings, with reference to using substitutes; some thought at first that the change to a coarser food would be beneficial to their health, but the continued use of the substitutes soon changed their ideas. After the war merchants who had substitutes on hand, found no sale for them. The loyal people of Livingston County will always be remembered. When the Chicago Office called for the over-supply of flour, which was to be turned back to the Government, our figures show that 360 sacks had been returned to different merchants in the county.

SUGAR CONSERVATION

Sugar allowance was one of the hardest things we had to contend with, there seemed to be something wrong in the allowance made to the dealers. Some had plenty and others had not half enough, and it took time to figure out why this was, but we finally found out. The merchant's allotment was made from his 1915 and 1916 sales and there were some merchants who, during these years, made a leader out of sugar to get other business, and consequently they had more sugar than they could sell during the war, while the merchant who had been careful and honest in making his report to the Government and afraid he would report too much during the war and didn't even have the 2 and 3 pounds per person allowed by the Food Administration.

ENFORCEMENT OF FOOD REGULATIONS

No special difficulties were encountered in this county in enforcing the Food Administration rules, although a number of cases were reported, some of which, when investigated, were true and others were not. I had only one license revoked and one case where a party made a voluntary contribution to the Red Cross of \$100.00.

FOOD PRODUCTION

Food production was one of the things that was pushed in all lines in Livingston County during the war, not only by the farmer, but people in towns,

who made special efforts to raise garden truck. Gardening was taken up by the schools and among the school children. Neighborhood committees went around to inspect gardens and prizes were offered for the best garden, all of which made the work interesting and educational.

THRESHERS ORGANIZATION

This county was well organized to save grain, especially wheat, during the threshing season. Each machine crew had two men, who had charge of the saving of the grain; one of these men was the farmer for whom the threshing was being done, and the other one was the separator man at the machine. This plan seemed to work out fine. Tight racks were used for wheat only.

Finally, in summing up for this loyal county of Livingston, it must be said that as a body of law abiding citizens they have nothing to reproach themselves with for their conduct during the food conservation period and, as the food administrator for the county, I take pleasure in looking back to the help given me during the trying period that we went through.

COUNCIL OF NATIONAL DEFENSE OF FORREST TOWNSHIP

The following brief report gives some idea of the scope of the work and breadth of activities of the Council of National Defense, an organization of patriotic men and women which permeated every section, and who held themselves in readiness to do any patriotic service which might befall them:

A committee composed of one member from each school district worked with the chairman of the C. N. D.

Distributed all literature sent; Hoover conservation cards signed.

Gardening carried on extensively; fruit and vegetables canned and dried, as shown by house to house canvass.

Registration of women successful, as also measuring and weighing of babies.

Considerable activity in community singing. Adopted eight French war orphans.

AMERICAN RED CROSS

1917

A mass meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. Building, Pontiac, Illinois, May 17, 1917, for the purpose of completing the organization of the Livingston County Chapter of the American Red Cross, at which time Mr. S. A. Rathbun was elected Chairman; Thos. E. Barry, Vice-Chairman; and O. P. Bourland, Treasurer, after which the Chairman appointed the following committees:

Our organization was then perfected, and we were willing and ready for work, but we had no room in which to work. However, the Trustees of the Y. M. C. A. came to our aid and placed the rooms in the northwest corner of the building at our disposal until we were able to procure a more suitable location. When the schools were dismissed for the summer, through the courtesy of the School Board, we were permitted to occupy the school rooms in the north portion of the Central School downstairs.

Experiencing much difficulty in procuring suitable materials for the garments we were expected to make up, and in order to obtain it at a reasonable figure, the Chairman appointed Mrs. Carrie Bruner as purchasing agent, who visited the wholesale markets and finding what she wanted, with the expectancy of an advance in price, purchased supplies sufficient to keep us in work for quite a while, at the same time saving us several hundred dollars. At the outset it was hard to get some of the people in the outside towns to organize and get into the work but with Mr. Wilson's help and earnestness, we were able to visit many places and opened up several branches. There was still a lot of work to be accomplished and a Bureau of Information was organized with Mrs. O. P. Bourland as Chairman, who took charge of the outside towns and visited those who had not entered into active work and enlisted them in the good cause.

Through the kindness of the Manager of the Chautauqua we were provided with a tent on the grounds where we exhibited our articles and the ladies took advantage of the tent and spent considerable time there.

Time for opening schools had arrived and we were compelled to look for a new location. At our Executive Committee meeting in August the Chairman appointed Miss Anne Lord, E. A. Simmons and H. E. Torrance as a Committee to look up a building and arrange it and equip it for the work. They spent some time considering several locations in town and at the next meeting reported they secured a lease on the rooms in the Sterry Block at a rental of \$35.00 per month. Mr. Simmons undertook to place the shelving and fixtures in the room ready for work, and saved the Association considerable expense.

