HAVE A HAPPY VACATION!

"AND HE DIED"

The last frontiers have been reached. There is no escape from the necessity of solving the problems of society if it is to survive," President Harold H. Hutson told members of the 1972 graduating class at the annual baccalaureate service in the Pine Street United Methodist Church on May 7th. Using the theme "And He Died," Dr. Hutson traced changing concepts and philosophies of life from the simplicities of Biblical times through the frontier days in America to the complexities of the present.

One of the major reasons cited by Dr. Hutson for present-day frustrations and problems is the lack of a frontier to which we can escape. "In human societies frontier concepts often determine how people live and die. The frontier provided an outlet, an escape for those who found their own problems and those of society closing in on them. When that happened, they could always move on. Nobody felt permanently hemmed in. He could always move on when the effects of social living became too oppressive."

"Then we ran out of space in the West. The physical frontier was gone. We were thrown back upon mental and emotional resources that had definite spatial limits. Our mental and emotional resources also close in on us and we begin to feel on the meaning of the frustration which causes when there is seemingly no physical or emotional outlet. Then what do we do? The frontier is gone. So what does this mean to us?"

Quoting from a recent newspaper column by David S. Broder in which Broder declared that the American voters this far in the primaries sent a message of cynicism and alienation, Dr. Hutson said Broder believed "the public mood is not the traditional American spirit of optimism and self-confidence. But one of anxiety, tension, and frustration. Driven by a seemingly endless war, by inflation by drugs by crime, many have lost confidence in their country if not in the lives."



THE DURANT L. Dr. Hutson also quoted Haynes Johnson who wrote "Americans may still believe in themselves, but they have lost faith in most everything else. They do not believe in their politicians. They do not believe in the news press. They do not, indeed, seem to believe in any institution."

"If Broder and Johnson are right," Dr. Hutson told the seniors, "I disagree strongly on one point. If we have lost faith in our people and our institutions, we have projected our loss of confidence in ourselves onto the professors and these institutions we have created. This is the passing of the frontier. This is the death wish. And He Died may well be our own epitaph and that of our society. The new American immortality may be given in the critic who has no

In conclusion, Dr. Hutson told the seniors they have not been given easy and simple answers. Perhaps the real answers. The frontiers are gone, the problems cannot be solved by moving—west, east, north or south. The search for solutions must go on, through you, or else they shall write upon the graves of all of us—And He Died."

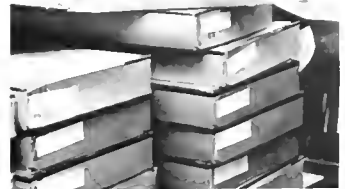

Retired after seventy-six combined years of service are Dr. Helen B. Weidman, professor of political science; Dr. W. Arthur Faus, associate professor of philosophy; and Don L. Larrabee, lecturer in law. Dr. Weidman has been on the staff twenty-eight years, Dr. Faus twenty-one years, and Mr. Larrabee a part-time faculty member for twenty-seven years.

CAMPUS NOTES

THE ASSOCIATES OF LYCOMING COLLEGE—a group of professional, business and industrial leaders—held their spring dinner meeting in the college dining room May 15th with approximately seventy members and guests in attendance. President Hutson moderated a panel discussion on "Problems of Higher Education." Jack C. Buckle, dean of student services; John P. Graham, professor of English and Oliver E. Haters, director of development, completed the panel. Dean Buckle discussed student life and changing attitudes. Professor Graham compared past and present teaching and learning techniques, and Mr. Hutson explained budgeting and financial problems of private colleges.

VISTULA CHAPMAN, 72, a History-German major received a Ford Foundation Doctoral Fellowship, one of six in the nation awarded to history and social studies majors. She plans to work in American and Black Studies.

ACHSA COLLOQUIUM was conducted April 6th and 7th under the joint sponsorship of Lycoming and the Williamsport Public Forum. Four visiting speakers discussed various aspects of modern China.

Bruce Morgan, professor and department of religion chairman at Amherst College, resided in China during the hectic years between the end of the second World War and the conclusion of the Communist revolution. He spoke on "Sociological Changes in the People's Republic of China: From Confucian Particularism to Communist Nationalism" and on the "Chinese View of the World: Old and New—How Discontinuous?"

Daniel Trotrak and Lois Deigan Trotrak were with the last group of Americans to speak with Chou-En-Lai

before President Nixon's trip to China. Both of them speak Chinese. They returned from the month-long visit on February 12th.

Mr. Trotrak, a lecturer in political science at York University in Toronto, is a Ph.D. candidate in political science at Stanford University. He is Co-Chairman of the U. S. Committee for a New China Policy and was formerly senior political scientist with the Advanced Studies Group, Westinghouse Corporation. At various sessions he spoke on "U. S.-China Foreign Relations," "Women's Role in the Chinese Society," and "Observations on Contemporary Chinese Higher Education." Professor Trotrak has been to mainland China several times.

Mrs. Trotrak is a freelance writer for Harvard East Asia Total Studies and the Harvard East Asian Research Center. She is a University of Pittsburgh graduate and former assistant editor of the *Far Eastern Economic Review*, published in Hong Kong. She spoke on "Politics in Contemporary China: Prospects into the Future," and was commentator on the other colloquium presentations.

Professor B. Michael Frolik is a research fellow at the Harvard Russian Research Center and a Ph.D. candidate at Cornell. He speaks Chinese, German, and Russian. He has been an exchange student in Moscow, and spent a month in mainland China in both 1965 and 1971. He spoke on "Urban Problems of Modern China" and "U. S.-China Trade Prospects."

W. ARTHUR FAUS, retired professor of philosophy, will be listed in the forthcoming edition of *Who's Who Among Authors and Journalists*.

RICHARD W. FELDMANN, assistant professor of math, has been awarded a graduate assistantship in statistics at The Pennsylvania State University where

he will continue his doctoral study full-time on sabbatical during the 1973 spring semester.

MORTON A.
