











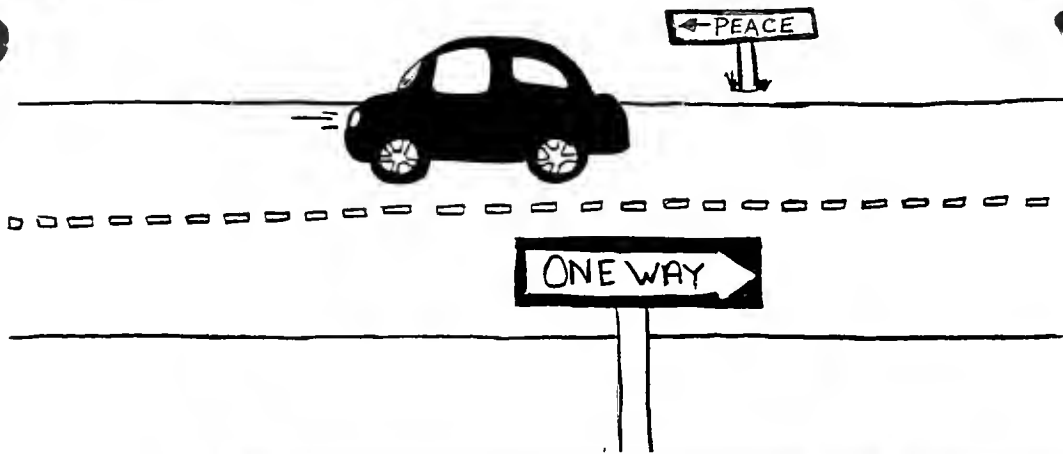

# Traditions

This year, as in 123 years before, convocation of the Freshman Class was the first Thursday of the academic year.

A long-standing tradition at Peace College, the 124th convocation was held on August 24, the first Thursday of the school year. The faculty, adorned in their finest academic regalia, along with student body officers, took their places on the stage of the Recital Hall opposite the Freshman Class of 1997.

"I think it gives freshmen the opportunity to be recognized and introduced to the faculty and administration," said Lindsey Tyler, who took part in convocation last year.

"It was fun to get the freshman class together as a whole and to

see everyone dressed up in their white dresses and to realize that girls before you in past years experienced the same thing you are experiencing," said Becky Casto, freshman.

The speaker, Dr. Patricia A. Sullivan, the first female chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, said "I'm not sure about what lies ahead. But one thing I'm fairly sure of -- we will need able and enthusiastic leaders as we've never needed them before, and you're really here to become educated women and take your place as leaders in our society," she said. "I think

there are other kinds of leaders, less celebrated in the past, less well-known, who are also leaders. Many leaders conduct their work without popularity and recognition."

Following the ceremony, students headed for Peace Beach for a Texas-style barbeque where the Christian rock band Crossroads played. Then, activities sponsored by Peace Student Recreation Association tested students' cowgirl talents. Students participated in relays involving a watermelon seed-spitting contest, a "horse" roping contest, and a watergun shooting contest.

