

DANFORTH GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS FOR WOMEN 1973-74

<p>PURPOSE</p> <p>The Danforth Foundation announces the Danforth Graduate Fellowships for Women. The objective of the program is to fund and develop college and university school teachers among that group of American women whose preparation for teaching has been postponed or interrupted. In general, the fellowships are intended for women who no longer qualify for those conventional fellowship programs in which candidates on such programs might be given low priority.</p> <p>At the time of application she may not be employed as a full-time teacher in a full or part-time position as defined by her graduate school. The career of a typical applicant may have been interrupted by such factors as the raising of her family, personal illness, or the need for a paying job. But she is not, in such cases, in circumstances which will permit her to undertake the graduate work essential to a professional career as a full-time teacher at the college or university level.</p> <p>The fellowships are open to women who hold bachelor's degrees from accredited colleges or universities in the United States received no later than June, 1973. They are for new students, not transfer students. Selection will be made without reference to race, creed, citizenship or marital status. Candidates may or may not have begun study. They may or may not have had experience in teaching. They may pursue a full or a part-time study program at an accredited graduate school in the United States, leading to a master's or doctoral degree. Although there are no upper or lower age limitations, low priority is given to candidates who will not complete their study programs by the age of thirty, and to applicants in the younger age group whose personal situations and/or study programs make them potentially strong candidates for other sources of fellowship aid. Fellowships are not available for professional study or research for graduate study not related to a degree. Applicants seeking support for the dissertation only have low priority. Recipients are expected to undertake full-time teaching upon completion of their degrees.</p> <p>PERIOD OF AWARD</p> <p>Appointments for one year beginning September, 1973, and renewable at the discretion of the recipient are made in fiscal year ending standing and follow the study plan submitted in her application. The stipend will depend on individual need. Recipients should complete the stipend self-survey as one of the steps in the application process. If a candidate's employment will not provide funds for living expenses, the Foundation will not consider maintaining a stipend as a legitimate need. The maximum award for 1973-74 for a calendar year of study is \$3,400 for tuition and academic fees, or for students of color, \$4,000 plus tuition and academic fees. If a candidate's appointment is for more than one year, low priority is given to candidates who are not currently attending and have not completed the undergraduate and/or graduate work. Candidates who have begun graduate work at the time of application are given priority. GERTRUDE B. MADDEN, assistant professor of English, discussed the changing role of colleges at the annual Lycoming College Freshman Convocation service on September 8th in the Academic Center.

Citing changes in recent years from the college role of conservator of the traditional to increasing interest in the political and economic life of the community, Mrs. Madden said college students must become involved as "individuals and as a group" with "an emphasis on changes within man equal to changes which have occurred and are occurring outside him".

"We have phenomenal creature comforts, we are exploring the far reaches of the universe, we have prolonged life, and we have the promise of greater and greater technological achievements," Professor Madden told the students and faculty. "But we have hypocrisy, avarice, materialism, and war, and daily we see man's inhumanity to man, such as this week's tragedy in Munich. Our advances in the 'outer' world are astounding. Yet our advances in the 'inner' world seem not to have kept pace."

Concluding, Gerry said, "There is no better place to examine fragments of the world, nor to examine all institutions of the world, nor to examine self, than in the atmosphere that permeates a college campus. That is the job of all of us here, faculty and students alike. That's our task, lest we condemn ourselves to continue to relive the past by failing to remember and change things within us which perpetuate the negative and dim the positive in the outer world."

Also participating in the convocation were President Harold H. Hutson; L. Paul Neuffer, director of religious activities, who gave the invocation and the benediction; Mrs. Mary L. Russell, organist, and the Lycoming College Choir under the direction of Walter G. Melver.

IMPROVEMENTS TO SEVERAL FACILITIES have been completed during the summer vacation. Included are a major renovation project in the gymnasium, construction of an eight-court tennis facility at the athletic field, and erection of outside lights to improve illumination on the campus.



The gymnasium project included replacement of the floor on the basketball court, installation of a new lighting system, new pull-out bleachers, removal of the stage at the east end of the basketball court, and lengthening of the court playing area by four feet. The Universal Gym machine has also been removed from the men's locker room and erected in a former utility room adjacent to the basketball floor.