Mrs. Pearre and committee worked hard on the Comfort Kits to get them ready for Company F and the same were distributed to them just before leaving for the camp. Besides those for our own boys, we had to fill and equip some two hundred others and every boy in the county who was not looked after by his home town received a Comfort Kit.

1918

During the year six branches were organized: Pike, Wing, Rowe, Aneona, Manville, and Charlotte, making a total of 22, and McDowell has been organized as an auxiliary.

At the beginning of the epidemic of influenza, the Central Division sent word that the Red Cross Chapter should offer their services to the Local Health Departments. This was done at once, and on Thursday, October 10th, Dr. Bawden, of our Health Department, telephoned at 4:00 p. m. requesting that an Emergency Hospital be opened at the earliest possible moment. Work was commenced at once, and at 2:00 p. m. Friday, the hospital was fully equipped and ready to receive patients, with Miss Verna Solma in charge during the day, Miss Zook on duty at night, and with Miss Margery Lyon in charge of the dietetics. The hospital was closed on November 16th. During the 29 days we received 48 patients. Of this number 39 were discharged in apparent good health, and 9 died.

In addition to the work in the hospital, nurses and aids were sent into 19 homes, and the canteen committees made 202 calls, furnishing soup and light nourishment, besides serving meals to those able to eat them. In order to carry on this work, there were five graduate nurses, one army aid, ten practical nurses, and forty-three Red Cross Aids. Every housewife in Pontiac was ready and willing to do her part in providing the nourishment for the patients, and meals for the helpers.

There were 31 ambulance calls, all of which were promptly responded to by Mr. Erwin. Two automobiles were in service continually. During the four weeks 1200 face masks were made here, and Saunemin kindly responded to a call for 100. Seventy-four pneumonia jackets were made, and in the first hurry call, 32 were made in one afternoon, and were given to all who called for them. Emington gave 18 hospital shirts and Dwight made and delivered 30 hospital shirts in 24 hours.

In addition to our work here we sent one trained nurse and four Red Cross Aids to Forrest, the Forrest branch being the first to open an Emergency Hospital, and to Emington we sent two graduate nurses.

Mr. McMullen, Field Director from the Central Division, made us a visit during February, met with the Directors, and in the evening spoke at an open meeting.

During October, Miss Brayton, Field Director of the Home Service, was here to meet with the Home Service Committee and Executive Committee, and fully explained the importance of the work of the Committee.

The present Red Cross membership in Livingston County is 13,049. May we not expect that during the December drive the membership may be increased to 15,000?

Hospital opened Oct. 4th, closed Oct. 13th; 27 patients were cared for; 3 deaths in hospital. One graduate nurse, Miss Solma, and 3 practical nurses, Miss Marlow, Miss Fosseen, Mrs. Rowen; 10 women who nursed in homes; 75 canteen calls. 16 women assisted with work in hospital, including Miss Mabel Tindall and Miss Julia Bourland, of Pontiac. Seven men assisted with night work. Prof. Merrill and Miss Johnson helped very much in the nursing. Miss Kelley helped us open up the hospital and move in the patients. Pontiac chapter sent single beds and supplies, also Emington and Dwight branches sent hospital shirts. For all of these helps we are very thankful. Total expenses, \$250.00, which were fully paid by the Forrest Red Cross Branch.

SHOULDER INSIGNIA of the AMERICAN ARMY

The shoulder insignia of the combat divisions have added greatly to the picturesqueness of our fighting forces, and their usefulness is obvious. The adoption of these insignia has been a spontaneous growth rather than the result of prearrangement. The insignia are sometimes worn in combination, as an army symbol, with a division symbol. Also the special markings for engineers, Q. M. C., medical or other units are combined with the army insignia, as in the sample we have included Army, Aviation Section, showing the aviation symbol in combination with the black "A" of the 1st Army.

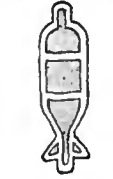

The 370th Infantry (old 8th Illinois) was not attached to any U. S. division, but made a distinguished record with the French, going into the firing line June 24. It suffered 386 casualties, including 95 men killed in action, and received 22 American distinguished service crosses and 85 French Croix de Guerre.

THE VICTORY MEDAL

1. A war service medal, to be known as the Victory Medal, will be awarded to all officers and enlisted men who served on active duty in the Army of the United States at any time between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, and whose service was honorable.

2. Battle clasps will be awarded for each of the following major operations: (To be eligible for a battle clasp, the officer or enlisted man must have actually participated under orders in the engagement.)