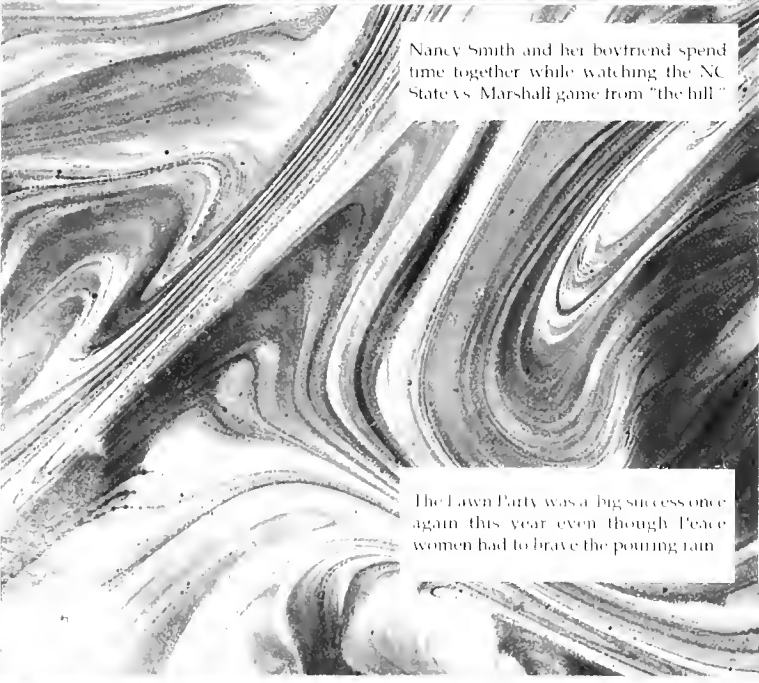

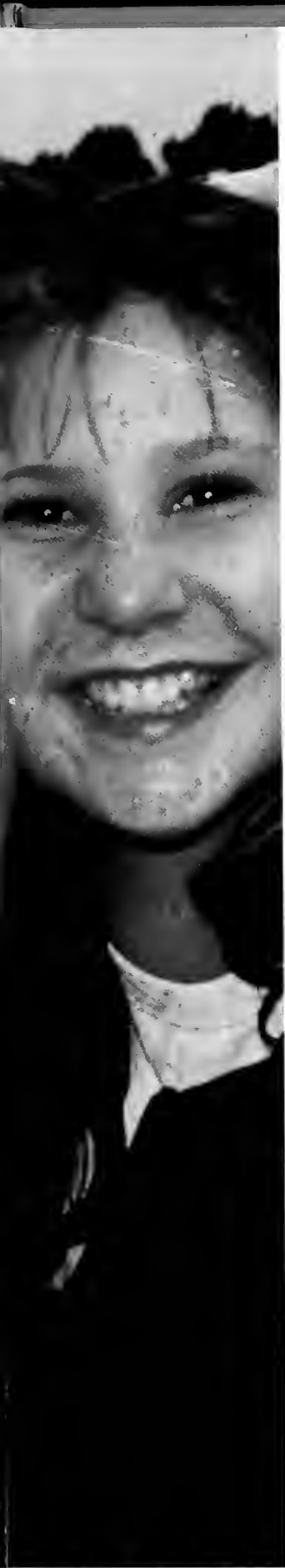

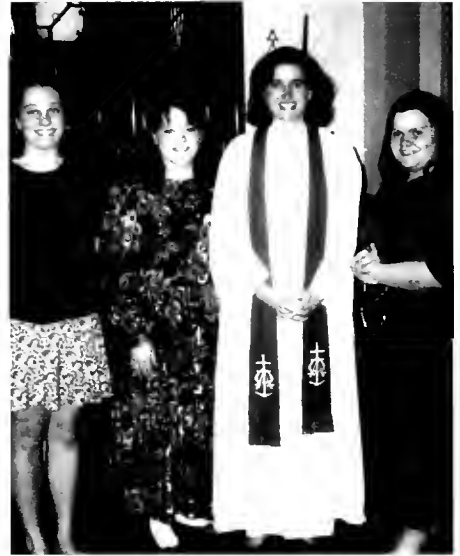

# Graduation...

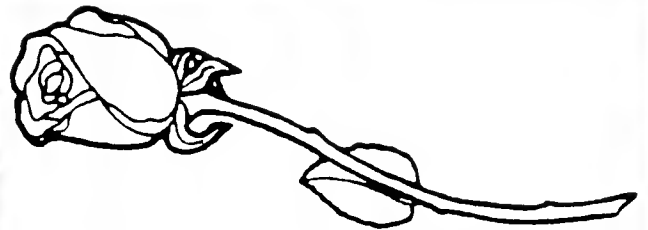

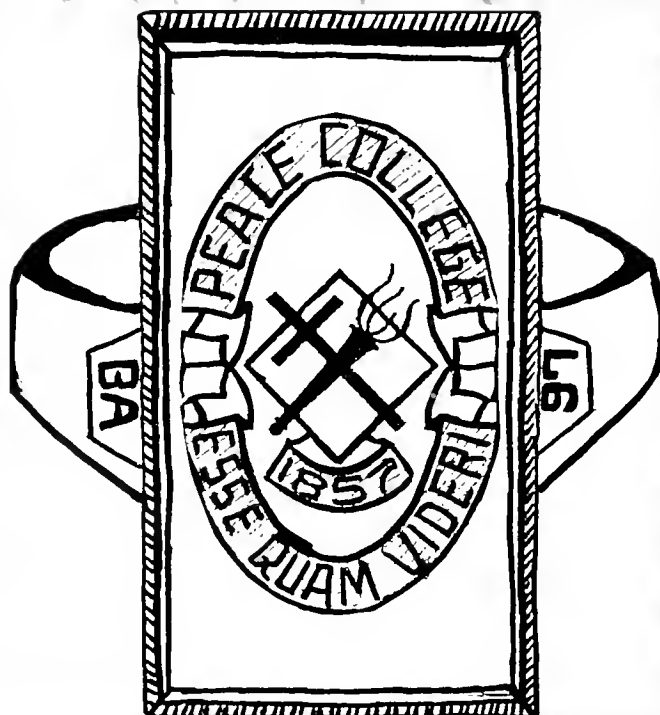

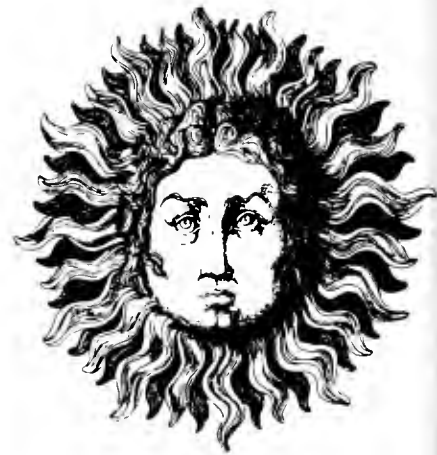

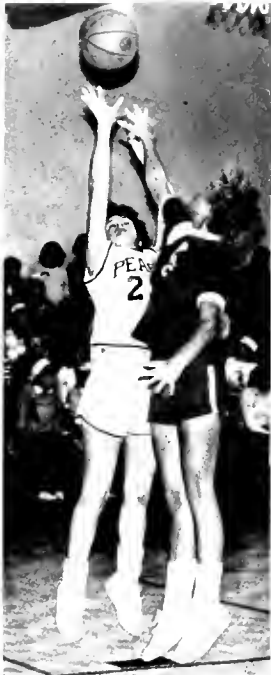
## Storm's effects lingering

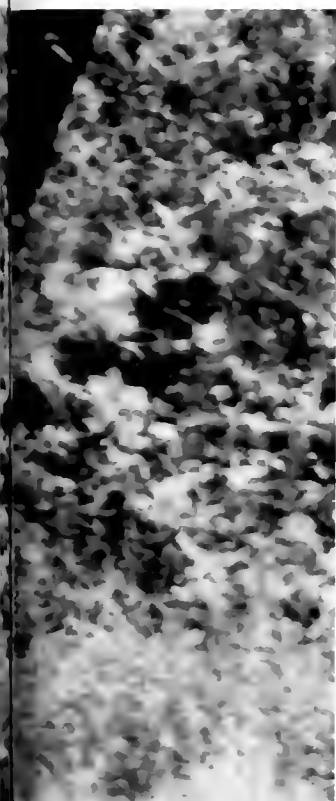

# CHAMBER SINGERS

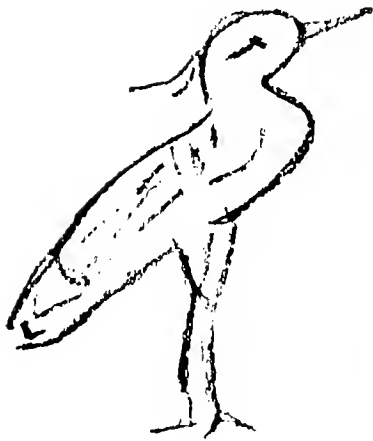

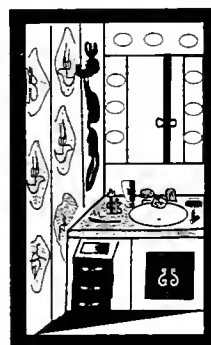

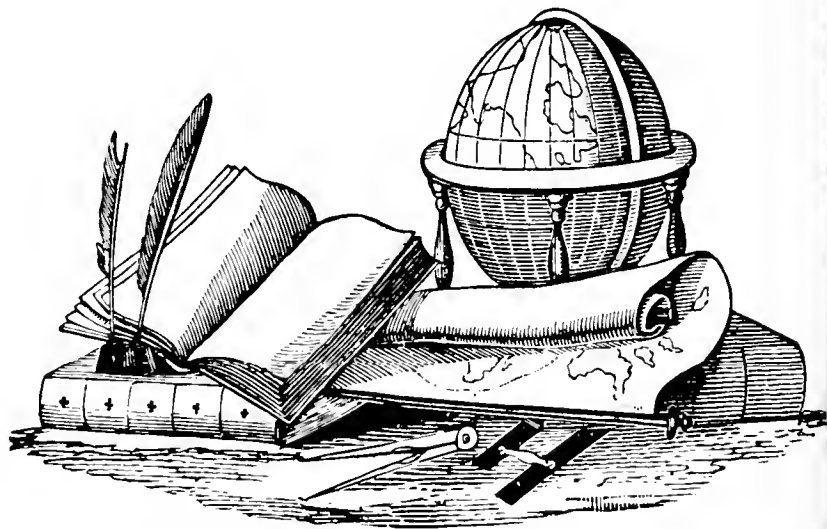

The Peace College Scholars and Honors Program offers academic opportunities for scholars and honors students through honors classes, honors projects in required or elective