Both the new lights in the gym and those erected on campus are mercury vapor bulbs, substantially increasing the illumination of previous lighting facilities. Removal of the stage made it possible to extend the floor four feet, reducing the margin between Lycoming's comparatively small floor and most of the playing facilities of Warrior opponents.

Oliver E. Harris, director of development, said the improvements made to the gym will not necessarily curtail continuing efforts to raise funds to finance construction of a new gym. Plans are to continue using the present gymnasium for student activities and the physical education program after a new gym is built. The deteriorated condition of the floor in the fifty-year old building made a replacement necessary to provide continued use of the facility.

METZGER 76 YEARS YOUNG THAT IS — NOT CLASS OF

There is nothing unusual about a daughter enrolling at her father's alma mater to pursue a career in higher education.

However, it is, indeed, a rarity if this procedure is reversed. And Arthur B. Metzger, of Muncy, did just that early in September when he began classes at Lycoming more than thirty years after his daughter, Mrs. Frances Metzger Greene, had been a student here in 1941.

And what is probably even more unusual, Mr. Metzger just passed his 76th birthday anniversary, making him one of the oldest students ever to enter Lycoming.

It isn't that Mr. Metzger wants to continue his education as a means to an economic end. After all, he just retired last June as purchasing agent at Sprout-Waldron Company in Muncy after having worked fifty-seven years for the firm since graduation from Muncy High School in 1915. And anyone ambitious enough to continue with full employment for ten years after reaching normal retirement age would be expected to have some difficulty making adjustments to his daily routine.

Mr. Metzger's wife died twelve years ago, and with living alone at his home at 203 West Penn Street he found he was "just rattling around the house" most of the day. Although he does enjoy reading, he concluded that he needed something in his life besides reading, dusting the furniture, and mowing the lawn.

And that is what prompted him to enroll at Lycoming. In addition to wanting something "worthwhile to occupy my time", Mr. Metzger explained that his daughter, who now resides near Portland, Oregon, gave him added incentive when she urged him to return to school.

When he first considered enrolling, Mr. Metzger was not certain what courses he wanted to take. Because he is fond of music, he leaned in that direction. After careful consideration, and with help from the admissions staff, he decided to take only one course the first semester. Because he so thoroughly enjoys reading, he decided to make "Introduction to Philosophy" his first venture into higher education.

Although he does not really plan to acquire enough credits for a degree, Mr. Metzger is looking forward to possibly more social science courses as well as music and languages.

And if the enthusiasm with which Mr. Metzger began his first class is any indication, Lycoming's oldest student will be a success in any future courses he may choose.

FLOOD REPORT

It has been said by our Canadian neighbors that if it were not for Quebec and the U. S. A., they would have little to talk about. In Pennsylvania this summer, the Great Flood of '72 has pre-empted all other topics of conversation—including politics.

And well it might, because the flood that Hurricane Agnes brought to our area can properly be described as the most devastating natural catastrophe in our history. Williamsport, thanks to its dikes and upstream flood-control dams, escaped the devastation that was visited upon Wilkes-Barre and Harrisburg, in particular.

However, main streams, such as Lycoming and Loyalsock Creeks, and smaller feeder streams rampaged out of their banks and caused more damage than one can imagine. The Susquehanna rose within inches of the top of the dikes. But they held, and downtown Williamsport was spared.

Lycoming College, we are thankful to report, suffered relatively minor inconvenience and damage from surface water. When an area is drenched with three months' normal rainfall (12.42 inches) in two days (June 21 and 22), some flooding and minor damage are inevitable.

This is not to minimize the impact of the flood to areas surrounding Williamsport. Many people lost their homes and everything they owned. Others had their places of business put out of business—some permanently. Many summer cottages were severely damaged or simply washed away. Roads were washed out, bridges destroyed, and farms transformed to deep gullies and sand dunes.

As the saying goes, "You had to see it to believe it." Frank Kamus, our Director of Admissions, watched helplessly as the Susquehanna at Jersey Shore put the first floor of his home under six feet of water. When it receded, a number of the administrative staff pitched in to help him dig out of the mud and muck. Adversity brought out the best in most people—they pitched in and helped their less fortunate friends, neighbors, and, yes—even strangers. But that small number of human virtues were present also—looting and stealing.

It will probably take years to restore the most devastated areas. Some may never make it. In any case, the Flood of '72 replaces the Flood of '36 as the worst in the record books. And it will provide conversation material for years to come.