- (a) SOMME DEFENSIVE—Between March 21 and April 6, 1918.
- (b) LYS—Between April 9 and 27, 1918.
- (c) AISNE—On the Chemin des Dames and northeast of Rheims between May 27 and June 5, 1918.
- (d) MONTDIDIER-NOYON—Between June 9 and 13, 1918.
- (e) CHAMPAGNE-MARNE—Between July 15 and 18, 1918.
- (f) AISNE-MARNE—Between July 18 and August 6, 1918.
- (g) SOMME OFFENSIVE—Between August 8 and November 11, 1918.
- (h) OISE-AISNE—Between August 18 and November 11, 1918.
- (i) YPRES-LYS—Between August 19 and November 11, 1918.
- (j) ST. MIHIEL—Between September 12 and 16, 1918.
- (k) MEUSE-ARGONNE—Between September 26 and November 11, 1918.
- (l) VITTORIO-VENETO—Between October 24 and November 4, 1918.

Clasps will be awarded to each officer and enlisted man who served overseas and is not entitled to a battle clasp under paragraph 2, as follows:

- (a) FRANCE—For service in France between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918.
- (b) ITALY—For service in Italy between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918.
- (c) SIBERIA—For any service in Siberia.
- (d) RUSSIA—For any service in European Russia.
- (e) ENGLAND—For service in England between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918.

4. A bronze star, 3-16 of an inch in diameter, will be placed on the service ribbon for each clasp awarded. When an officer or enlisted man has been cited in orders issued from the headquarters of a force commanded by a general officer for gallantry in action, not justifying the award of a medal of honor, distinguished service cross or distinguished service medal, he will wear a silver star on the ribbon and on the service ribbon for each such citation.

5. Pending the procurement and issue of the Victory Medal, organization commanders are authorized to permit those serving under them to wear the service ribbon, and stars to which they are entitled as shown by their records.

