PRESIDENT'S CORNER

TUITION AND THE BUDGET

As announced in the most recent issue of the catalog, the comprehensive fee for 1974-75 will be increased to \$1,150 per semester. Residence hall charges remain at \$250, but board has been increased to \$325 per semester. This represents an addition of \$50 per semester to the comprehensive fee and 825 to each semester of board.

The Board of Trustees is certain that students and their parents will understand the necessity for this small upward revision of charges. The College's costs are subject to all of the inflationary pressures of our economy, and we must increase instructional and staff salaries if we are to maintain the high level of proficiency and personal attention which has marked Lycoming during the past few

We have been meeting with faculty and student leadership for some time now to effect careful economies in non-personnel items of our annual budget. Although we have been reasonably successful in this project, it is now certain that the College must also reduce personnel in order to give necessary support to those colleagues who continue on the faculty and staff.

Faculty and staff consultation has enabled us to plan for a small reduction of personnel over the next two years which will leave the academic program and services essentially in their present strength. National socio-economic conditions will reduce the enrollment of all privately-supported institutions to numbers considerably below the high point of the late sixties and early seventies. Lycoming has been most fortunate in its experience thus far, and we have every reason to be contident that our enrollment will stabilize at 1,250 to 1,350 students. Interestingly enough, this was the size that our College planning anticipated twelve years ago.

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
