





Free are we from care; at last



Senior Class History

TRADITION and custom teach us that every important period of time should be recorded, and if the four year college course is not an important period in a girl's life, what is? It is, therefore, the Historian's privilege to place on record an account of the class of 1922, its progress and achievements, and the events which have been of interest to the class.

September 7, 1918, stands out preeminently to this graduating class, for it was on that day, four years ago, although it seems hardly the same number of months ago, that Peace opened her gates to twelve verdant Freshmen. Although the Armistice had been signed, war was continually waged against us by the Sophomores, whose duty it was to acquaint us with the mysteries of college life. This they did by taking us through an informal ceremony known as Initiation. We survived the ordeal but came out with the required number of scratches. Soon we became confident of our ability to overcome all obstacles, and entered into the college activities with the enthusiasm and pep of Freshmen. We later had cause to wonder just how Peace had been maintained in former years without us.

In the fall of 1919, eight of our number returned to welcome thirty-two new members. This was one of the largest Sophomore classes in the history of the school. We did not altogether ignore the Freshmen and it took us some time to get them adjusted to their proper stations. The most outstanding event during the year was a party given us by the Senior class. At this party the Seniors gave us their privileges for one whole day. These consisted of signing up and going down town, and having a date on a regular school night.

The fall of 1920 brought sixteen jolly Juniors back to Peace. Here we received the privilege of chaperoning the underclassmen, and the responsibility was indeed overwhelming! Now it was no longer necessary to hang over the rail and watch the proceedings of the Junior-Senior Reception, but we actually were the hostesses, and how we did shine! Another occasion which we shall never forget was a dinner party given in our honor by Angelia Morrison, our class mascot.

Commencement Class Day exercises brought the final triumph when we received our ribbons from the Seniors, assuring us that we had reached that place which we had been working to attain for three years.

In September, 1921, twelve, our original round dozen number, returned for the final struggle with Psych, English, and the Kings of Israel.

Our Senior year has been all that we could hope for. We shall never forget the Virginia-Carolina foot-ball game at Chapel Hill, the lovely reception given us by the Juniors, the Sophomore Valentine party, and the many "get-together" feasts with Miss Burwell, our class teacher.

As Commencement Day draws near, we are filled with regret at the thought of leaving the friends we have made. And we are thinking not only of these friendships, but also of Peace itself, with its many happy associations. We feel that what we have learned has been an important factor in forming our ideals and determining our aspirations.

Our exit now may be compared to a ship's leaving harbor. One by one the tugs are leaving us and we shall soon be out on the uncertain sea of life, but in our cargo we are carrying tons of the sweetest of memories and good wishes for Peace.