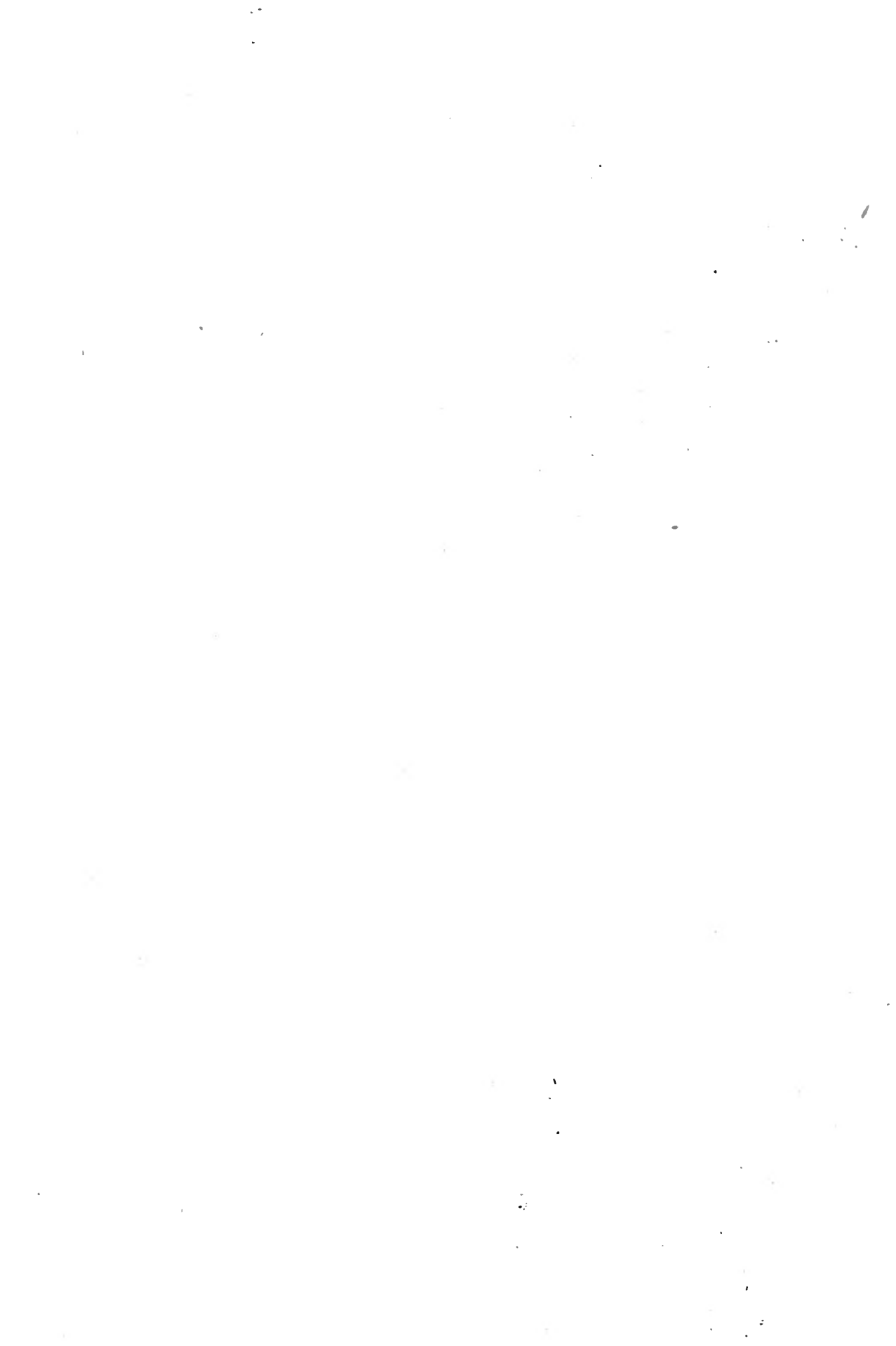

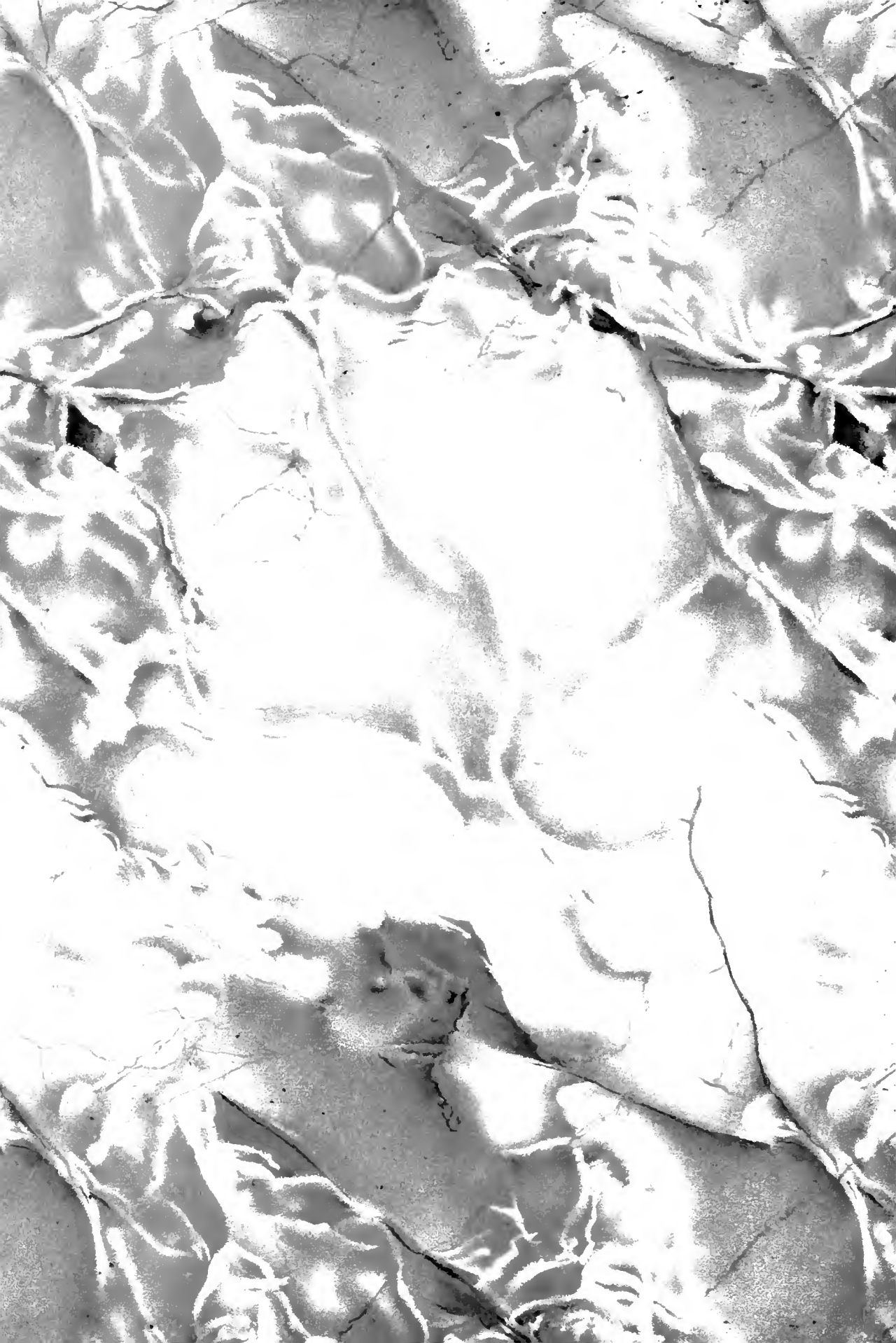