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FALL SPORTS PREVIEW

Twelve running backs are seeking the three starting spots in the Warrior backfield, and the competition in early practice has indicated the rushing offense may be surprisingly strong despite the lack of variety experience. Shown with assistant coaches Jim Girardi and John Kutney, kneeling at right, are nine of the twelve backs. An air of optimism is readily apparent in the Warriors pre-season football practice despite an inexperienced backfield that could easily turn out to be the big surprise of the season.

Both the running and passing offense were hit hard by graduation. However, twelve running backs, many of them freshmen and sophomores, have been displaying excellent form in early drills. Frank Girardi, beginning his first year as head coach after replacing Bud Whitehall at the end of last season, believes he will find the proper blend of speed and power to keep the defense honest.

Sam Schiecatano, a freshman; Lee Novello, a sophomore, and Nat Lodge, a junior, are probably the fastest among the dozen backs seeking a starting spot. The power running will be up to Mike Fedorco, Chet Chappack, and Gareth Keene, all freshmen, and Pete Cusack, a junior. Juniors Fred Grieb and Byron

Martz, sophomores Kevin Rosenhoover and Robin Zimmer, and freshman Roger Barto all will probably see action, at least early in the season until Girardi has had an opportunity to observe his backs in operation under fire. Lodge is the only letter winner in the offensive backfield, and he received that for his defensive efforts in the secondary.

The quarterback position was also particularly hard hit with the loss of Gantner Nellen by graduation and Jack Carson by a decision to withdraw from school. As a sophomore last year, Carson took over midway through the season and directed the team to two wins in the last three contests of a 2-6 season.

The entire varsity experience of three quarterbacks fighting for the job is the 32 plays that junior Bob Mesaros participated in in 1971. He completed nine

of 28 passes for 85 yards. Sophomore Dick Stewart and freshman Ed Niemczyk also are seeking the job.

Coach Girardi also has another offensive weapon and probably the best place kicker in the Middle Atlantic Conference in sophomore Porfirio Goncalves, who last year set three Lycoming kicking records, including the longest field goal, 46 yards; most in a season, five; and most in a game, two.

Operating in front of the running backs will be an experienced offensive line comprised of guards. Dan Peterson — senior, Dave Franklin — junior, and Dave Bindgen — sophomore; tackles. Bill Dragan — senior, John Yarosh and John Kuska — sophomores, split end. Pete Onorati, a sophomore who led the team in pass receiving last year, tight end: Wayne Goodrow — junior. All are lettermen.

Probably the Warriors' strongest point is the defense. Although two fine defensive backs, Tony Bracciale and Ed Biggio, graduated, most of the remaining starters, as well as several seasoned substitutes, are back. Lettermen returning from the defensive secondary will be Vinnie Joy, a senior who scored three touchdowns last year on pass interceptions and punt returns and was named to the first team M.A.C. All-Stars; Tom Vanasick, a sophomore; Larry Romeo, a junior, and Bob Moyer, a senior.

An outstanding linebacking corps will be headed by lettermen Steve Wiser, a junior, and Tom Ostrowski, a senior. The defensive line will be built around veteran juniors Steve DiMichele and Angelo Fanelli.

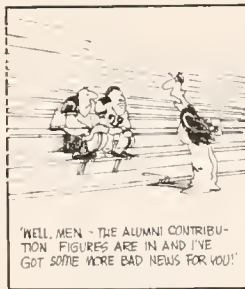
The Warriors play an eight-game schedule beginning at Albright on September 23 and ending at home with Western Maryland on November 11.

In soccer, Lycoming's other fall intercollegiate sport, Coach Nels Phillips should have an excellent chance to improve on the 5-5-1 mark compiled last year. He is building his team around 16 returning lettermen including Paul Anderson, Tim Balmuk, Curt Belton, Steve Chesnes, Andy Fehr, Jeff Gettler, Dave Hammett, Al Lundenberg, Scott McNeil, John Michalowski, Tim Norland, Arclae Rosenberg, George Schlenk, Dave Schuch, Chris Spadoni, and Chuck Young. The boosters play eleven matches beginning September 20 at Dickinson.

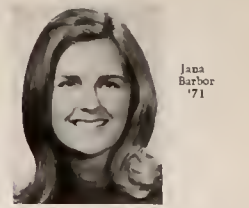