courses, independent study, attendance at conferences for undergraduate scholars or honors students, and membership in National Honors societies for eligible students.

1995-96: Scholars and Honors students were guests of Dr. and Mrs. Briggs at a cookout sponsored by the Honors Program. Two Honors students accompanied the Scholars/Honors Coordinator to the annual North Carolina Honors Council Conference, held at Mt. Olive College, and two students attended the annual Southern Regional Honors Council conference in Norfolk, Virginia. For the first time in history of Peace College, a senior honors student participated in the National Research Conference for Undergraduate Students, presenting the results of a psychological research project. The 1996 conference was held in Asheville, N.C. During the fall semester, 1995, Scholars and Honors students were invited to attend a series of informal "Brown bag" luncheon discussions featuring Peace college faculty members and focused on topical issues.

Following fall and spring tapping ceremonies, first semester students with Grade Point Average of 3.75 or higher and second or third semester students with grade Point Average of 3.50 or higher were inducted in an April ceremony into Phi Theta Kappa International Honors Society for Two Year Colleges.

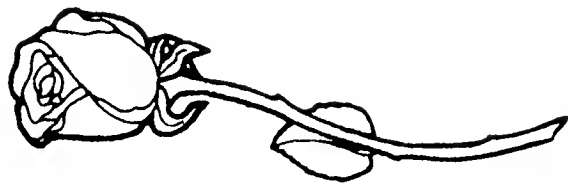

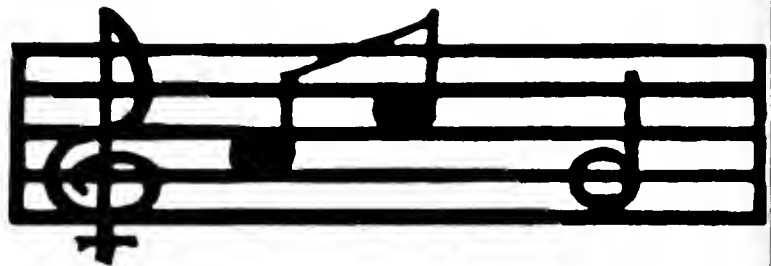
